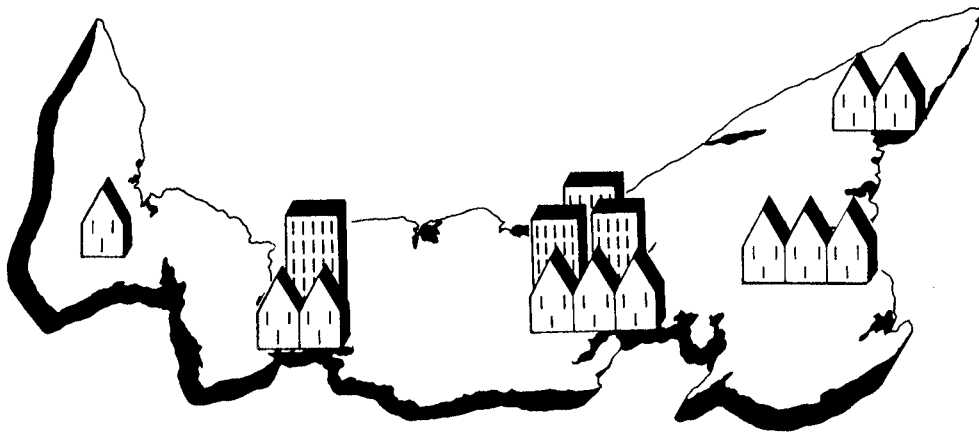



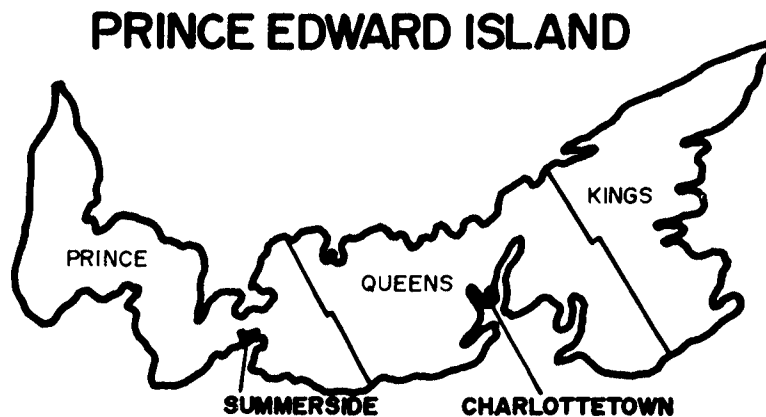

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PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND ECONOMIC REVIEW 1983 TO 1984

The **Eleventh Annual Statistical Review** presents a commentary on the provincial economy for the year 1984. Most of the statistics referred to are to be found in tables displayed later in the Review. In some instances complete data were not available at the time of publication, and also some data are preliminary and subject to revision. Consequently a number of references to statistics are subject to possible amendment.

1. Population, Labour Force, Employment and Unemployment

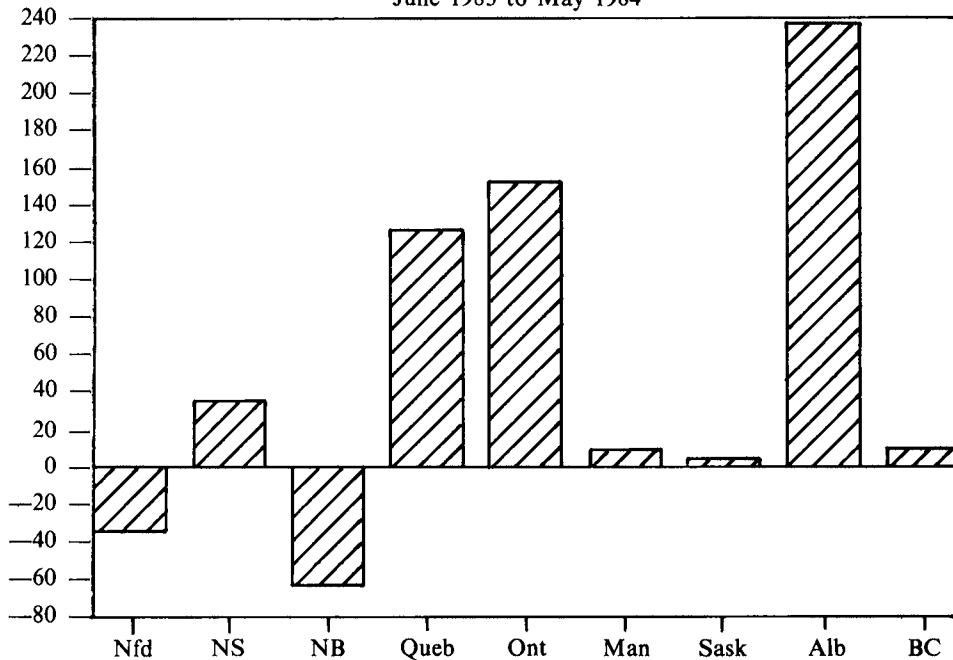
(a) Population

The postcensal estimates of population for Prince Edward Island indicate that population growth quickened during 1984 as there were significant gains from net immigration. At June 1984 the Island population stood at 125,300, an increase of 1.1 per cent over 1983. Births numbered 1,910, deaths 1,040, for a natural increase of 870. Net immigration was 530. The major factor behind the net immigration appears to have been movement of people from Alberta. Diagrams 1(a), 1(b) and 1(c) display population movement, by Province. The pace of population growth on Prince Edward Island speeded up during the course of the year, with 125,900 on Prince Edward Island October 1, 1984.

June 1983 to May 1984

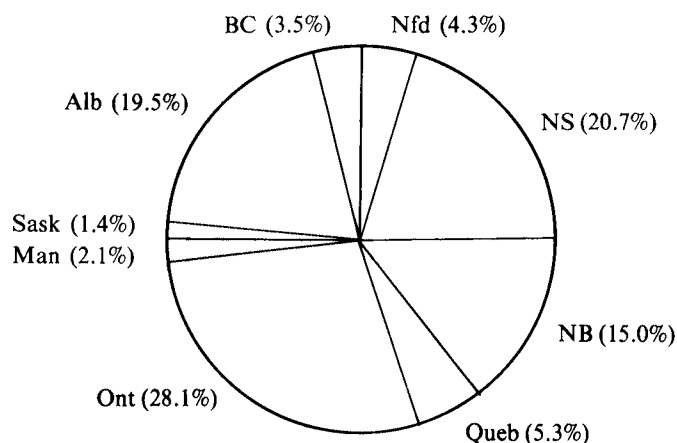
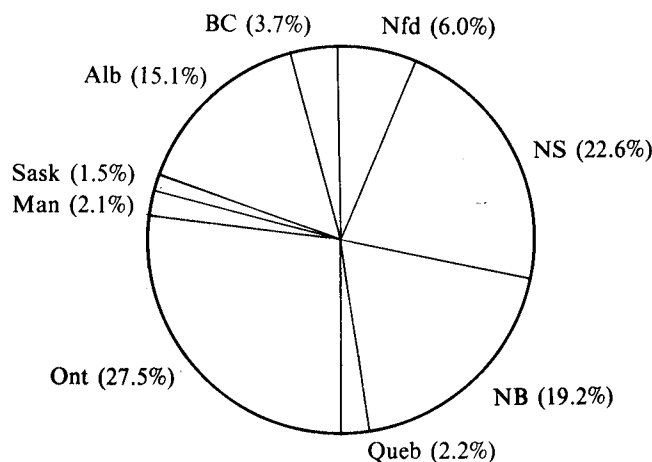

June 1983 to May 1984



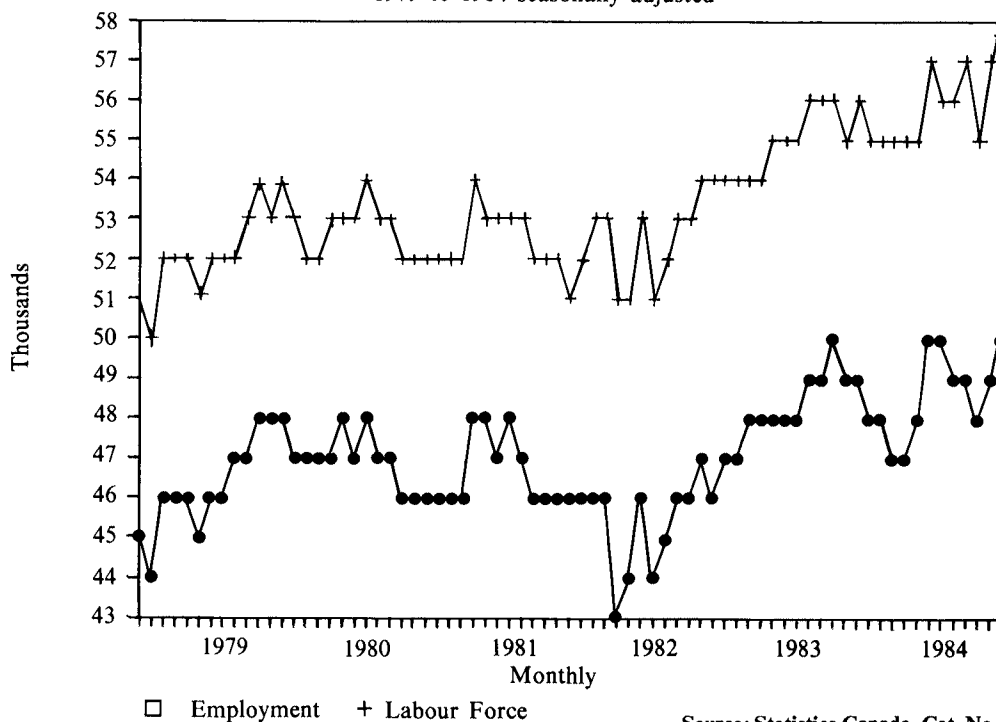
(b) Labour Force, Employment and Unemployment

In line with the acceleration in growth of total population for Prince Edward Island, the population 15 years and above also increased rapidly during 1984, to measure 93,000 per month, compared to 91,000 in 1983. These gains are in contrast to the slow population growth witnessed during the past four years. The participation rate held steady at 60.2 per cent in 1984 and consequently the labour force measured 56,000, compared to 55,000 in 1983. The unemployment rate averaged 12.8 per cent in 1984 compared to 12.2 per cent in 1983, as employment gains did not keep pace with labour force gains.

In fact, employment growth in 1984 was very weak following the strong gains of 1983. As Diagram 2 shows, monthly employment in 1984 was only barely above levels achieved in the second half of 1983. The major factors at work to slow gains appear to have been declines in employment in the manufacturing and construction sectors, both of which industries experienced a difficult period in 1984.

2. Inflation and Personal Income

(a) Prices

The average increase in the Consumer Price Index for Charlottetown-Summerside in 1984 was 4.3 per cent, which compares with 5.1 per cent in 1983.

The above table provides a comparison of consumer price inflation in 1984 with 1981, when inflation was at its peak. In that year the Charlottetown-Summerside consumer price index increased by 13.5 per cent. One can see declines in the rate of increase for all major items. Clearly the moderation in increase in energy prices has been the most important aspect of this decline. Yet increases in energy prices continued to dominate price movements in 1984. In September 1984, fuel oil prices on Prince Edward Island were up by 4.7 per cent over September 1983; electricity prices were up by 7.5 per cent; gasoline prices were up by 4.0 per cent; and energy prices in total were up by 5.1 per cent that month.

(b) Personal Income

The most recent estimate of personal income for Prince Edward Island from Statistics Canada is for 1983 although there is enough material to provide a preliminary judgement on income growth in 1984. The estimate for 1983 values \$1,247 million, an increase of 13.4 per cent over 1982. This compares with national growth in personal income of 6.2 per cent, and was far in excess of income growth in any other province. New Brunswick was a distant second at 9.4 per cent. In per capita terms, personal income on Prince Edward Island reach 74.3 per cent of the national average in 1983, easily breakign the previous peak of 71.0 per cent achieved in 1978.

The reasons for this large gain are several; employment increased rapidly generating rapid gains to labour income; farm and fish incomes did exceptionally well; transfer payments to persons increased by 15.8 per cent, in large measure because unemployment insurance payments grew by 18.4 per cent.

Available data on personal income in 1984 indicate that a distinct slow down in growth occurred following the rapid gains of 1983. Its largest component, Wages, Salaries and Supplementary Labour Income increased at an annual rate of about 5.0 per cent, compared to 11 per cent in 1983. This slow-down is attributable to the weak employment picture in 1984 and the minor increases in average weekly wages and salaries per worker. In addition, both farm and fish incomes declined in 1984. Transfer payments to persons continued to expand however as unemployment insurance payments increased significantly.

3. Gross Domestic Product and Expenditures

(a) Gross Domestic Product

Gross Domestic Product at Market Prices is estimated to have been \$1,198 million in 1983, the most recent year that official figures are available. This represents growth of 15.3 per cent over 1982, and compares with 8.9 per cent for Canadian GNP. The value of GDP for Prince Edward Island has been revised upwards significantly in all recent years in view of a change in treatment of oil import subsidies.

Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost in Constant Dollars for Prince Edward Island is estimated by the Conference Board of Canada, and they estimate that the growth in the Prince Edward Island economy in 1983 by that measure was 5.7 per cent, the highest of any province that year. Information for 1984 suggest a distinct slowdown occurred in 1984, and this is in line with the slow gains to employment and incomes described earlier. The Conference Board estimates growth of only 2 per cent for Prince Edward Island in 1984.

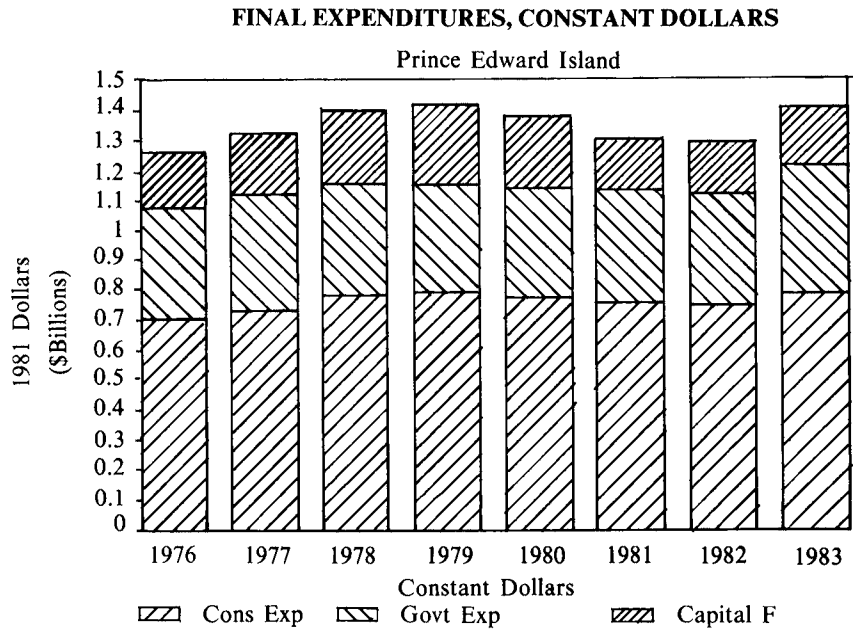
(b) Gross Provincial Expenditures

The combined value of personal expenditures, government spending on capital and goods and services, and business investment, was \$1,649 million in 1983. These Final Expenditures increased by 17.4 per cent that year and this strengthened the recovery greatly. This was apparent in such aspects of spending as increased retailing, housing construction and federal employment. The pattern of spending in aggregate 1976-1983, is shown in Diagram 3, in constant dollars. The economic slow down and recession that occurred in 1980-1982 was deeply seated in reduced expenditure activity in contrast to significant income gains in the past few years. The pattern of growth of personal income and personal expenditures is shown in Diagram 4.

For 1984 the statistical evidence on spending is mixed. Consumer spending appeared to remain strong as retail activity increased by about 11 per cent (or 6.3 per cent in constant dollars). Yet housing construction faltered, particularly towards year end and non-residential construction activity was below the level of 1983. The overall level of investment in public and private construction and machinery equipment was forecast to have been \$280.9 million in 1984, compared to \$292.2 million in 1983.

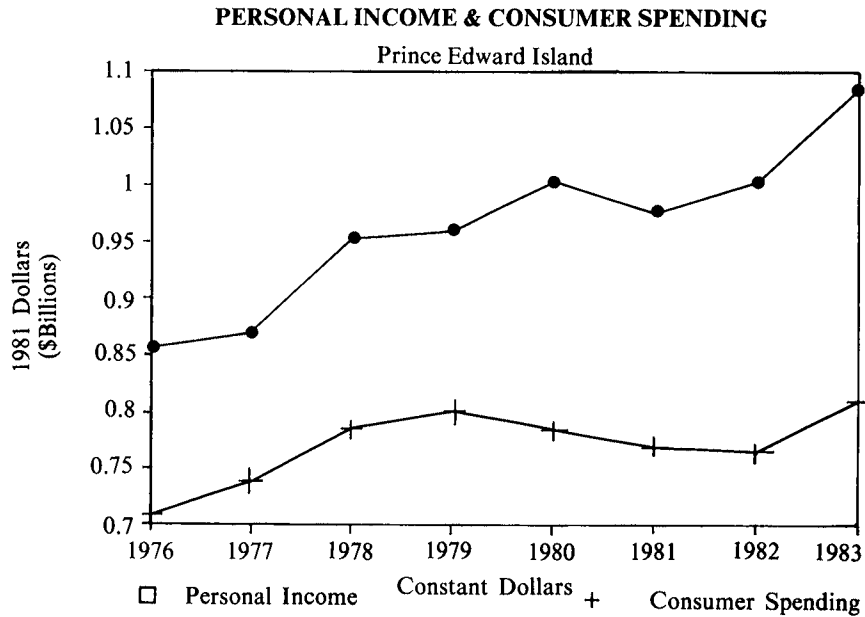
In line with improved consumer confidence in Canada and the U.S.A. generally in 1984, tourist visitation improved on Prince Edward Island. Total auto and air parties visiting Prince Edward Island increased by 4.6 per cent over 1983. Total non-resident tourist expenditures in 1984 are estimated to have been \$54 million compared to \$50 million in 1983.

4. Sector Detail

(a) Agriculture

Statistics on cash receipts from the value of sale of farm products are notorious for large future revisions, but the preliminary estimate for 1984 is \$186.7 million, an increase of 6 per cent over 1983. This figure is dominated by potato markets as the value of potato sales forms nearly 40 per cent of all farm cash receipts. The yearly sale of potatoes is comprised of sales of the previous year's potatoes January-July and then the sale of part of the current year's harvest August-December. The estimated value of the 1983 harvest is \$103 million, the highest in Island history and this had a positive impact on sales in the first half of 1984. It also led to a record volume harvest of 19 million cwt in 1984 on plantings of 72,000 acres.

The value of sales in the later months of 1984 was sharply down as prices fell, and the total value of sales for the year was \$71 million, an increase of about 10 per cent over 1983.

The dairy sector is Prince Edward Island's second largest farming activity with sales in 1984 of \$28.9 million, up by 11 per cent over 1983. The volume of milk and cream produced increased marginally to 98,000 kilolitres from 97,232 kilolitres in 1983, although this is substantially below the levels of production achieved in 1981 and 1982.

Hog production reached a record high level in 1984 as 174,850 hogs were slaughtered. This reflects the large number of pigs on farms at 122,000 in July. Pork prices improved marginally in 1984 and total cash receipts from hog sales valued \$22.5 million. Cash receipts from beef production declined to \$19.4 million in 1984 from \$24.1 million in 1983 largely due to a lower volume of slaughtering.

The overall volume of production from the agricultural sector reached an all time peak in 1984, although farm product prices were generally weak, resulting in reduced net incomes in the latter half of the year. Total employment in agriculture increased to 6,000 in 1984.

(b) Fishing

Comparisons of the fish harvest in 1984 with 1983 can be misleading because the 1983 situation was characterized by record harvests at record prices. The value of the total fish harvest in 1984 is estimated at \$37.8 million, compared to \$44.1 million in 1983, a decline of 14.3 per cent. Lobster is the dominant species, forming 61 per cent of the total value of fish landings. The volume of lobster landed in 1984, at 13.6 million pounds, was 12 per cent below that of 1983. This still represented the second highest volume of lobster ever landed on Prince Edward Island. Other fish species also declined, but Irish Moss landings increased in 1984, although it contributes only 4 per cent to the value of total fish landings.

(c) Manufacturing

The contribution of manufacturing to the Island economy has been diminishing since 1980 in view of persistent difficulties within its Food and Beverage component, which forms approximately 80 per cent of all manufacturing on Prince Edward Island. In 1980, manufacturing provided about 8.3 per cent of total Gross Domestic Product, and this declined to 6.5 per cent by 1982. Diagram 5 displays statistics on the value of shipments of manufactured goods in Constant dollars, divided between Food and Beverages and other manufacturing.

The current dollar value of shipments of manufactured goods was \$265.9 million in 1984, compared to \$267.4 million in 1983. The major factor affecting manufacturing in 1984 was a serious drop in the value of meat products, as well as a fall in the value of fish products. Other aspects of Prince Edward Island manufacturing appeared to improve although available statistics are limited.

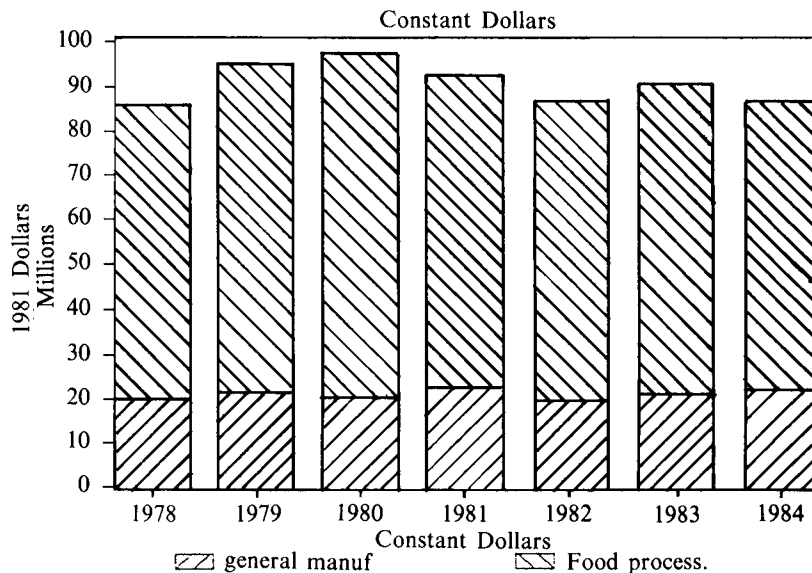
Employment in manufacturing in 1984 was reduced in line with reduced production, to 3,000.

(d) Construction

Construction employment also slipped in 1984 as the value of non-residential construction work declined. In part this was the result of completion of the Prince Edward Island Convention Centre in early 1984, coupled with limited new projects at a major stage during the year.

Total housing starts numbered 643 in 1984, down from 673 in 1983. The value of residential construction improved in 1984 despite this, because a considerable number of apartment buildings were underway.

The overall value of residential and non-residential construction activity was \$170.4 million in 1984, compared to \$181.9 million in 1983. Construction contributed approximately 4.9 per cent to the Island economy in 1982. Employment in this sector was 3,000.

(e) Transportation, Utilities and Commercial Services

Employment in transportation, communications and utilities measured approximately 3,400 in 1984. The movement of vehicles across the ferries increased in 1984 both at Borden and Wood Islands. Total vehicles carried by C.N. Marine were 673,737, an increase of only 0.5 per cent over 1983, and by Northumberland Ferries 203,085, an increase of 8 per cent. Movement on rail cars continued the downward trend of recent years, numbering 10,609. The number of persons travelling by air to and from Prince Edward Island declined for Air Canada and increased for E.P.A., with an overall gain of 10.8 per cent, numbering 140,000. This is still below the level reached in 1981 and 1982.

The total electrical supply on Prince Edward Island increased by 1.7 per cent in the first ten months of 1984. Less than 1 per cent of that was generated on the Island.

Commercial services are taken to include accommodations, restaurants, attractions, services to business, retail and wholesale trade, financial services, entertainment and so on. In aggregate these services employed in the order of 19,000 Islanders in 1984. Largest among them is Retail and Wholesale Trade, with employment of 8,000. The total value of retail trade was \$522 million in 1984, up by 11 per cent over 1983. Motor vehicle dealers sales formed 20 per cent of this amount in 1984. Receipts of caterers, restaurants and taverns increased by 8.3 per cent in the first ten months of 1984 and valued \$3.85 million per month on average. New data available for 1982 from Statistics Canada indicate that Gross Domestic Product attributable to Accommodation and Food Services valued \$31.2 million that year, or about 3.2 per cent of total GDP for Prince Edward Island.

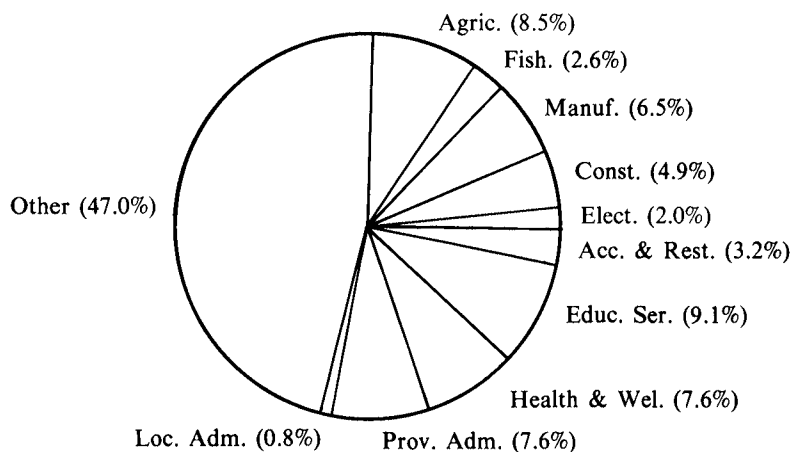
(f) Non-Commercial Services and Government Services

The new data referred to above also contains estimates of Gross Domestic Product for Education, Health and Welfare services, Provincial Administration and Local Administration. These valued \$242 million in total in 1982, forming approximately 25 per cent of total Gross Domestic Product on Prince Edward Island. Of these sectors Education Services is the largest, at \$87 million, which is about 9.1 per cent of the Island's total GDP. This is roughly equivalent to the size of the Agricultural sector, in terms of GDP. Diagram 6 displays the percentage distribution of Gross Domestic Product for those industries for which estimates are provided by Statistics Canada. The "other" consists of missing components such as Retail Trade, Services to Business and Financial Services.

The Health and Education services component of the Prince Edward Island economy has approximately 6,800 employees and available information on Numbers of Employees in these groups in 1984 indicates that total employment was identical to that of 1983. Similarly, available information on provincial employment points to a static situation. By contrast, there were substantial gains in federal employment on Prince Edward Island, which numbered 3,501 per month in the first three quarters of 1984. The total federal payroll on the Island in 1983 was \$80.3 million, which compares to a provincial payroll of \$84.7 million, according to Statistics Canada estimates.

Total expenditures of all levels of government on Prince Edward Island were \$906 million in 1983. Federal spending amounted to \$692 million. The federal "deficit" on Prince Edward Island is estimated at \$-491 million, compared to \$-451 million in 1982. Federal transfers to the provincial government declined from \$208 million to \$203 million. Provincial own source revenues exceeded federal transfers for the first time in post war history in 1983.

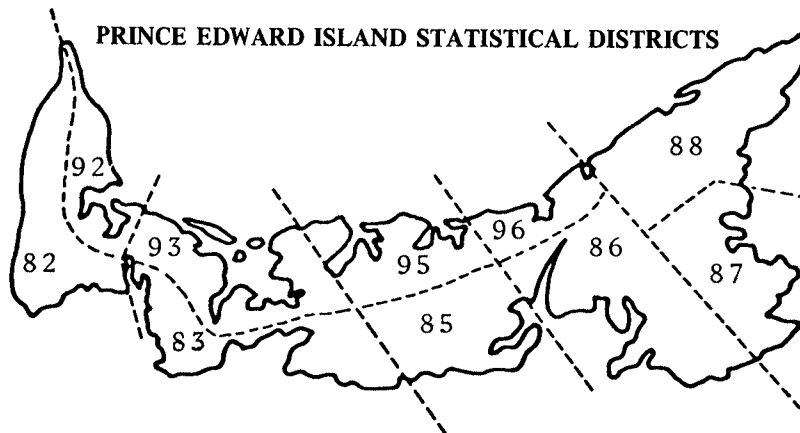
