It is easy to spell and pronounce for everyone and reflects the history of the harbour. Mi'kmaq artifacts have been found in the area, and the previous name of the harbour came from the French, who settled the area after the Mi'kmaq and were aware of their settlement of the harbour. Halifax has used the Mi'kmaq name for large harbour to rename themselves, and it makes sense for PEI to acknowledge and be proud of our first people, the Mi'kmaq. I also feel we owe respect to the rights of Mi'kmaq fishers in PEI who have been fishing here long before Europeans arrived here to fish or live. Given the help that was given by the Mi'kmaq to Europeans in fishing and settlement, and the relationships of mutual respect that existed between the French and other European fishers and settlers, it is clear that the word "Savage" did not have the same negative connotation it has today. |
| Non-Resident of PEI                    | Ravage Harbour | The name Ravage Harbour harkens to the original. It is similar in sound, but also similar in meaning. Savage Harbour refers to the tenacity of the offshore waters. "Ravage" refers to the effects of the tumultuous waters. This jives with local understanding of the community's name.   |

Ravens are important symbols in Indigenous culture. Ravens are very smart birds - smarter than crows. It's a non-controversial name that few can object to. It's a good strong name for the region. 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| Resident of Savage Harbour             | Wantaqo'ti Bay           | The Mi'kmaq word for "peace". It is pronounced "Wan-tahk-oo-di". I feel the Harbour and the village should be named the same.  |
| Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour | Whitecap Bay             | I am 49 years old. I have lived on PEI my whole life and have honestly never equated "Savage Harbour" as being derogatory to our Indigenous communities. I never knew the true origin of the name. I always thought the name came from the dangerous surf conditions during a nor'easter storm or other bad weather events. I always loved the name for that reason, as I love a good storm and the power of Mother Nature and the force of water. For that reason, my name suggestion is "Whitecap Bay". I wanted to try to keep that meaning of storms, bad surf conditions, shipwrecks, etc., and honour Mother Nature and her power. |
| Resident of Savage Harbour             | Wild Bay, Wild Winds Bay | Savage has many meanings: fierce, wild, violent, uncontrolled, untamed, catastrophic. These are some of the meanings residents know it to be. They are also words I'd use to describe the night Hurricane Dorian hit, and later Hurricane Fiona. I think of the fishermen, standing together on the wharf, tying all the boats together with fathoms of rope. As Dorian ripped through, they stood physically holding onto their livelihoods, and of those who couldn't make it to "the harbour". If one   |
