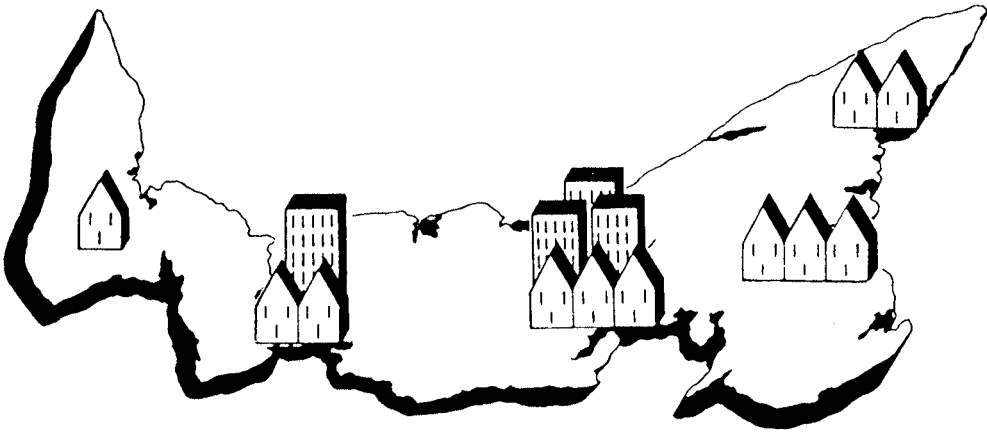



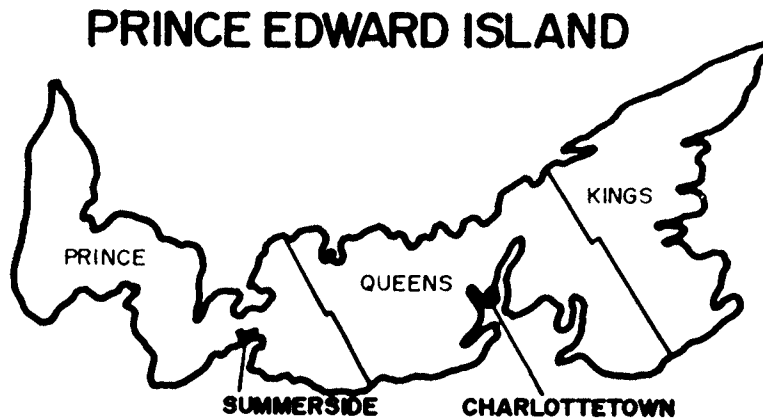

**PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND
ECONOMIC REVIEW 1985**

The Twelfth Annual Statistical Review presents a commentary on the provincial economy for the year 1985. Most of the statistics referred to are to be found in tables displayed later in the Review. In some instances complete data were not available at the time of publications, and also some data are preliminary and subject to revision. Consequently a number of references to statistics are subject to possible amendment.

This edition of the Review presents statistics, for the first time, on provincial international exports in Table 24, and provincial income taxation statistics in Tables 25, 26, 27.

**1. Population, Labour Force, Employment and Unemployment
a) Population**

The population of Prince Edward Island reached a new historical level of 127,400 as of June, 1985. The population's rate of growth, however, slowed to 1.2 per cent, (1,500 people) from 1.3 per cent (1,600 people) in 1984. Net in-migration fell to 623 from 797 in 1984 as gross in-migration increased to 3,940 in 1985 from 3,219 in 1984 and gross out-migration increased to 3,317, up from 2,422 in 1984. Births number 1,946 and deaths 1,100 which resulted in a natural increase in 1985 of 846. Diagrams 1(a), 1(b), and 1(c) depict the movement of people between Prince Edward Island and each of the other nine provinces from June 1984 to May 1985.

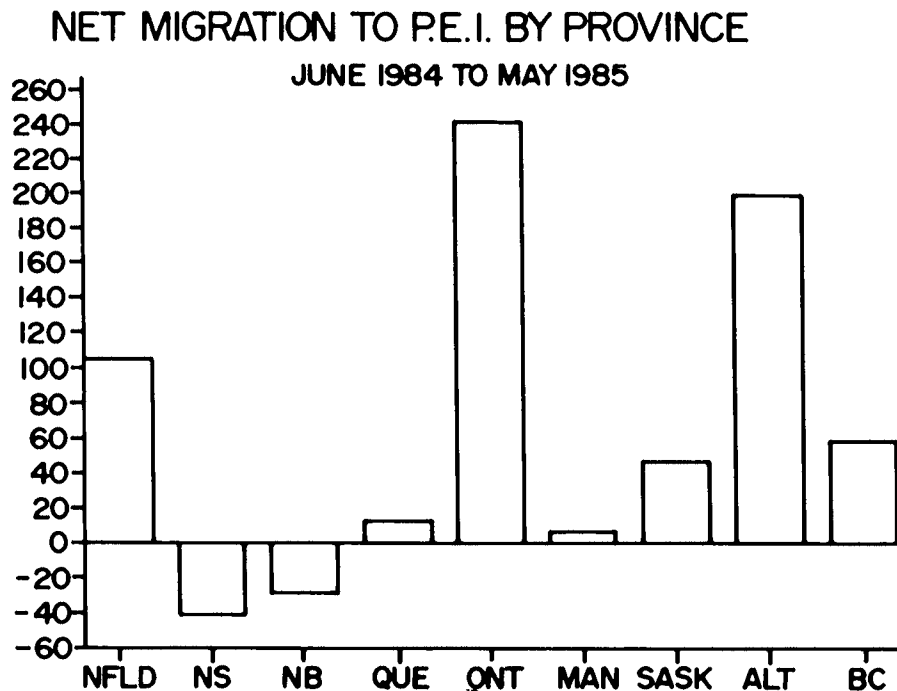

JUNE 1984 TO MAY 1985

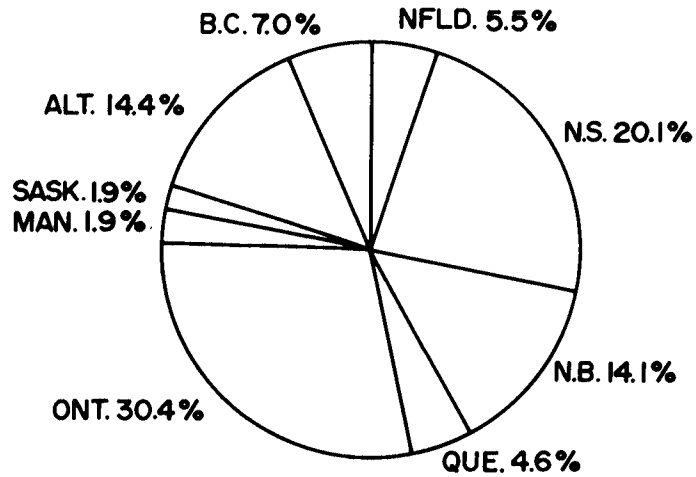
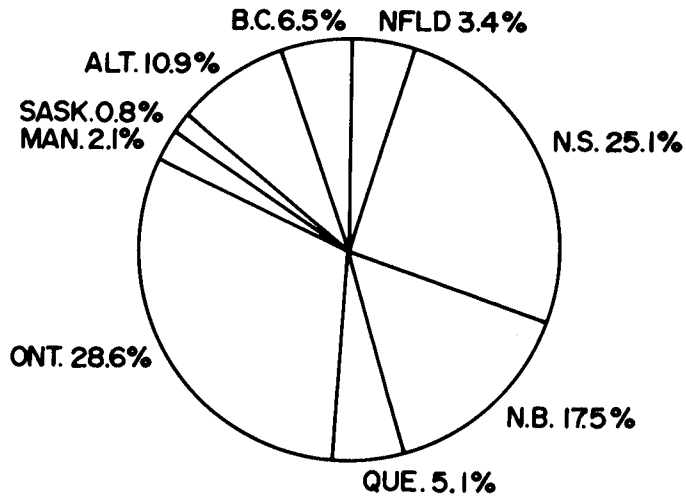

The population's age structure continued its long run trend of becoming older as the proportion of the population aged 0-14 declined to 23.8 per cent in 1985 from 24.0 per cent in 1984 and 24.8 in 1981, while the proportion of the population aged 65 and over continued to rise to 12.6 per cent in 1985 from 12.5 in 1984 and 12.2 in 1981.

b) Labour Force, Employment and Unemployment

The population aged 15 and over increased significantly more than the total population of Prince Edward Island during 1985. The population aged 15 and over grew by 2.3 per cent in 1984 or 2,100 to an average level of 94,600. Given an increase in the participation rate from 60.2 per cent in 1984 to 61.9 per cent in 1985, the labour force numbered 59,000 in 1985 which represents a major expansion (5.7 per cent) over 1984. Employment in P.E.I. in 1985 realized the highest rate of growth in Canada at 5.1 per cent and reached an average level of 51,000. The labour force gains outpaced the strong gains in employment and so the unemployment rate rose to 13.2 per cent in 1985 from 12.8 per cent in 1984.

The gains in employment were largely achieved during the first half of 1985 when seasonally adjusted employment averaged 51,300 and fell off to 50,700 during the second half of 1985. The respective numbers for 1984 were, first half employment, 47,800 and second half employment, 49,200. The following chart demonstrates the average level of employment and labour force, quarterly, for Prince Edward Island from 1980 to 1985.

2. Inflation and Personal Income

a) Prices

For the fourth consecutive year, the average annual rate of inflation, as measured by the average increase in the Consumer Price Index for Charlottetown-Summerside, declined relative to the previous year's rate of inflation. The average increase in the CPI for Charlottetown-Summerside in 1985 was 3.8 per cent, compared to 4.3 per cent in 1984. Furthermore, for the fourth consecutive year, the average increase in the CPI for Charlottetown-Summerside was less than the average increase in the CPI for Canada as the Canadian CPI increased by 4.0 per cent in 1985. The table below provides a comparison of the average annual increases in the Consumer Price Index for Canada and for Charlottetown-Summerside since 1981, when inflation peaked both nationally and provincially.

The table below provides a comparison of the rates of increase in the average prices of each of the major components of the Consumer Price Index for Canada and for Charlottetown-Summerside. Tobacco and Alcohol prices experienced the fastest rate of increase in 1985 while Clothing had the slowest rate of increase.

b) Personal Income

The most recent estimate of personal income for Prince Edward Island from Statistics Canada is for 1984. Personal income in 1984 is estimated at \$1,299 million, an increase of 4.2 per cent over the 1983 level of \$1,247 million. By comparison personal income for the province increased by 13.4 per cent in 1983. The major reasons for this marked slowdown in the growth of personal incomes in 1984 stemmed from declines in the net incomes of farm operators and fishermen that year. The net income of farm operators declined dramatically in 1984 to \$18 million from \$58 million in 1983. The total value of fish landings declined to \$37.8 million from \$44.1 million in 1983. This decline in the value of fish landings led to over-all growth in the net income of unincorporated business of only 2.1 per cent compared to 28.4 per cent growth for this sector in 1983.

The national average per capita income of Canada was \$14,412 in 1984, compared to the average per capita income of Islanders of \$10,200. This represents 71.5 per cent of the national average and compares to 74.3 per cent in 1983. Nationally in 1984 total personal income increased by 7.5 per cent.

Available statistics on personal income for 1985 indicate that the relatively slow gains experienced in 1984 continued as labour income increased by about 4.3 per cent during the first nine months of 1985 and farm income continued to be depressed. By year's end unemployment insurance benefits had reached \$106.9 million, an 8.8 per cent increase over 1984.

In 1983, the most recent year for which taxation statistics are available, the average income per tax filer in Prince Edward Island was \$13,160 with the occupation Doctors and Surgeons averaging the highest incomes at \$77,423. A total of 69,646 individuals filed tax returns for 1983 with 73.6 per cent of these, 51,253, having taxable returns. The number of individuals reporting incomes in excess of \$50,000 in 1983 was 938 compared to 823 in 1982.

3. Gross Domestic Product

a) Gross Domestic Product

Gross Domestic Product at Market Prices is a measure of overall economic activity for the Province similar to the national measure GNP, Gross National Product. Gross Domestic Product at Market Prices in 1984, the most recent year for which statistics are available, was \$1,229 million. This represents a growth rate in current dollars of 2.6 per cent over the 1983 level of \$1198 million. Canada's GNP grew at 8.0 per cent in 1984. The depressed Agriculture and Fisheries sectors of the provincial economy in 1984 contributed significantly to the Island economy's slower growth relative to the nation's overall performance. Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost for P.E.I. grew by 2.3 per cent in 1984 to \$1,134 million.

In 1985, preliminary estimates indicate that Canadian GNP grew by 7.8 per cent in current dollars and 4.5 per cent in constant dollars. The Conference Board of Canada makes estimates of Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost in Constant (1971) Dollars for Provinces and they estimate that for Prince Edward Island it grew by 1.2 per cent in 1985 compared to 4.2 per cent for Canada.

b) Gross Provincial Expenditures

In 1984 consumer and government expenditures on goods and services plus business investment on P.E.I. totalled \$1,775 million. This represents an increase in total expenditures of 7.1 per cent over the 1983 level of \$1,657 million. Consumer expenditures increased by 10.2 per cent to \$1,027 million. Consumer expenditures on goods grew by 10.4 per cent while expenditures on Services grew by 9.9 per cent in 1984. The major factor behind this growth in spending was strong consumer confidence coupled with strong income gains in 1983. Evidence of consumer confidence was found in new motor vehicle sales, housing starts and retail sales. The number of new motor vehicles sold in 1984 rose to 6,308 compared to 5,317 in 1983. Housing starts number 643, down slightly from the 673 recorded in 1983 but up sharply from the 248 starts of 1982. Total retail sales increased by 10.4 per cent in 1984 to value \$521 million while retail sales excluding new motor vehicles increased by 9.3 per cent.

Government expenditures on goods and services grew by 11.8 per cent in 1984 to \$550 million, based partially on the transfer of the federal Department of Veterans Affairs from Ottawa to Charlottetown. Gross fixed capital formation increased by 10.5 per cent to reach \$223.8 million. Government fixed capital formation accounted for \$16 million of the \$21 million increase in total capital formation in 1984. Capital formation in 1985 reached a value of \$246.4 million, up 10.1 per cent over 1984.

The value of international exports from Prince Edward Island to the rest of the world grew by 23.0 per cent to reach a value of \$131 million in 1984. Potato products accounted for 40.0 per cent of all international exports measuring \$52 million in 1984. The United States was the principal country of destination receiving 58.4 per cent of Island exports. Early indications are that exports declined in 1985 given the decline in value of potato sales, and that the proportion of exports shipped to the U.S. rose to 64.9 per cent. Diagrams 3 and 4 below display the pattern of exports by country of destination and by major commodity groups.

For 1985, consumer spending showed signs of continuing improvement as retail sales increased by 6.1 per cent. Most of this growth occurred in the second half of 1985 when retail sales increased by 7.9 per cent compared to 4.0 per cent in the first half of the year. Housing starts increased to 788 in 1985 from 643 in 1984 with strong gains in the final quarter of 1985. New motor vehicle sales declined only marginally to 6,236 in 1985 from 6,308 in 1984. Tourist spending is estimated to have increased by 8.1 per cent in 1985 to \$58.6 million as the number of tourist parties increased by 4.8 per cent.

EXPORTS BY MAJOR COMMODITIES MILLIONS \$

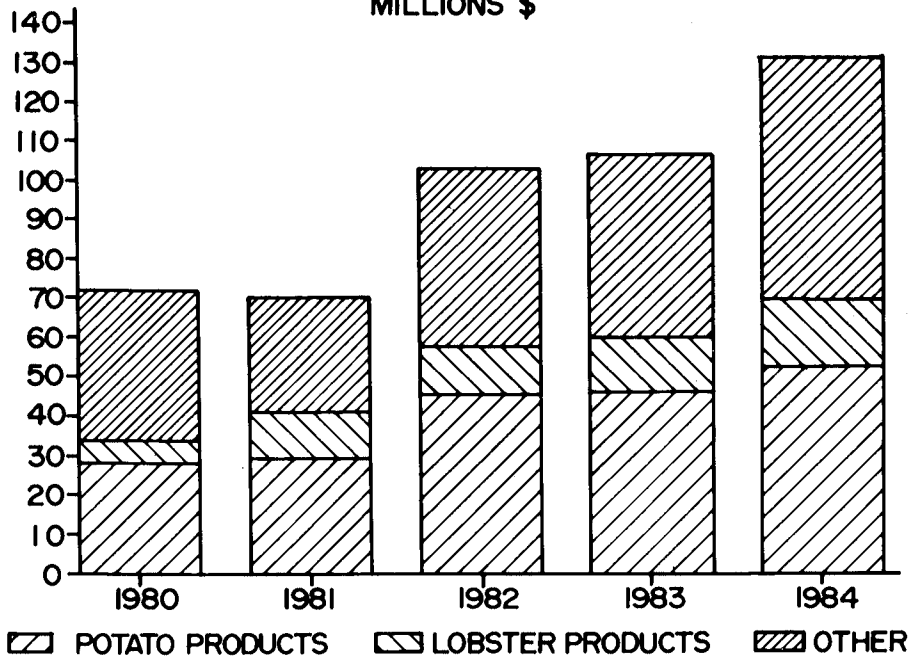
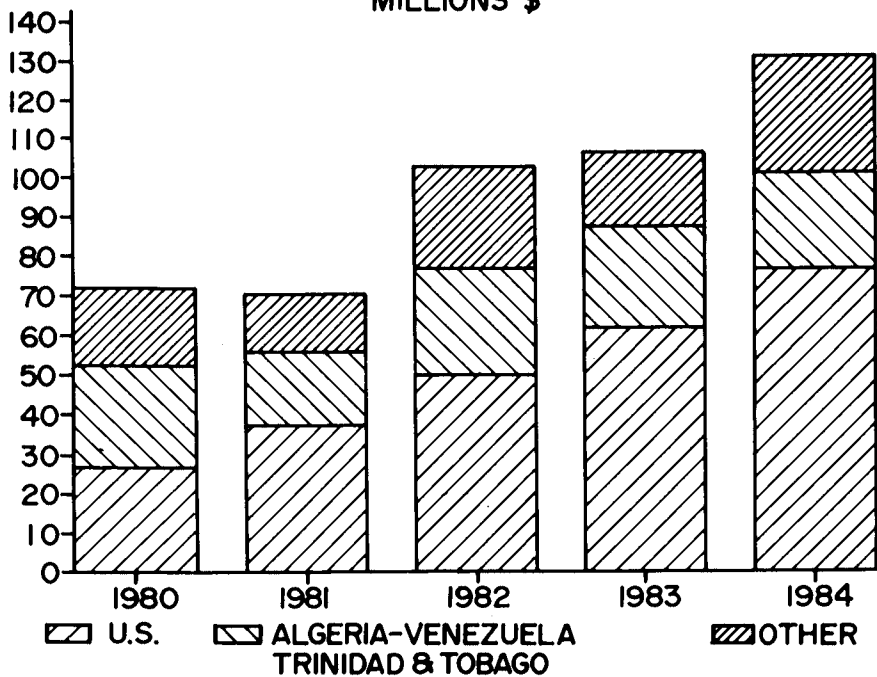

4. Sector Detail

a) Agriculture

Total farm cash receipts are estimated to have been \$173 million in 1985 down from the record level of \$193 million in 1984. Potatoes accounted for \$18 million of this \$20 million decline in cash receipts as the receipts for potatoes totalled \$54 million in 1985 compared to \$72 million in 1984. Realized net farm income fell sharply in 1985 to \$27.8 million from \$52.3 million in 1984.

Seeded potato acreage increased in 1985 to an historical high of 76,000 acres but the total potato harvest declined to 17.6 million cwt from 19.1 million cwt in 1984. The average price of potatoes declined sharply for the 1985 crop, the early December 1985 price per cwt of graded potatoes was \$2.20 compared to \$3.40 in 1984 and \$7.00 in 1983.

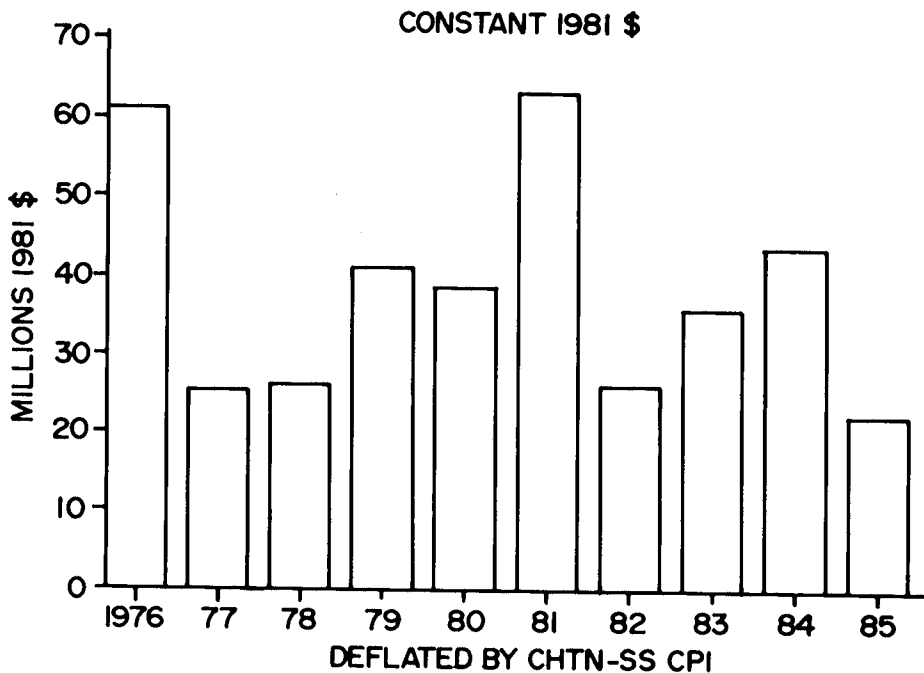
The dairy sector is Prince Edward Island's second highest value farming activity with sales in 1985 of \$27.8 million. This represents a decline of 3.1 per cent from 1984. The volume of milk and cream produced declined to 94,600 kilolitres from 98,200 kilolitres in 1984, a decline of 3.7 per cent.

Farm cash receipts for hogs fell by 8.0 per cent in 1985 to a value of \$21 million. The number of hogs slaughtered declined to 176,400 from 179,500 in 1984. The number of pigs on farms at July 1, 1985 was 115,000 compared to 122,000 in 1984. The number of cattle slaughtered in 1985 increased by 11.0 per cent to 35,700. Lower prices in 1985, however, caused cash receipts from the sale of cattle and calves to be \$21.5 million compared to \$24.1 million in 1984.

The troubled situation for the farm sector did not affect the level of employment in agriculture, which remained at 6,000 in 1985 according to Labour Force Statistics. Diagram 5 below displays Realized Net Farm Income for P.E.I. farm operators in constant 1981 dollars over the past ten years, using the Charlottetown-Summerside CPI as the price deflator.

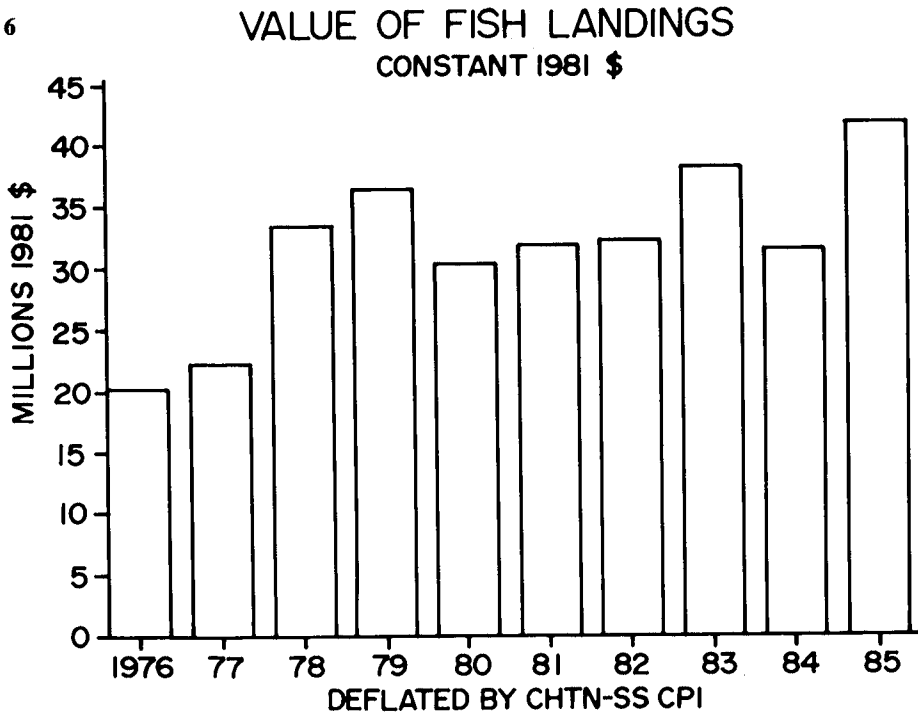
REALIZED NET FARM INCOME



b) Fishing

Island fishermen enjoyed the rewards of record landings, in value \$51.9 million with total weight, 119.5 million lbs. These compared to the volume of fish landings of 113.5 million lbs. and value of \$37.8 million in 1984. The value of the lobster harvest recorded a historical high of \$33.6 million in 1985, an increase of \$10.5 million over 1984. Lobsters accounted for 64.7 per cent of the total value of fish landings in 1985. The snow crab harvest reached 3.2 million lbs. in 1985 compared to only 0.4 million in 1984 when it was re-introduced. Higher prices on average for groundfish resulted in a higher value for the catch in 1985 in spite of a decline in total landed weight. Pelagic and estuarial fish landings experienced a higher value for the total catch as the higher volume of landings more than compensated for the lower average prices. Tuna landings continued to decline in 1985 with only 221 landed compared to 334 in 1984 and 789 in 1983. Irish Moss landings increased to 38.4 million lbs. from 34.7 millions lbs. in 1984. Irish Moss constitutes roughly one third of the total volume of marine landings but only about five per cent of its value. Diagram 6 below displays the annual value of fish landings in constant 1981 dollars for the past ten years with the Charlottetown-Summerside CPI used as the price deflator.

c) Manufacturing

The value of shipments of manufactured goods was \$280.9 million in 1985, up 3.6 per cent over 1984. Employment in manufacturing rose to 3,050 in 1985 from 2,830 in 1984 according to Statistics Canada Survey of Employment, Payroll and Hours. Much of these gains is attributable to gains in fish products.

In 1983, the most recent year for which data is available, manufacturing as a percentage of Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost rose to 7.1 per cent from 6.5 per cent in 1982.

d) Construction

Construction activity improved in 1985 with the value of new construction increasing to \$159 million from \$140.3 million in 1984, and with construction repairs increasing to \$54.9 million from \$51.5 million in 1984. Overall construction activity increased by 11.5 per cent in 1985 while employment remained at 3,000 according to Labour Force Statistics.

New housing starts numbered 788 in 1985, up from 643 in 1984 with most of the increase occurring in the fourth quarter of 1985. Fourth quarter housing starts were 251 in 1985 compared to 132 in 1984.

e) Transportation, Utilities and Commercial Services

Vehicle traffic carried by all three ferry services, at Borden, Wood Islands and Souris, increased in 1985. The number of vehicles carried by C.N. Marine was 675,977, up 3.3 per cent over 1984, by Northumberland Ferries 153,294, up 2.0 per cent and by CTMA Ferry 19,403, up 11.0 per cent. Rail freight carloads continued to decline with 4,444 carloads in 1985 down from 5,416 in 1984. Both Air Canada and CP Air, formerly Eastern Provincial Airways, recorded gains in air passenger traffic to and from Prince Edward Island in 1985. Air passenger traffic numbered 155,132, an increase of 11.0 per cent over 1984.

Electrical consumption on Prince Edward Island increased by 6.5 per cent in 1985 as the average price of 500 Kwh of electricity declined by 9.6 per cent from \$65.70 in 1984 to \$59.39 in 1985. The table below presents the average cost of 500 Kwh of electricity to Islanders from 1980 to 1985.

Commercial services are taken to include accommodations, restaurants, attractions, services to business, retail and wholesale trade, financial services, entertainment, et cetera. Retail and Wholesale Trade is the largest sector of commercial services and it employed an average of 8,750 people in 1985 compared to 8,125 people in 1984 according to Labour Force Statistics. The value of retail sales reached \$553 million in 1985, up 6.1 per cent over 1984. The major component of retailing was Motor Vehicle Dealers with \$115 million in sales in 1985, up \$13 million over 1984. Receipts of restaurants, caterers and taverns increased by 7.8 per cent for the first 11 months of 1985 over the corresponding period in 1984.

f) Non-Commercial Services and Government Services

Employment in government services increased in 1985 at both levels of government, federal and provincial. Provincial government employment rose to 3,752 in 1985 from 3,624 in 1984 according to statistics from the Civil Service Commission and P.E.I. Development Agency. Federal employment increased to an average monthly level of 3,622 during the first nine months of 1985 compared to 3,501 in 1984 according to Statistics Canada. Employment in Education and Health and Welfare Services dipped slightly, by 1 per cent, from its 1984 average monthly level of 6,900 to 6,840 in 1985 according to Statistics Canada.

Diagram 7 below displays the percentage distribution of Gross Domestic Product for those industries for which estimates are provided by Statistics Canada. The "Other" consists of missing components such as Retail Trade, Services to Business and Financial Services.

1983 PERCENT DISTRIBUTION**

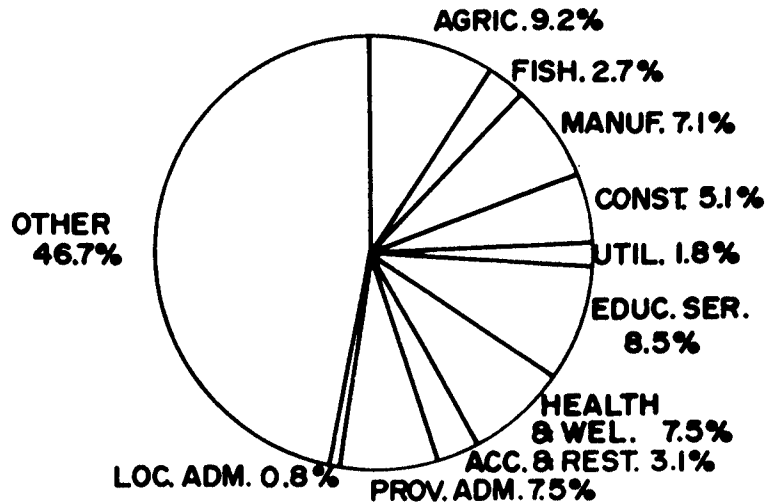

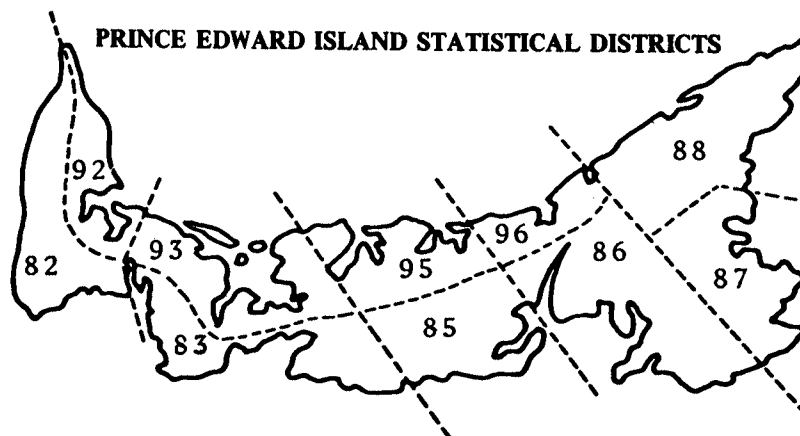
