

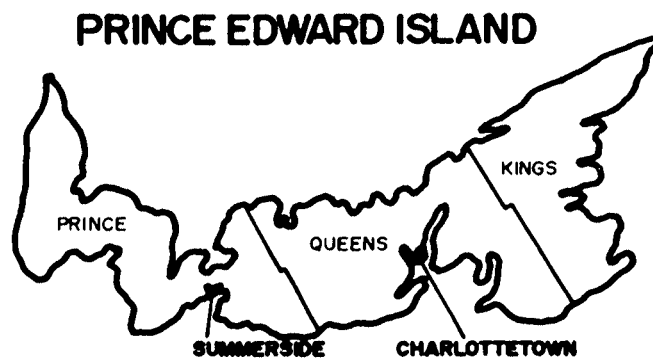

Economic Review 1986

1. INTRODUCTION

The Thirteenth Annual Statistical Review presents a commentary on the provincial economy for the year 1986. Most of the statistics referred to are to be found in Tables displayed later in the Review. In some instances complete data were not available at the time of publication, while some data are preliminary and therefore subject to revision.

The past year 1986 was a census year both with respect to the population of Canada and agriculture in Canada. As of publication, only the interim census population figures were available and they are presented in Table 6 for Island communities, all other population figures presented are preliminary estimates based on the 1981 census count. Final census figures are expected to be available in April, 1987. The Census of Agriculture data are expected to be available commencing July, 1987.

This edition of the Review presents statistics, for the first time, on families and households in Table 7 and on unemployment insurance benefits in Table 11.

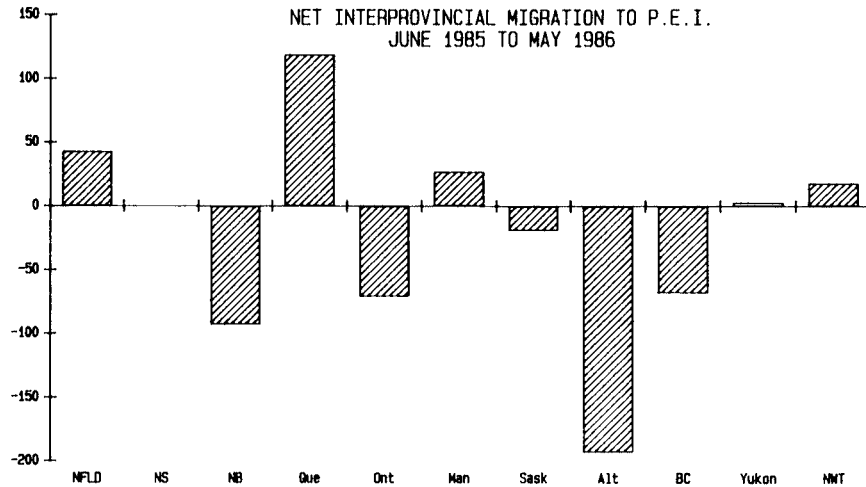
2. ECONOMIC SUMMARY

Prince Edward Island enjoyed an improved economic picture in 1986 as the depressed farm situation turned around in the second half of the year, fishing posted record landings, tourism continued to improve, housing starts reached their highest level since 1978, and the Atlantic Veterinary College commenced classes in September. Interest rates continued to edge downward in 1986 and Islanders reaped the benefits of lower oil prices. The unemployment rate, however, edged upward again as moderate employment gains were out-stripped by an even larger increase in the labour force. Net out-migration from Prince Edward Island resumed in 1986 which slowed population growth.

3. POPULATION

Statistics Canada's preliminary estimate of the June 1, 1986 provincial population, based on the 1981 census, is 128,100 and is subject to downward revision as the interim 1986 census count for Prince Edward Island is 125,379. The population estimate of 128,100 represents a net increase in the population, since June 1985, of 695 consisting of a natural increase of 881 and net out-migration of 186. Between June 1, 1985 and May 30, 1986, 3,777 people left the Island for other parts of Canada while 3,539 people moved to Prince Edward Island from the rest of Canada. Newfoundland, Quebec, Manitoba and both territories provided net in-migration to Prince Edward Island while New Brunswick, Ontario, Saskatchewan, Alberta and B.C. were sources of net out-migration. Nova Scotia had exactly as many out-migrants from, as in-migrants to, Prince Edward Island in 1985-86. Diagram 1 below displays net interprovincial migration for Prince Edward Island in 1985-86.

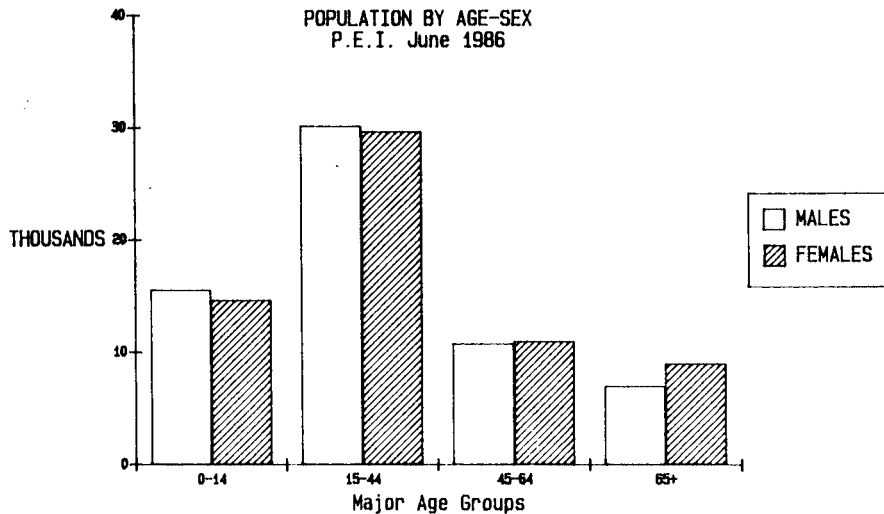

During the calendar year 1985, there were 1,990 births, the highest number of births since 1972 when 2,010 births were registered. The increased births were the result of a marginal upturn in the fertility rate coupled with increased numbers of women of child bearing age. The total number of deaths declined to 1,080 in 1985 from 1,109 in 1984. There were 910 marriages in 1985, down from 1,057 in 1984 and there were 234 divorces, up from 222 in 1984.

Prince Edward Island's estimated population at June 1, 1986, consisted of 64,400 females and 63,600 males. While there were more females than males overall, there were, however, more males than females in the younger age groups. Diagram 2 below portrays the age-sex distribution in Prince Edward Island in 1986 by broad age groups.

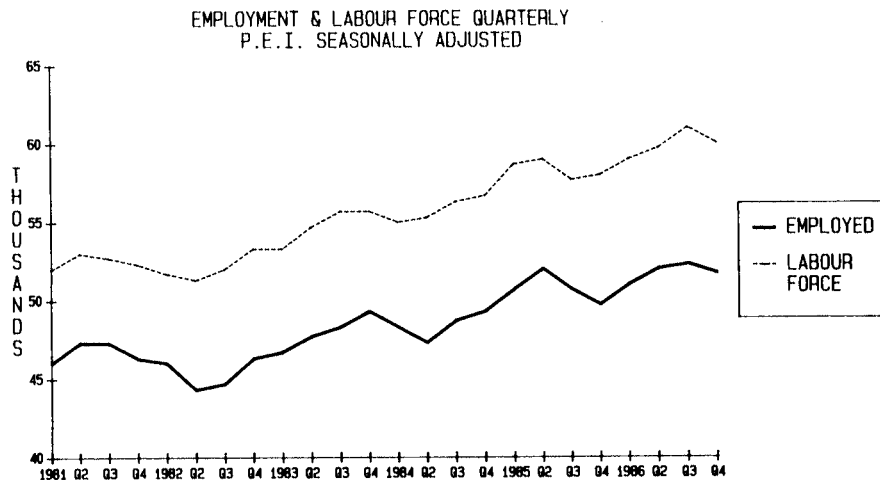


The 1981 Census indicated that there were 30,220 families residing in private households in 1981 in Prince Edward Island. There were 3,660 lone-parent families which represents 12.1 per cent of all families. The distribution of lone-parent families was fairly even throughout the three counties with 13.6 per cent of all families in Queen's County being lone-parent families, 11.7 per cent in Kings County and 10.1 per cent in Prince County.

4. LABOUR FORCE

The labour force increased by 1.7 per cent in 1986 to average 60,000 per month. The population aged 15 and over increased by 1.3 per cent to measure 96,000 while the labour force participation rate edged upward from 61.9 per cent in 1985 to reach 62.3 per cent in 1986. Employment gains were moderate in 1986 with an increase of 1.5 per cent. The annual average level of employment was 52,000 in 1986 compared to 51,000 in 1985. As the labour force increased at a faster rate than employment, the unemployment rate crept upward in 1986 to 13.4 per cent compared to 13.2 per cent in 1985 and 12.8 per cent in 1984. Diagram 3 below demonstrates the average quarterly level of employment and labour force for Prince Edward Island from 1981 to 1986.

The seasonality of employment on Prince Edward Island is not shown above but is very pronounced. Employment in 1986 ranged from a low of 46,000 in January to a high of 59,000 employed in August. Youth employment, those aged 15-24, averaged 12,000 in 1986 with a high of 17,000 in July and August. The youth unemployment rate averaged 18.5 per cent in 1986 compared to an unemployment rate of 11.7 per cent for those aged 25 and over. Those aged 15-24 accounted for 25 per cent of the labour force in Prince Edward Island compared to 22 per cent nationally in 1986.

5. INFLATION

The annual average rate of inflation, as measured by the Consumer Price Index for Charlottetown-Summerside, was 2.0 per cent in 1986. This was the lowest rate of inflation for Charlottetown-Summerside since Statistics Canada started providing a consumer price index for the area in 1974. Furthermore for the fifth consecutive year, the average increase in the CPI for Charlottetown-Summerside was below the national average, as the national CPI increased by 4.2 per cent in 1986.

The table below provides a comparison of the annual rates of increase in the CPI for Canada and Charlottetown-Summerside since 1981, when inflation peaked both nationally and provincially.

Federal sales and excise tax increases in 1986 contributed to higher prices for consumer goods in Canada, but they were outweighed by the drop in oil prices. In Prince Edward Island, overall energy prices declined by -14.1 per cent in 1986, nearly double the national rate of decline of -7.2 per cent. The price of gasoline at the pumps declined on the Island by -10.8 per cent versus a -11.1 per cent decline nationally. Falling electricity prices were the major reason for the significant difference in general energy price changes. Electricity prices declined sharply in Prince Edward Island by -19.2 per cent while nationally they actually increased by 3.3 per cent. The sharply lower energy prices on the Island were the main reason for the low inflation performance in Prince Edward Island in 1986.

The table below provides a comparison of the rates of increase in the average prices of the major components of the CPI for Canada and Charlottetown-Summerside. Tobacco and Alcohol prices experienced the fastest rate of increase in 1986, based largely on double digit increases in tobacco prices of 21.2 per cent provincially and 17.4 per cent nationally. The Food component increased at a faster rate than the overall CPI in 1986. Pork prices increased by 16.1 per cent. The Housing component includes the impact of lower electricity and fuel oil prices.

6. PERSONAL INCOME

Available data on major components of income indicate that personal incomes realized a marked improvement on Prince Edward Island in 1986. Labour income, unemployment insurance benefits, and farm and fishing incomes increased significantly. Labour income increased by approximately 6 per cent and unemployment insurance benefits increased by 12.3 per cent in 1986. Total labour income for 1985 was \$707 million and is estimated to have reached \$750 million in 1986. The average weekly industrial wage increased by 2.6 per cent in 1986 to measure \$348. Unemployment insurance benefits for 1986 totalled \$120 million compared to \$107 million in 1985. Weekly benefits averaged \$172 compared to \$159 in 1985. Incomes of fishermen realized strong gains in 1986 as the value of fish landings was \$67 million, \$15 million more than in 1985. Island farmers also enjoyed a much improved financial picture as farm cash receipts reached a new record high and realized net farm income increased by \$22 million from \$35 million in 1985.

In 1984, the most recent year for which taxation statistics are available, the average income per tax filer in Prince Edward Island was \$13,710. While the occupational group, Doctors and Surgeons, had the highest average income per tax filer at \$92,977, Entertainers and Artists had the lowest average income at \$3,464. A total of 72,182 individuals filed tax returns for 1984 with 72.9 per cent, 52,614, having taxable returns. The number of individuals reporting total income in excess of \$50,000 in 1984 was 1,148 compared to 938 in 1983.

7. GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT

a) Gross Domestic Product

Canada's Gross Domestic Product at Market Prices measures the overall value of goods and services produced within the nation. It increased by 6.1 per cent in 1986 to reach a level of \$505.2 billion. Gross Domestic Product for Canada in constant 1981 dollars increased by 3.1 per cent in 1986 while the GDP price deflator increased by 3.0 per cent.

In 1984, the most recent year for which information is available, Prince Edward Island's Gross Domestic Product at Market Prices was \$1,229 million while the provincial level of GDP at Factor Cost was \$1,134 million. The Conference Board of Canada estimates that Prince Edward Island's level of Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost in constant dollars increased by 3.6 per cent in 1986.

b) Gross Provincial Expenditures

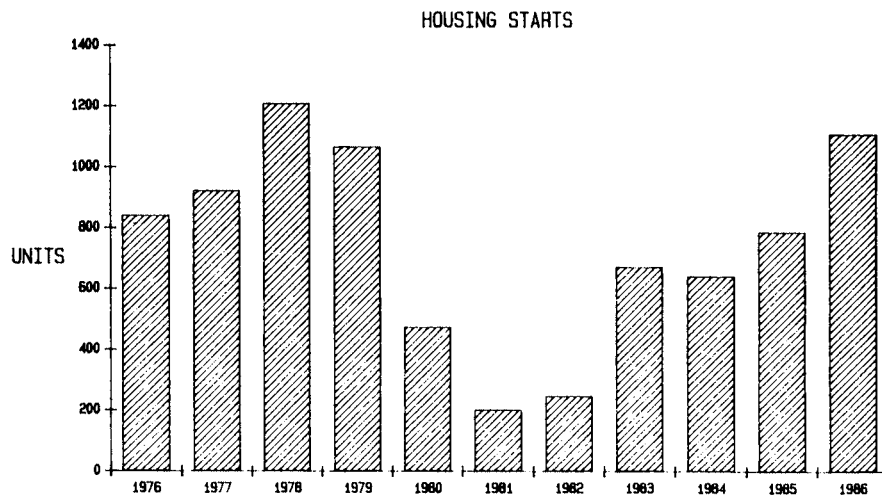
Consumer spending continued on a positive note in 1986 as interest rates and energy costs declined, particularly during the latter half of the year. Retail sales in Prince Edward Island increased by 4.7 per cent to reach a value of \$573 million in 1986 while nationally, retail sales increased by 7.8 per cent. Tourist spending on Prince Edward Island is estimated to have valued \$62.4 million in 1986, a 6.5 per cent increase over 1985. The number of tourist parties by auto and air increased by 2.5 per cent to reach 224,000 in 1986. The number of automobile parties from the United States increased by 11.7 per cent while the number of tourists travelling by air increased by 6.2 per cent.

Total expenditures on construction plus machinery and equipment on P.E.I. was \$410 million in 1986, which represents an increase of 11.1 per cent over 1985. Expenditures on construction, which totalled \$287 million, was comprised of \$234 million in new construction, up 21.6 per cent over 1985 and \$53 million in repairs, up 1.2 per cent over 1985. New residential construction, valued at \$122 million in 1986, is estimated to have increased by 40.0 per cent from 1985's value of \$87 million.

Expenditures on machinery and equipment declined by 0.9 per cent in 1986 to total \$124 million compared to \$125 million in 1985.

Diagram 4 below shows the number of housing starts in Prince Edward Island from 1976 to 1986.

The value of international exports from Prince Edward Island to the rest of the world increased by 29.1 per cent in 1986 to reach a value of \$146 million, mostly from increased exports to the United States and Japan. The United States, the Island's principal destination of exports, accounted for 59.9 per cent of all Prince Edward Island exports in 1986 and was worth an estimated \$87.5 million. This compares with \$73.4 million worth of exports shipped to the United States in 1985. Japan became the second largest buyer of Island exports in 1986 as it purchased \$11.2 million worth of Island goods. This represents a major increase in sales to Japan compared to 1985 when Japan purchased only \$2.56 million worth of Island exports. Algeria, Venezuela, Uruguay and Trinidad-Tobago accounted for another \$28.0 million in exports in 1986 compared to \$16.8 million in shipments in 1985.

8. SECTOR DETAIL

a) Agriculture

The farm picture, which looked bleak early in 1986 due to low commodity prices, improved significantly in the second half of the year. As a result of this turnaround, farm cash receipts in 1986 reached a new historical high of \$197 million. Farm cash receipts were \$176 million in 1985. The previous record high of \$196 million was set in 1984. Potatoes accounted for \$14 million of the \$21 million increase in 1986 while beef sales accounted for another \$7 million. Realized net farm income is expected to increase substantially in 1986 to reach \$57 million from \$35 million in 1985. Total net government assistance through cash receipts was \$20 million in 1986 including payments under the potato diversion program. Net government assistance in 1985 was \$12 million. Agriculture's share of provincial GDP at factor cost was 9.0 per cent in 1986 according to the Conference Board of Canada.

Potato acreage declined in 1986 to reach 70,000 acres, yet, due to a higher yield, the total harvest increased by 1.3 per cent to reach a level of 17.85 million cwt. Farm cash receipts for potatoes totalled \$63.7 million in 1986 with \$8.1 million in the form of government assistance. Potato prices improved significantly for the 1986 crop compared to the prices received for the 1985 crop and this improved price scenario is presented in Diagram 5 on the following page.

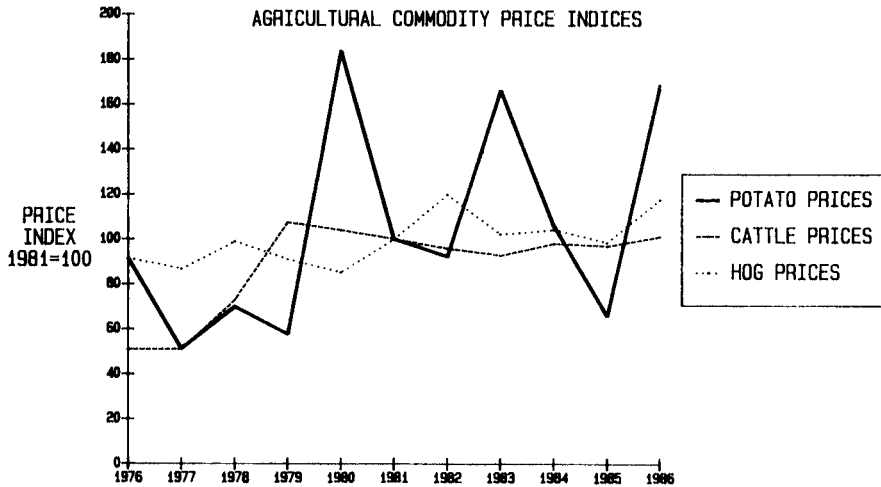
The dairy sector realized an increase in output of 5.6 per cent as the volume of milk and cream produced totalled 99,927 kilolitres in 1986. Farm cash receipts for dairy products were \$35.8 million in 1986 including \$5.4 million in dairy supplementary payments.

The beef sector enjoyed an increase in farm cash receipts of \$7.0 million in 1986 as receipts totalled \$32.3 million. The number of cattle and calves slaughtered increased to 38,181 in 1986 compared to 35,700 in 1985. The average price for beef improved by 4.4 per cent in 1986 according to Statistics Canada's index of Farm Prices for Prince Edward Island. Hog producers also enjoyed a good year in 1986 as the average price per cwt. for hogs was \$81.67 compared to \$68.42 in 1985. Cash receipts for hogs increased by \$3.6 million to \$24.5 million in 1986, an increase of 17.2 per cent. The number of hogs slaughtered declined to a level of 172,430 from 175,900 in 1985. Hog producers paid \$109,000 into the provincial income stabilization program in 1986 which was in sharp contrast to their receipt of \$2,895,000 from the program in 1985.

Farm cash receipts for all other crops and livestock were \$35.4 million in 1986, up from the \$33.3 million received in 1985. Tobacco receipts, including \$1.0 million in advances, totalled \$11.5 million in 1986 compared to receipts of \$10.2 million in 1985.

Diagram 5 below displays the fluctuation in farm prices for potatoes, cattle and hogs from 1976 to 1986. The price index for potatoes is by crop year and the 1986 index is based on the value of potato cash receipts and potato crop disposition for the August-December 1986 period. The index for cattle is provided by Statistics Canada and the hog index is based on the average price per cwt.

b) Fishing

Island fishermen enjoyed a record year in 1986 landing 126.0 million pounds of fish worth \$67.1 million. In 1985, the volume of fish caught was 119.5 million pounds worth \$51.9 million. The value of the lobster harvest was \$44.5 million in 1986 which represents 66.3 per cent of the value of total landings. The fishing sector's share of provincial GDP at factor cost in 1986 is estimated to have been 2.0 per cent.

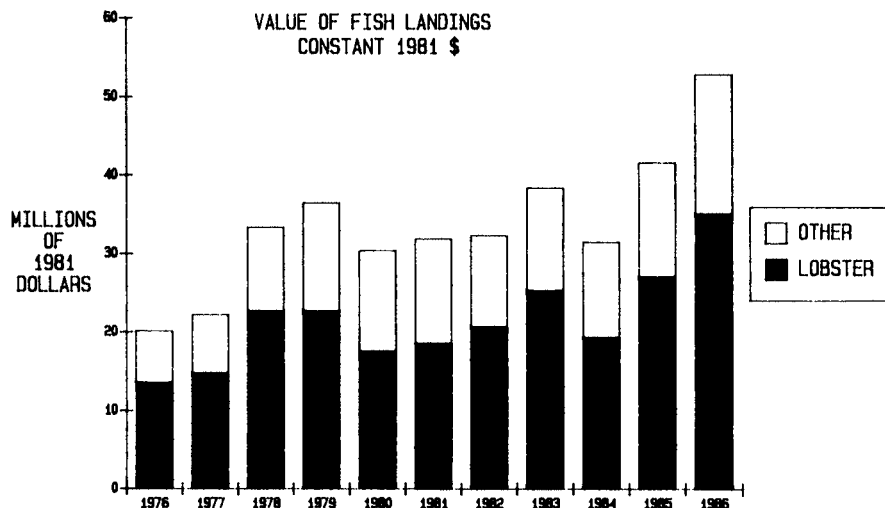
The value of the lobster harvest increased by \$10.9 million or 32.4 per cent in 1986. Lobster landings increased to 18.3 million pounds from 15.0 million pounds in 1985. The value of Island mussels totalled \$1.9 million in 1986. The quantity of mussels harvested has increased from 0.4 million lbs. in 1983 to 1.0 million in 1985, to 2.7 million lbs. in 1986.

Groundfish landings declined in 1986 to a level of 30.1 million lbs. compared to 34.2 million in 1985 and 45.0 million in 1983. The value of groundfish in 1986 was \$5.6 million, up \$0.8 million over 1985 due to higher prices.

Pelagic and estuarial fish landings were worth \$4.7 million in 1986 compared to \$3.6 million in 1985. Total landings increased sharply to 33.3 million lbs. in 1986 from 20.3 million lbs. in 1985. Herring and mackerel both realized large increases in landings in 1986.

Diagram 6 below displays the value of total fish and lobster landings in 1981 dollars from 1976 to 1986 with the Charlottetown-Summerside CPI used as the price deflator.

c) Forestry

Forestry's share of provincial GDP at factor cost in 1986 is estimated to be approximately 0.5 per cent. Prince Edward Island had 2,940 square kilometers of forest land in 1984 which represents roughly 50 per cent of the province's total area. Total forest production in 1984 was 413,000 cubic metres or 114,000 cords of merchantable timber which represents a 40.5 per cent increase over the 81,000 cords produced in 1983. Fuelwood production accounted for the entire increase in production as industrial wood production declined by 3,000 cords to 35,000 cords in 1984.

d) Manufacturing

Manufacturing accounted for an estimated 6.8 per cent of provincial GDP at factor cost in 1986. Manufacturing shipments increased by 7.1 per cent in 1986 to reach a level of \$313 million from \$292 million in 1985. The value of fish products which increased by 22.1 per cent in 1986, were valued at \$64 million, \$12 million more than in 1985. Employment in manufacturing averaged 4,000 in 1986 as in 1985.

e) Construction

Construction activity increased sharply in 1986 in view of gains in new construction expenditures which increased by 17.6 per cent to value \$287 million compared to \$244 million in 1985 and in housing starts which totalled 1,110 compared to 788 in 1985. The main phase of activity at the Atlantic Veterinary College took place in 1986 which contributed to the sharp increase in institutional construction projects. The value of new construction by institutions increased by 27.9 per cent to reach \$30.7 million from \$24.0 million in 1985. Employment in the construction industry averaged 3,000 in 1986, the same as in 1985 according to the Labour Force Survey. Construction accounted for 8.3 per cent of provincial GDP at factor cost in 1986.

f) Transportation, Communications and Utilities

Transportation, communications and utilities are estimated to represent 7.7 per cent of provincial GDP at factor cost in 1986. Ferry traffic on all three ferry services at Borden, Wood Islands, and Souris increased again in 1986. The total number of passengers carried on all three services was 2,244,000, up 2.6 per cent over 1985, while total vehicular traffic, including rail cars, was 956,000 units, up 2.8 per cent over 1985. Marine Atlantic ferried 1,662,000 passengers in 1986, up 2.9 per cent, Northumberland Ferry transported 530,000 passengers, up 0.6 percent, and CTMA Ferry transported 52,000 passengers, up 14.5 percent over 1985. The number of automobiles transported by all three services was 684,000 in 1986 compared to 660,000 in 1985, which represents a 3.6 per cent increase. Rail freight continued to decline in 1986 as only 2,985 carloads of freight were moved in 1986 compared to 4,444 in 1985 and 5,416 in 1984. The number of airlines servicing Prince Edward Island increased to 5 in 1986 as Air Bras d'Or joined Air Canada, Air Atlantic, Air Nova and Canadian Pacific Airlines with flights in and out of Charlottetown.

Electrical consumption on Prince Edward Island increased by 7.9 per cent in 1986 as the average price of 500 kwh of electricity declined by -21.1 per cent from \$59.39 in 1985 to \$46.83 in 1986. Local generation of electricity formed only 1.9 per cent of electrical consumption in 1986, the remainder being imported from the mainland. The table below presents the average cost of 500 kwh of electricity to Islanders from 1980 to 1986.

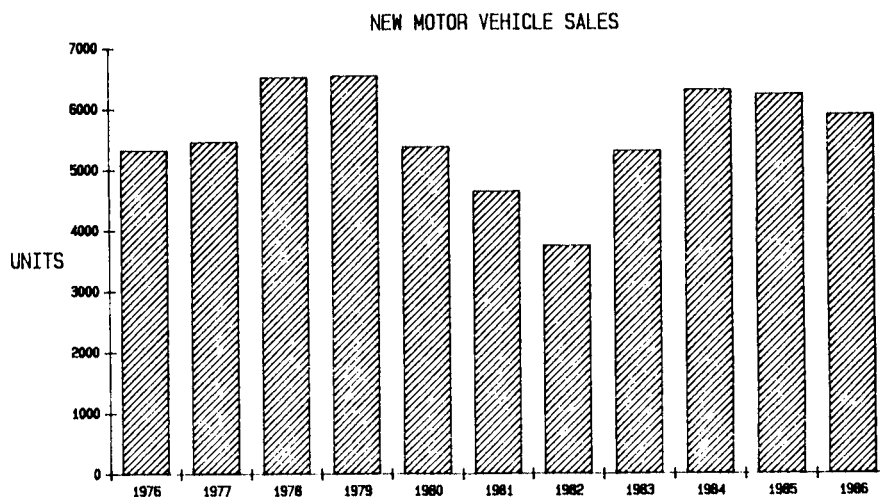
The number of telephones in service at the end of 1986 was 83,973 which was 2.8 per cent more than in 1985. The number of telephone calls made in 1986 was 261 million, up 4.8 per cent over the number of calls made in 1985. There were 8.2 million toll calls in 1986 and 253 million local calls made. In 1985, the per capita number of telephone calls made in Prince Edward Island was 1,951 compared to a national per capita average of 1,361.

g) Commercial Services

Commercial services which embody retail and wholesale trade, financial services, accommodation and food services, entertainment and various services to business, accounted for approximately one third of provincial GDP at factor cost on Prince Edward Island in 1986. Retail and Wholesale Trade is the largest sector of commercial services on Prince Edward Island and it employed 9,100 people in 1986 compared to 8,750 in 1985 according to the Labour Force Survey. Retail sales totalled \$573 million in 1986. Motor vehicle dealers realized sales valued at \$126 million in 1986, an 8.7 per cent increase over 1985. The number of new motor vehicles sold declined from 6,236 units in 1985 to 5,903 in 1986 but the average price per vehicle increased by 6.9 per cent, from \$11,547 in 1985 to reach \$12,347 in 1986. Total food store sales increased by 1.9 per cent to total \$125 million. Hardware store sales increased by 44.3 per cent in 1986 which was indicative of the strong resurgence in residential construction activity. Restaurant receipts totalled \$35.6 million in 1986 compared to \$32.8 million in 1985 while tavern receipts were \$2.2 million compared to \$2.4 million in 1985. Employment in the accommodation and food services industry increased by 5.0 per cent in 1986 according to Statistics Canada. Very little information is available on the other sectors of commercial services.

Diagram 7 below presents new motor vehicle unit sales from 1976 to 1986 on Prince Edward Island.

h) Non-Commercial and Government Services

Non-commercial and government services, which accounted for approximately one-third of Prince Edward Island's GDP at factor cost in 1986, is comprised mainly of education, health and public administration services.

Employment in education and related services averaged 3,200 during the first eleven months of 1986 compared to 3,100 during the same period of 1985, according to the Statistics Canada Survey of Employment, Payroll and Hours (SEPH). Total student enrollment at all levels of education was 29,266 in 1986-87 and this compares to 29,436 in 1985-86. The Atlantic Veterinary College commenced classes in September of 1986 with 52 students.

Employment in health and welfare services averaged 4,000 during the first eleven months of 1986 compared to 3,800 in 1985, according to the SEPH survey. The number of practicing physicians increased from 167 in 1985 to 196 in 1986.

Total employment in public administration and defence remained unchanged at 5,100 on Prince Edward Island according to Statistics Canada. Provincial government employment increased by 2.8 per cent in 1986. The level of provincial employment at 3,858 in 1986 still remained below its 1980 level of 3,871. Federal government employment averaged 4,422 during the first nine months of 1986, down from 4,517 employed during the same period the year before.

In 1984, the most recent year for which information is available, expenditures by all levels of government, excluding intergovernmental transfers, were \$1,057 million which represents a 14.3 per cent increase over the \$925 million spent in 1983. In 1984 the federal government provided \$818 million of the total, of which \$283 million were transfers to the Prince Edward Island government. Provincial government expenditures that year were \$495 million including \$142 million in transfers to hospitals and local government.

For the final year 1985-86, the province of Prince Edward Island incurred an operating deficit of \$14.5 million as provincial spending totalled \$472 million and revenues, \$457 million. Provincial government spending increased by 8.6 per cent in 1985-86 while revenues increased by 6.3 per cent. Provincial own source revenues totalled \$230 million and federal monies totalled \$227 million.

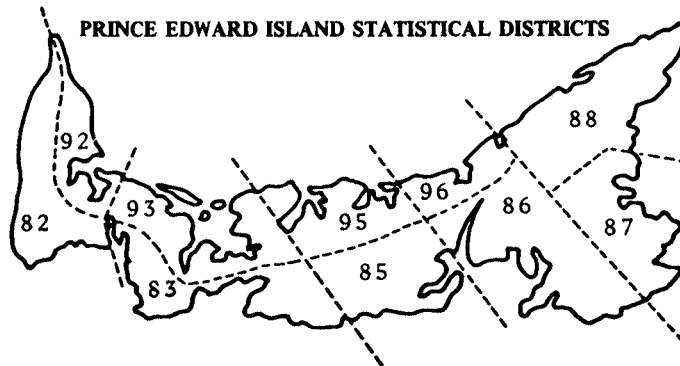
