Resident of Savage Harbour	Blue Heron Bay	Name is based on large number of blue herons in the area.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Blue Heron Harbour	There are lots of blue herons in the area, so it's descriptive. It's non-derogatory and inclusive.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Blue Heron Harbour	There are presently a large number of great blue herons that make the channel and shores of Savage Bay home for the summer. They can be described as a large, majestic bird with an S shaped neck to symbolize Savage Harbour.

Resident of Savage Harbour	Crowbush Cove	Name aligns with renaming of the wharf so less confusion. Aligns with the historical name of the provincial park that was overtaken by the Golf course. It also reflects that the body of water is a small, sheltered bay which is the definition of a cove.
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Crowbush Cove Harbour	The name was used informally in the Canavoy area for generations before it was adopted as the formal name for the Links Golf Course in West St. Peters. The dunes and trees have always been, and are, a nesting place for PEI's iconic crows.
Other	Crowbush Harbour	The Federal gov't has renamed the wharf Crowbush Cove Wharf. Crowbush Golf Course has an international reputation; it is already "on the map" therefore the

		suggested name will help to orient people unfamiliar with the new name.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Crowbush Harbour	I think it should match the renaming of the working harbour.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Danger Bay	This name may sound daring, but it reflects the true nature of our harbour; powerful, resilient, and unforgettable. Locals know the strength of the tides, the force of the winds, and the respect the sea commands. Danger Bay isn't about fear; it's about awe. It's about the thrill of watching a storm roll in, the courage of our fishers who brave the waters, and the pride we feel in living where nature is raw and real. Danger Bay is a name that sparks curiosity and tells a story. It honours the challenges our community has faced and overcome, and the beauty that comes from living on the edge of the elements. It's a name that stands out, one that visitors will remember and locals will wear with pride. Let's embrace the boldness of our home. Let's become Danger Bay.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Danger Bay	The name aligns with the danger of the currents and winds in the area. It aligns with all the guidelines outlined.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Driftwood Harbour	This is a name that reflects both the natural beauty and the spirit of togetherness that define our shoreline. After each storm, the beach is graced with an abundance of driftwood. Nature's artwork, shaped by wind and waves. These pieces don't just decorate our shore; they become part of our lives. Children build forts, artists find inspiration, and families gather around bonfires fueled

		by this gift from the sea. The driftwood transforms our beach into a place of warmth, creativity, and connection.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Eel Harbour	The original name for Savage Harbour was of Mi'kmaq origin - Katewpijk which means "eel trap place". Subsequently, the French name was "Havre a l'Anguille" (Eel Harbour). My family have lived in Savage Harbour and Mount Stewart for 6 generations. My grandfather and his friends/family used to enjoy the delicacy of eels from Savage Harbour. I remember this as a child. And there are still many eels thriving in the habitat of Savage Harbour, which I have seen and others I know, from kayaking.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Fathom Harbour	The word fathom speaks to many layers of our coastal life. It recalls the fathoms of rope used by our fishermen, the measure of depth in the waters that sustain us, and the winding road that leads into our beautiful, generational community. It's a name that invites reflection, not just of the sea's depth, but of the deep roots and connections we share here. Fathom Harbour is more than a name. It's a tribute to our heritage, our coastline, and the enduring strength of those who have called this place home for generations. It evokes the mystery and beauty of the ocean, the resilience of our people, and the quiet pride we feel in our surroundings.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Fathom Harbour	The name Fathom Harbour evokes a sense of depth, mystery, and maritime heritage. The word "Fathom" is a nautical term used

		to measure the depth of water. It symbolizes exploration, understanding, and the unseen layers beneath the surface, while “Harbour” conveys safety, community, and connection to the sea. Together, they create a name that feels both grounded and expansive, reflecting a place where people can anchor themselves while still embracing curiosity and discovery. Fathom Harbour suggests a balance between the calm of home and the call of the wild sea.

It has always been confusing to have the French Village/ Savage Harbour divide. French Village is listed on maps and is known by residents and other islanders and it will not be confusing for those who are trying to locate our homes, delivery, etc. The name provides professional etiquette which we all desire when stating where our home is or placing our address on professional letterhead etc. Also, French Village speaks to our French heritage as the founders of our community. I feel it is very important to keep a traditional style name. Thank you.
Resident of Savage Harbour	French Village or French Village East	Name is already here within the community. It is just a matter of extending the name. It also represents some of the early settlers.
Resident of Savage Harbour	French Village or French Village East	It is a continuation of a name that is already in the community and reflects some of the first settlers after the Indigenous people. It is simple and represents our heritage, Please no name after a family as there are

		too many families that have been here for generations!
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Friendship Bay	I have worked in this community for the last 16 years, and this is what your reception is every day from young and old.
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Ga't	It means eel in Mi'kmaq; it was originally known as a good place to fish.
Other	Grenier Bay	The name Savage Harbour had little to do with Indigenous groups and more to do with an English naming of what used to be Fleur Sauvage(wildflower). The area was the granary for Fort Louisbourg. Honouring the first French settlers and their historical importance to Fort Louisbourg, I propose Grenier Bay as the new name.
Other	Gull Harbour	Sea birds are very common in community.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Gusty Harbour	The harbour is windy and stormy. I think it sounds good. It's easy to spell and kind of cute.
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Hammerstone	In prehistoric times, the hammerstone was a carefully selected stone that was used as a tool for hammerlike purposes or to flint-knap projectile points by working the edge to a fine blade. The name Hammerstone is easy to pronounce, suggests strength, calls to mind history, and provides something that English speakers can pronounce easily.

Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Little Red Harbour	Thinking of the tiny size of the community and how it is set on the beautiful red shoreline.
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Neighbour Harbour	The community is all about being friendly/neighbourly.
Resident of Savage Harbour	North Canavoy	The name North Canavoy reflects the heritage, geography, and identity of our community while honouring local history and language. Derived from the Gaelic phrase, "ceann a' bhàigh", meaning Head of the Bay. Canavoy connects us to the area's cultural roots and the natural landscape that defines our home. Situated just north of the existing community of Canavoy and

		separated only by a small bay, our community shares not only proximity but a strong historical and cultural bond with our southern neighbours.

Resident of Savage Harbour	Point View Harbour	Locals affectionately refer to the area simply as “The Point”. It’s a name that has been passed down through generations and is deeply rooted in our shared history. It’s more than a geographic reference. It’s a symbol of community, tradition, and the natural beauty that defines our coastal way of life.
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Qomuti	I would suggest the Mi’kmaq name for harbour, which is “Qomuti”. It is easy to spell and pronounce for everyone and reflects the history of the harbour. Mi’kmaq artifacts have been found in the area, and the previous name of the harbour came from the French, who settled the area after the Mi’kmaq and were aware of their settlement of the harbour. Halifax has used the Mi’kmaq name for large harbour to rename themselves, and it makes sense for PEI to acknowledge and be proud of our first people, the Mi’kmaq. I also feel we owe respect to the rights of Mi’kmaq fishers in PEI who have been fishing here long before Europeans arrived here to fish or live. Given the help that was given by the Mi’kmaq to Europeans in fishing and settlement, and the relationships of mutual respect that existed between the French and other European fishers and settlers, it is clear that the word “Sauvage” did not have the same negative connotation it has today.

Non-Resident of PEI	Ravage Harbour	The name Ravage Harbour harkens to the original. It is similar in sound, but also similar in meaning. Savage Harbour refers to the tenacity of the offshore waters. “Ravage” refers to the effects of the tumultuous waters. This jives with local understanding of the community’s name.
Non-Resident of PEI	Ravenhead	Ravens are found in this area of PEI. Ravens are important symbols in Indigenous culture. Ravens are very smart birds - smarter than crows. It’s a non-controversial name that few can object to. It’s a good strong name for the region. (I have a cottage on Corpus Christi Drive. I’m sorry to see the old name disappear as it is the only name we know for our community.)
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Red Oaks	That area of the Island is still home to beautiful native red oaks. I think it would be very fitting to name the community after this grand tree.
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Rough Harbour	A synonym of the non-racist definition of savage, keeping the weather conditions of the bay in mind.
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Safe Harbour	Although I do not reside in this area, I have family that owns a third-generation cottage there. The word “safe” conjures up feelings of peace, comfort, and calms your soul. This beautiful place does exactly that.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Salvage Harbour	There have been many shipwrecks and equipment salvaged.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Salvage Harbour	Salvage means rescue (a wrecked or disabled ship or its cargo) from loss at sea. There are well-known and documented shipwrecks, particularly George N. Orr, off

		<p>our coastline. The Savage Harbour community had saved many lives and harboured individuals for many days from these shipwrecks. Salvage also means to save something from harm or ruin. Well, our community name “Savage Harbour” has been deemed discriminatory or derogatory and is in the process of renaming. Renaming it “Salvage Harbour”, will remove this suggested discriminatory/derogatory name, yet save as much of our loved and respected community name as possible with pride and honour. Our community is all of these! Thank you for considering my suggested name “Salvage Harbour” .</p>
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Sandbar Cove	The area is known for its increasing sandbars over the years.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Sandy Harbour	It would be attractive to Island visitors.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Sark Harbour	Name would honour John Joe Sark.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Savvy Harbour	Savvy means shrewd, knowledgeable, common sense, good judgment, and to understand. Our community is all of these and we've been tested so much throughout the past year. Plus, with this insulting awareness, approach, and now with this process of renaming our community of Savage Harbour.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Seacroft Harbour	The word “Sea” represents the fishers and the determination and grit that it took to work in stormy weather and difficult conditions to propel the industry forward for generations. The word “Croft” means an enclosed field or land and in the past referenced small farms which were a strong

		part of our history and continue to exist today. Many community members support each other in each of those areas as well as in their daily lives. During various discussions prior to any of the meetings, a number of people expressed a desire to use the letter "S" and to keep the name Harbour in our renaming. I also feel it is important that the name flow well and, in this case, it has the same number of syllables as Savage Harbour. Although I am submitting this name for the community and road, "Seacroft Bay" could work for the bay as well because the bay is enclosed on many sides by the land.

Resident of Savage Harbour	Shoal Harbour	Name describes the harbour as the water is shallow at times in the harbour and the fishers have to plan their trips back in with the tides.

Resident of Savage Harbour	Shoal Harbour	A place where sea, river or bay is shallow. As witnessed by all the trouble our fishers have navigating our coast, shore, and bay.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Solace Harbour	Solace is a noun meaning comfort or consolation in a time of distress or sadness. As a verb, solace means to give comfort or consolation.
Resident of Savage Harbour	Spear Harbour	The name “Spear Harbour” evokes strength, unity, and a deep connection to both land and water. It is a perfect reflection of a thriving, resilient community. “Spear” symbolizes vision, purpose, and forward momentum, representing the community’s drive to move boldly into the future. “Harbour” conveys safety, belonging, and togetherness, a welcoming place where people find refuge, connection, and growth. Together, Spear Harbour tells a powerful story; a place where determination meets harmony, where innovation is anchored in community, and where every resident can feel both love and empowerment. It is a name that stands tall, inspires pride, and invites all who hear it to become part of something enduring and strong.

It honours both their ancestors and the nation’s journey toward reconciliation, showing that true strength lies not in refusing change but in shaping it with dignity. Though the name changes, the heart of the place, its unity, memory, and endurance, remains unbreakable.

I have lived on PEI my whole life and have honestly never equated "Savage Harbour" as being derogatory to our Indigenous communities. I never knew the true origin of the name. I always thought the name came from the dangerous surf conditions during a nor'easter storm or other bad weather events. I always loved the name for that reason, as I love a good storm and the power of Mother Nature and

		the force of water. For that reason, my name suggestion is “Whitecap Harbour”. I wanted to try to keep that meaning of storms, bad surf conditions, shipwrecks, etc., and honour Mother Nature and her power.
Resident of PEI outside Savage Harbour	Wiaggalmyltidig Gomuti	“Wiaggalmyltidig” (variety of inhabits/different unrelated people) and “Gomuti” (harbour/haven), to correct and unify a more politically correct direction from prior events throughout history
Resident of Savage Harbour	Wild Harbour	While Savage Harbour has been a proud name for generations, reflecting the strength and endurance of its people, the shift to “Wild Harbour” offers a chance to reframe that legacy in a way that feels more aligned with today’s values and language. “Wild” still captures the raw, elemental nature of the coast, but with a tone that’s more inviting, poetic, and reflective of the community’s deep connection to the land and sea. That night, Savage Harbour was fierce, strong, stubborn, and won against the wildest of wilds, because we stood together.
