PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND ECONOMIC REVIEW 1982 TO 1983

The **Tenth Annual Statistical Review** presents an economic commentary on the provincial situation for the calendar year 1983. In some instances, complete data were not available at the time of publication and some reliance on preliminary statistics was necessary.

1. Population, Labour Force, Employment and Unemployment

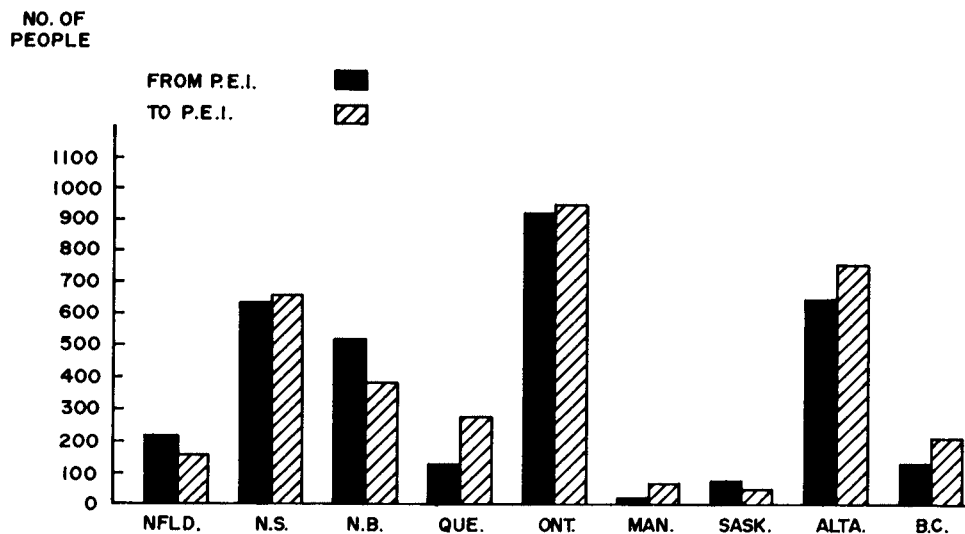
a) Population

The population of Prince Edward Island is estimated to have been 124,000 June 1, 1983 according to Statistics Canada. This represents an increase of almost 1.0 per cent over 1982, and is a significant improvement compared to the previous year when population growth was only 0.2 per cent. The natural increase in population in 1983 was approximately 1,000 and was bolstered by net immigration so that by year-end the overall increase in population was 1,200. Prior to 1983, Prince Edward Island experienced four consecutive years of net outmigration wherein cumulative net outmigration totalled 2,316. Movement to Alberta was significant in those years.

Diagram 1 illustrates gross population flows between Prince Edward Island and the other provinces for the time period June 1982 to May 1983. The largest net flow of immigration to Prince Edward Island in this period came from Quebec and Alberta; the largest loss resulted from net outmigration to New Brunswick and Newfoundland.

b) Labour Force, Employment and Unemployment

Labour force data for Canada have recently been revised to accord with the 1981 Census results and statistics described in this section are not consistent with data contained in previous Statistical Reviews.

The population of Prince Edward Island 15 years and over, defined as the working age population, increased by 1.1 per cent between 1982 and 1983 to average 91,000 for 1983. The size of the monthly labour force grew by 5.8 per cent to number 55,000 in 1983. This unusually large increase in the labour force is due to the combined growth of the working age population, and increased labour force participation, following the economic decline of 1982. In 1983, the participation rate exceeded the 1982 rate of 57.8 per cent by 2.4 percentage points and is in part the result of strong employment gains in 1983.

Employment, measured on a monthly basis, averaged 48,000 in 1983, an increase of approximately 6.7 per cent and this is in marked contrast to the previous year when the employment level declined by 2,000, due to the economic recession. During 1983, Prince Edward Island experienced the highest rate of employment growth of any province, resulting in an employment level that exceeded the province's pre-recession peak by 2.1 per cent.

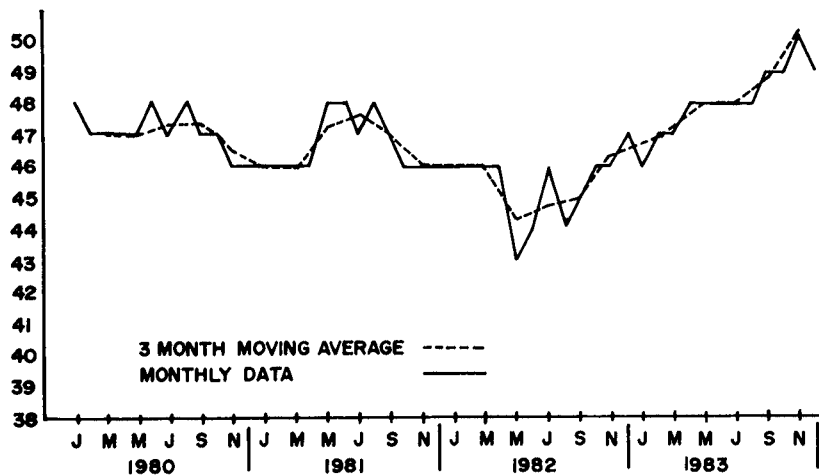
Data that is seasonally adjusted permits monthly comparisons and as illustrated in Diagram 2 employment increased throughout 1983 rising from about 44,000 in mid-1982 to 49,000 by the end of 1983.

Unemployment on Prince Edward Island during 1983 averaged 7,000 per month for the second consecutive year. The average unemployment rate, however, declined to 12.2 per cent from 12.9 per cent in 1982, in view of the significant employment gains in 1983.

2. Inflation and Personal Income

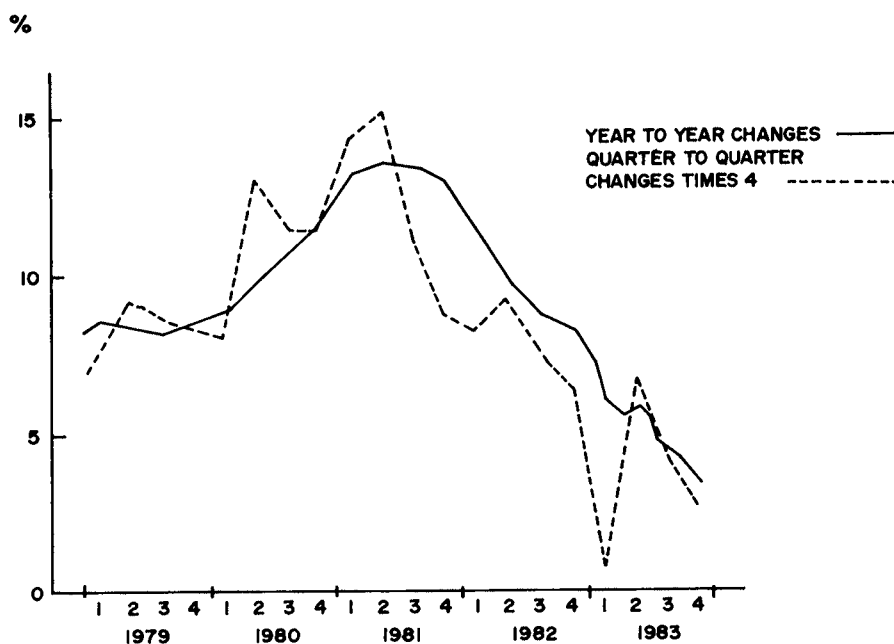
a) Prices

Increases in consumer prices continued to slow throughout 1983 on Prince Edward Island following the trend of 1982, producing an average annual increase in the Consumer Price Index for Charlottetown — Summerside in 1983 of 5.1 per cent. This compares favourably with the 5.8 per cent increase recorded for Canada in 1983 and is down considerably from the price increase of 9.5 recorded for Charlottetown-Summerside in 1982. The major factor contributing to the improved price performance in 1983 was the slow down in escalation of energy costs, which increased 6.0 per cent compared to 20.1 per cent in 1982, and a mere 1.4 per cent increase in food prices compared to 4.8 per cent in 1982. Housing prices, measured on an annual basis, also increased at a decreasing rate, from 11.6 per cent in 1982 to 5.2 per cent in 1983. Consumer prices for clothing increased by only 4.0 per cent in 1983.

Quarterly movements in consumer prices for Charlottetown-Summerside are presented in Diagram 3 together with annual percentage changes by month. The quarter by quarter changes indicate that the decline in price inflation fell dramatically from the second quarter of 1981 to a trough in the first quarter of 1983, after which point price movements have been somewhat erratic.

b) Personal Income

Estimates of total personal income for Prince Edward Island are available to 1982 and are estimated to have valued \$1,094 million. This represents an increase of 12.2 per cent over the 1981 figure of \$975 million and compares to a 10.0 per cent increase in personal income for Canada in 1982. On a per capita basis, personal income in the Province increased from \$7,927 in 1981 to \$8,894 in 1982 - an increase of 12.2 per cent. As a proportion of Canada's per capita income personal income in Prince Edward Island increased from 67.1 per cent of Canadian per capita income to 69.3 per cent between 1981 and 1982, but it still remained below the 71.0 per cent achieved in 1978. Comparing growth of personal income with increases in consumer prices indicates that real incomes increased in 1980 by 4.5 per cent, declined in 1981 by 2.7 per cent and grew by 2.5 per cent in 1982.

Personal income received as Interest, Dividends, and Investment Income has expanded rapidly in recent years and 1982 is no exception. As a consequence of high interest rates this component of personal income increased by 15.3 per cent in 1982. An area of weakness in personal income in 1982 for the second consecutive year was Net Income of Farm Operators which declined to \$27 million from \$45 million in 1981, largely as a result of weak potato prices. Net Income of Farm Operators is expected, however, to reach about \$82 million in 1983 due to strong increases in potato prices.

Complete data on personal income are not available for 1983 but its largest component Wages, Salaries, and Supplementary Labour Income is estimated to have increased at an annual rate of 11.6 per cent in the first nine months of 1983. This component of personal income valued \$580 million in 1982 and is expected to reach approximately \$650 million in 1983. Coupled with fishing and farm income gains in 1983 this points to generally strong income improvements for Prince Edward Island for the year.

3. Gross Domestic Product and Expenditures

a) Gross Domestic Product

The value of Gross Domestic Product at Market Prices for Prince Edward Island is estimated to have been \$990 million in 1982, which represents an increase of 12.0 per cent over 1981. This growth rate significantly outpaced the Canadian rate of 5.1 per cent in 1982. Growth of provincial GDP is compared with national GDP from 1971 to 1982 in Diagram 4. During 1980 and 1981 growth rates of 12.3 per cent and 15.0 per cent, respectively, were realized for Canada compared to growth rates of 7.3 and 12.0 per cent for P.E.I. As a proportion of total Gross Domestic Product in Canada, the province's Gross Domestic Product increased from 0.25 per cent in 1981 to 0.27 per cent in 1982.

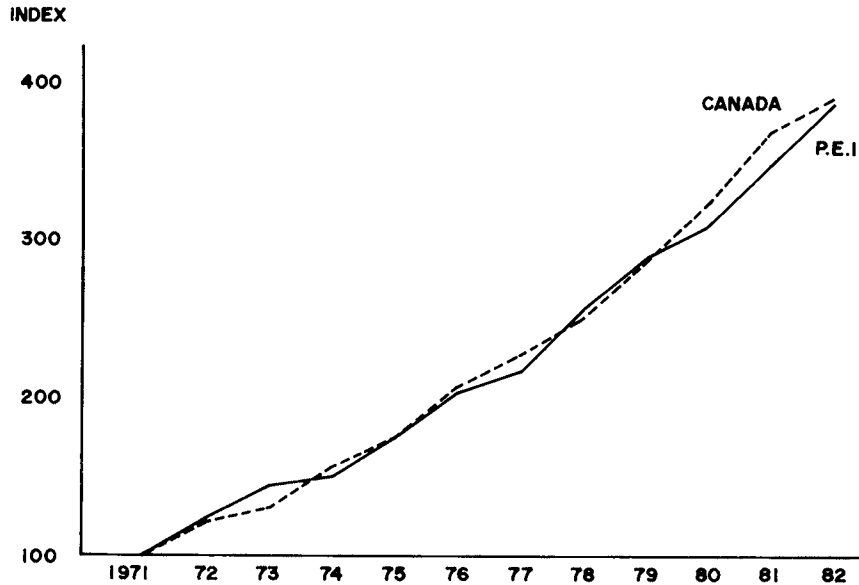
Estimates of Gross Domestic Product in constant dollars for Prince Edward Island, available from the Conference Board of Canada, indicate that a decline of 2.0 per cent occurred in 1982, followed by an increase of 2.8 per cent in 1983. For Canada, the Conference Board estimates a decline of 4.7 per cent for GDP in constant dollars in 1982 and an increase of 2.2 per cent in 1983.

b) Gross Provincial Expenditures

Gross Provincial Expenditures consist of total consumer spending, business investment, government expenditures, and net exports in a specific time period. Adding back net imports provides an estimate of total Final Expenditures. These Final Expenditures totalled \$1,387 million for Prince Edward Island in 1982. Consumer expenditures on goods and services accounted for 60 per cent of Final Expenditures; 28 per cent was government spending; and, 13.3 per cent was composed of gross fixed capital investment. The latter expenditure consists of government investment (4.8 per cent) and private business investment (8.5 per cent).

Despite increased incomes in 1982, as described previously, total Final Expenditures grew by only 8.8 per cent. Consumer spending on goods and services increased by 8.6 per cent and gross fixed capital formation by business increased marginally by 0.8 per cent. This was seriously affected by the decline of 30.3 per cent in expenditures on new housing construction. Current expenditures by government increased by 5.7 per cent. It is evident that spending in 1982 was seriously hampered by high interest rates and a poor economic situation generally.

Evidence of an upturn in consumer spending in 1983 is reflected in retail trade statistics which indicate an increase of 11.9 per cent. The number of new motor vehicle sales totalled 5,315; a gain of 41.5 per cent over the number of units sold in 1982. Housing starts numbered 673 in 1983, compared to 248 in 1982. Non-residential capital spending also strengthened in 1983 such that overall public and private investment on new construction and new machinery and equipment increased 18.6 per cent.

Tourist expenditures on Prince Edward Island increased from \$49.5 million in 1982 to \$50.1 million in 1983 despite a slight decline in the number of tourists visiting the Province. Tourist visitation in 1983 is estimated at 220,590 tourist parties a decrease of 1.5 per cent from 1982.

4. Sector Detail

a) Agriculture

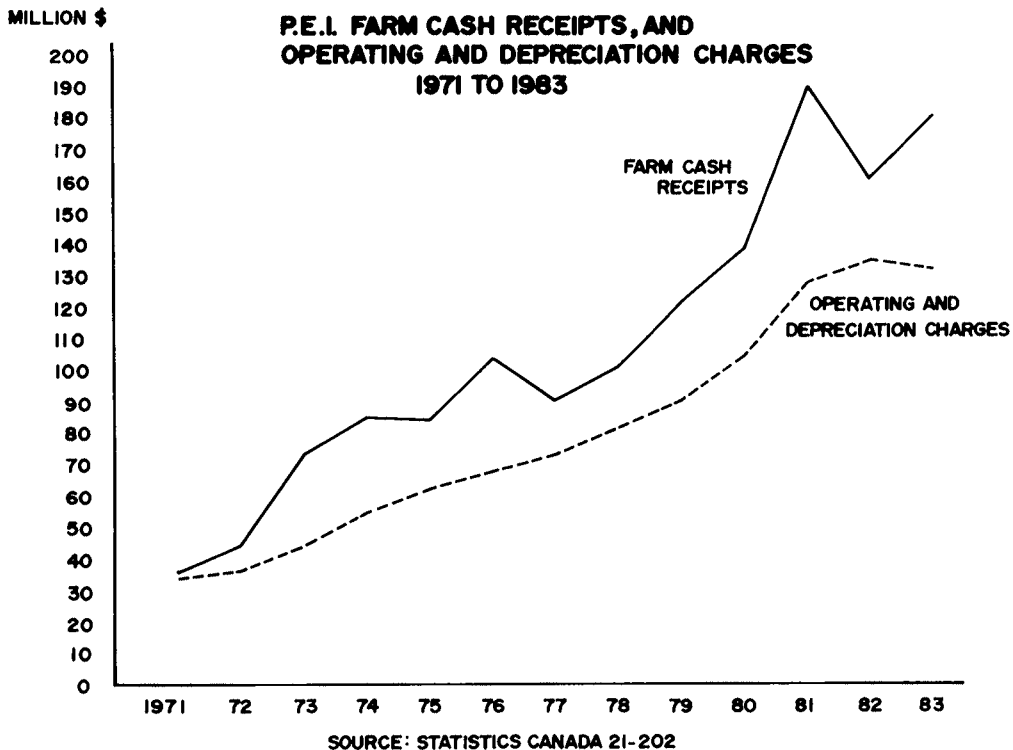
At the time of publication only preliminary estimates of farm cash receipts were available for 1983 and these statistics are subject to significant revisions. The following section uses Statistics Canada's earlier released projected figures which are considered more reliable.

Projected farm cash receipts for 1983 are estimated to value approximately \$181.2 million, which is a 12.3 per cent increase over the 1982 value of \$161.4 million. Farm cash receipts from the sale of potatoes dominate total cash receipts, and account for 39.5 per cent of the total. Statistics Canada estimates that farm cash receipts from the sale of potatoes in 1983 valued \$71.7 million, a sharp increase from the \$52.2 million recorded for 1982. The number of acres cultivated with potatoes in 1983 increased by about 1.5 per cent to 70 thousand and the volume harvested is estimated to be 17.5 million cwt, compared to 18.1 million cwt in 1982. While the volume of potato production declined in 1983 the projected value of the potato harvest is over \$100 million, the highest farm value on record, on account of strong potato prices in late 1983 and early 1984.

Most other major farm products suffered declines in the value of cash receipts in 1983. The sale of dairy products was valued at an estimated \$26.2 million in 1983, a decrease of 10.9 per cent from 1982, reflecting reduced production levels in the order of 11.4 per cent. The value of hog sales declined by 14.5 per cent in 1983 and was a combination of lower production and prices. Receipts from beef sales, however, increased by 1.2 per cent in 1983 due to a greater number of slaughterings. Given the overall decline in the volume of agricultural output, employment averaged 5,000 per month in 1983 compared to 6,000 in 1982 (rounded to nearest thousand).

Diagram 5 illustrates for a thirteen year period the level of farm cash receipts for P.E.I. and operating costs and depreciation charges associated with farm operations. Realized net farm income increased from \$28.2 million in 1982 to \$51.2 million in 1983. This increase of about 82.0 per cent is largely attributable to the strong gains made in the value of potato sales in 1983, and a 2.3 per cent decline in projected operating costs and depreciation charges.

b) Fishing

The value of fish landings increased by 24.6 per cent in 1983, to reach \$44.1 million, largely because of gains in the value of the lobster catch. In 1983, lobster accounted for 66.0 per cent of the total value of the fish catch on Prince Edward Island and the value of lobster landed in the year was \$29.1 million. In terms of volumes, gains were largest for lobster, 26.9 per cent, followed by increases in the pelagic and estuarial species of 14.4 per cent. Groundfish landings improved throughout the year by 6.3 per cent and Irish moss volumes declined by 15.6 per cent. The volume of lobster landed in 1983, 15.5 million lbs., was an all time record for the Province. Total fish landings in 1983 increased 2.8 per cent over the 1982 catch of 113.1 million pounds to total 116.3 million pounds.

c) Manufacturing

Prince Edward Island's manufacturing industry is dominated by the processing of farm and fish products. Available statistics show that the value of production in manufacturing, measured by Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost declined from \$66.8 million in 1980 to \$63.0 million in 1983. As a percent of the total Gross Domestic Product, manufacturing declined to 7.2 per cent in 1981 from 8.3 per cent one year earlier, according to the latest data available from Statistics Canada.

The current dollar value of manufactured goods shipped in 1983 is estimated to be \$275.2 million, an increase of 7.5 per cent over the weak performance of 1982 when shipments increased by only 3.2 per cent. A revival in production in many sub sectors of manufacturing in 1983 has been clouded by reduced activity at Canada Packers as well as reduced dairying. Employment in the manufacturing sector declined in 1982, but according to the Labour Force Survey, employment in manufacturing returned to its 1981 level of 4,000 in 1983.

d) Construction

Construction activity improved in 1983 as evidenced by the number of residential building permits issued. These permits increased by nearly 78.0 per cent and housing starts grew by 171.4 per cent, to number 673 for the entire calendar year. This sizeable increase was somewhat counterbalanced by a virtually static situation with respect to non-residential construction. The value of non-residential building permits issued for 1983 totalled \$42 million.

The Gross Domestic Product for construction is estimated to have valued \$46.4 million in 1981 making it the province's third largest goods producing industry, after agriculture and manufacturing. This sector employed approximately 3,000 in 1983.

e) Transportation, Utilities, and Commercial Services

This sector covers a diverse number of economic activities including all modes of transportation, communications, utilities, accommodation and food services, entertainment and miscellaneous commercial services, finance, insurance and real estate, and retail and wholesale trade. In transportation, passenger traffic to and from P.E.I. by ferry increased by 4.2 per cent between 1982 and 1983. Truck and trailer traffic increased by 8.8 per cent but rail freight movements declined by 5.8 per cent. The number of passengers travelling to and from Prince Edward Island by air declined by 13.1 per cent between 1982 and 1983.

The generation of local electrical power declined 67.1 per cent in 1983 compared to 1982. Electricity received from other provinces in 1983 increased by 9.1 per cent to support increased total supply of electrical power of 3.9 per cent. Imported electricity formed 97.9 per cent of total supply in 1983.

Although the tourist season suffered a 1.5 per cent decline in visitation in 1983 total tourist expenditures were \$50.1 million, a 1.2 per cent increase over 1982. Additional expenditure growth in retail trade, spin-offs from increased housing starts, construction on the Convention Centre, improvements to the Charlottetown Airport, and the relocation of Veterans Affairs contributed to general gains in trade and commer-

cial services in 1983. The total number of individuals employed in industries reviewed in this section were estimated to be about 21,000 in 1983.

f) Non-Commercial Services and Government Services

The major components of non-commercial services are Health and Education. Statistics Canada estimates of Gross Domestic Product for P.E.I. indicate that in 1981 Hospital Services valued \$30.3 million and Education Services \$79.5 million, to total 12.5 per cent of the Gross Domestic Product in that year. Unfortunately, recent information on non-commercial services is limited but available data suggest that no significant changes took place in 1983. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, employment in non-commercial services was 6,500 March to December, 1983.

Employment in Provincial Administration as of December 1983 was 3,521, a decline from 3,599 recorded in 1982. Federal government employment in the Province increased, on average, by 142 to total 3,983 in 1983, according to Statistics Canada.

Total expenditures by all levels of government excluding intergovernmental transfers, amounted to \$839 million in 1982 which represents a 7.7 per cent increase over the previous year. Federal spending on P.E.I. equalled \$650 million, an increase of 8.0 per cent, and expenditures by provincial and local levels of government in P.E.I. increased by 12.1 per cent to total \$398 million in 1982. Federal transfers to the Province amounted to \$209 million in 1982. Total government revenues by all levels of government grew by 8.1 per cent to total \$361 million in 1982. The overall Governments' deficit was \$478 million in 1982, an increase of 7.4 per cent from the previous year.

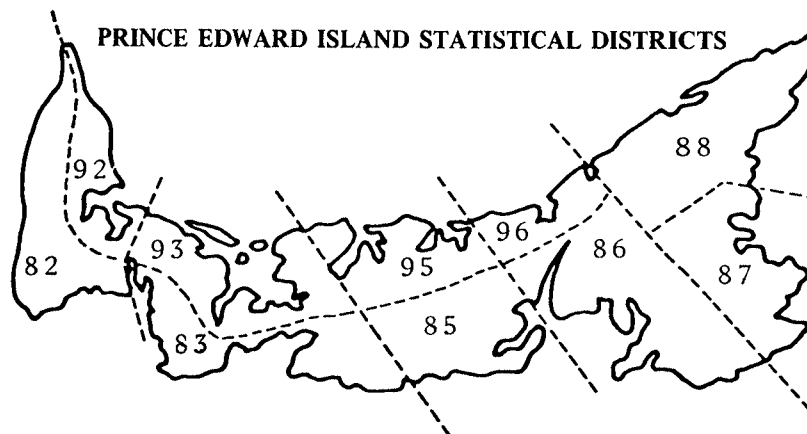
