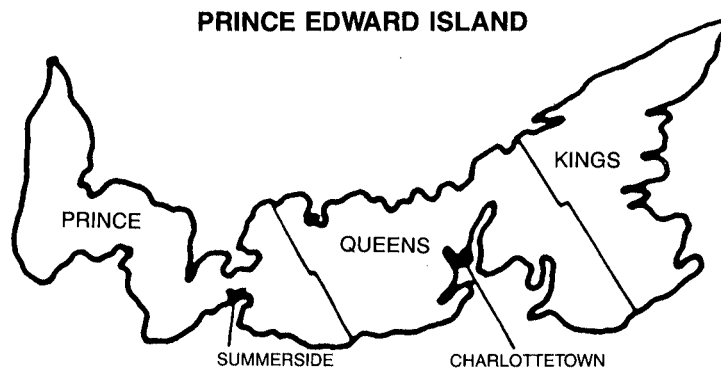

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND
ECONOMIC REVIEW 1988

1. INTRODUCTION

The annual Statistical Review presents a commentary on the provincial economy on the basis of statistical information available at the time of publication. In some cases the data are preliminary and therefore subject to revision.

2. ECONOMIC SUMMARY

The Canadian economy performed strongly in 1988 for the sixth consecutive year posting an estimated 4.5 per cent rate of growth in Gross Domestic Product in constant dollars. Business fixed investment in 1988 was the leading expenditure component of Gross Domestic Product with a real growth rate of 13.4 per cent. The unemployment rate for Canada declined from 8.8 per cent in 1987 to 7.8 per cent in 1988, the lowest level of unemployment in Canada since 1981. Inflation fell from 4.4 per cent in 1987 to 4.1 per cent in 1988. Interest rates by the end of 1988 had climbed to their highest level since February 1986 as monetary authorities acted to quell inflationary pressures which they perceived to be developing in the latter part of the year. The year also saw the Canadian dollar rise in December to 83.6 cents in terms of U.S. funds, the highest level of the Canadian dollar since January 1982.

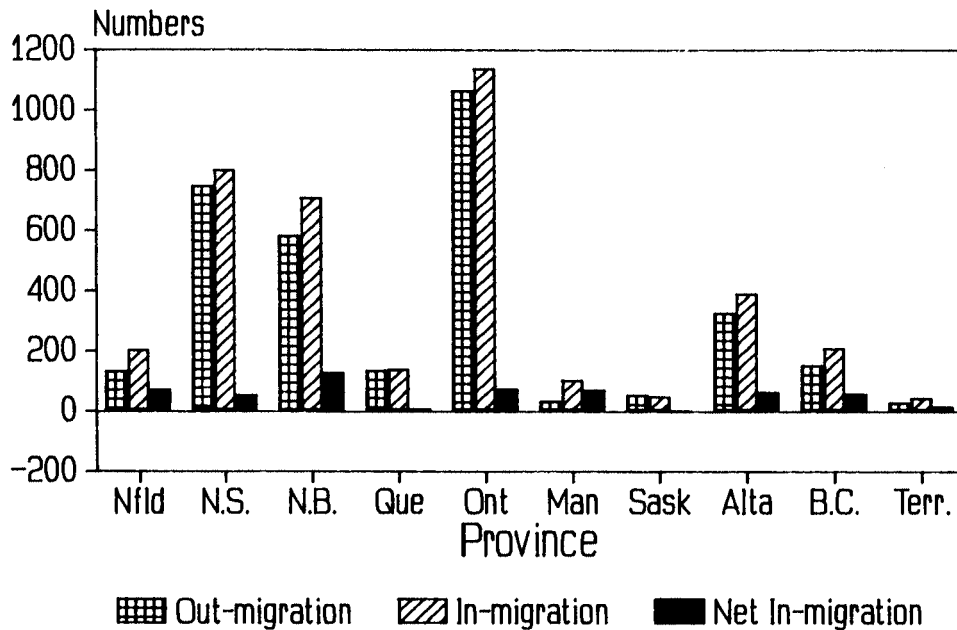
The Prince Edward Island economy continued to grow strongly in 1988 on the strength of construction, an increase in tourism, and record lobster landings. Significant increases in employment occurred in 1988 but resulted in only a small decline in the unemployment rate, which fell from 13.2 per cent in 1987 to 13.0 per cent in 1988. Both residential and non-residential construction posted large increases in 1988. Farm cash receipts declined 1.7 per cent in 1988 largely as a result of weak hog prices and low prices for the 1987 potato crop marketed in 1988.

3. POPULATION

Statistics Canada's estimate of the population of Prince Edward Island (as of June 1st 1988) was 128,700. This represents an increase of 1,400 over 1987 which was composed of 1,958 births, 1,121 deaths, and net in-migration of 526 interprovincial and 105 international migrants. Between June 1987 and May 1988, 3,252 people left Prince Edward Island and 3,778 moved to the Island from other parts of Canada. Diagram 1 displays the interprovincial migrant flows for Prince Edward Island for 1987-88. Net in-migration to Prince Edward Island occurred from all provinces in Canada except Saskatchewan. The largest gross flows of inter-provincial migrants were between Prince Edward Island and Ontario, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick.

P.E.I., 1987-88**



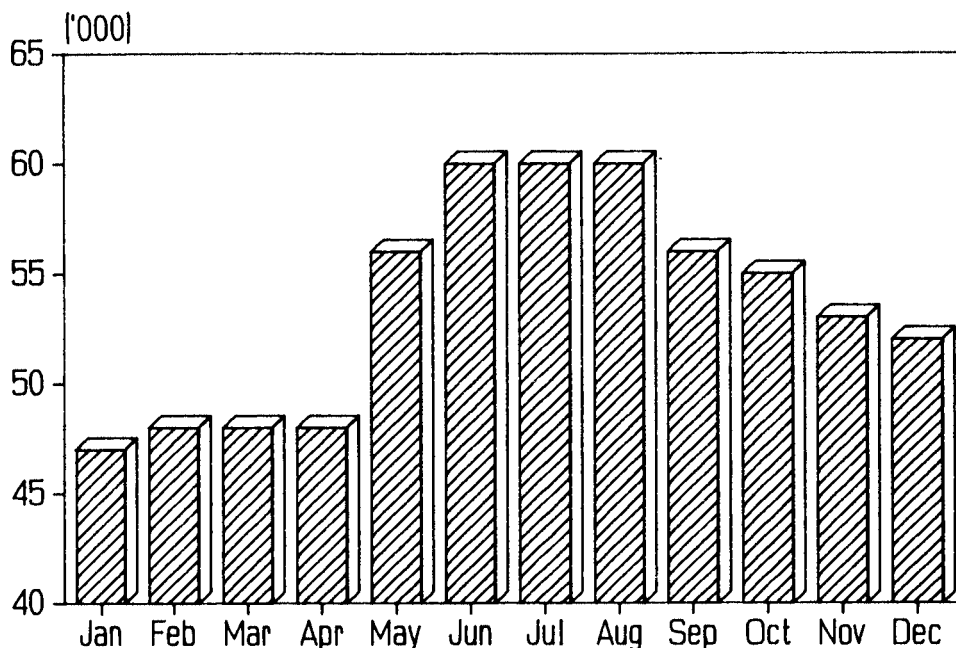
4. LABOUR FORCE

Monthly employment on Prince Edward Island averaged 54,000 in 1988, an increase of 3.8 per cent over the 1987 level. The labour force increased by a slightly slower pace of 3.3 per cent in 1988 to average 62,000 per month. The population aged 15 years and over increased by 1.1 per cent to measure 96,000. The labour force participation rate increased from 62.9 per cent in 1987 to 64.0 per cent in 1988. The female labour force participation rate continued to rise both nationally and on Prince Edward Island while the male participation rate rose slightly on Prince Edward Island. Both the male and female labour force participation rates on Prince Edward Island, although lower than the Canadian average, are the highest amongst the Atlantic provinces. The above figures are from the Labour Force Survey's estimates of employment, working age population, and labour force which were revised in January 1989 in accordance with the revised population figures from the 1986 census.

The unemployment rate declined to 13.0 per cent in 1988 from 13.2 per cent in 1987. While this is a marginal decrease over the whole year, the unemployment rate averaged 13.7 per cent in the first six months of 1988, and then declined to average 12.3 per cent in the remaining half of the year.

The seasonality of employment on Prince Edward Island is illustrated in Diagram 2. The diagram shows the monthly employment on Prince Edward Island for 1988 which was typical of the seasonal pattern with significantly lower employment in the winter than during the summer months. In 1988, total employment during the period June-August reached a level of 60,000, relative to the low of 47,000 in January. Of the 13,000 swing in employment between January and the summer months of 1988, some 8,000 is found in the swing for those aged 15-24. Youth employment during July 1988 peaked at 16,000 relative to a low of 8,000 in January 1988, an increase of 100 per cent from January to July. In contrast, employment amongst those aged 15-24 for Canada increased by 29.1 per cent in July over the low employment period of January 1988.

5. INFLATION

The rate of increase in the consumer price index for Charlottetown-Summerside increased slightly in 1988 to 3.7 per cent from 3.5 per cent in 1987. The rate of inflation for Charlottetown-Summerside has been lower than the national rate since 1982. Lower rates of increase in the housing and energy components of the consumer price index on Prince Edward Island appear to be the main factors.

IN CONSUMER PRICE INDEX**

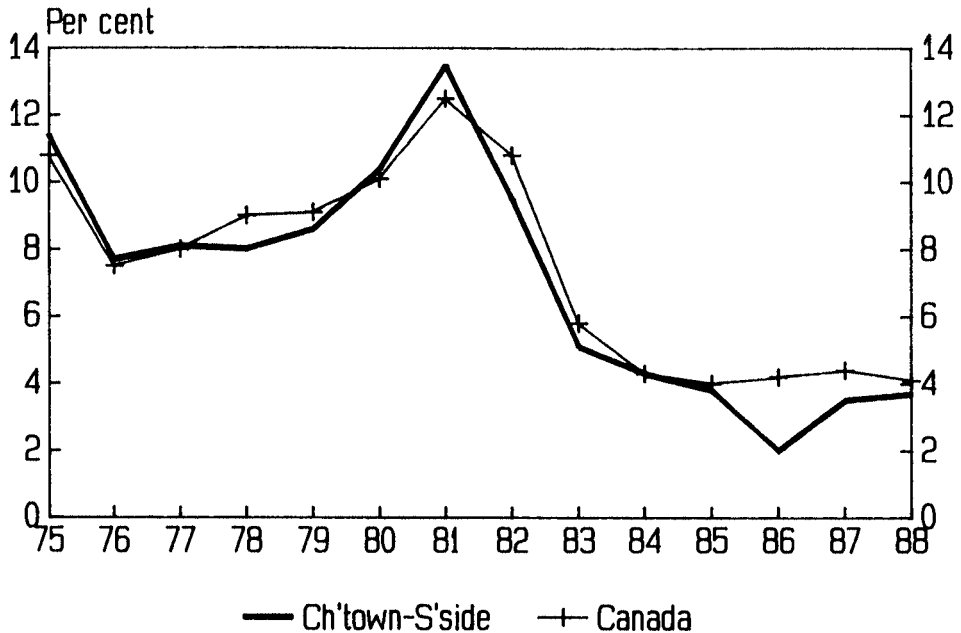


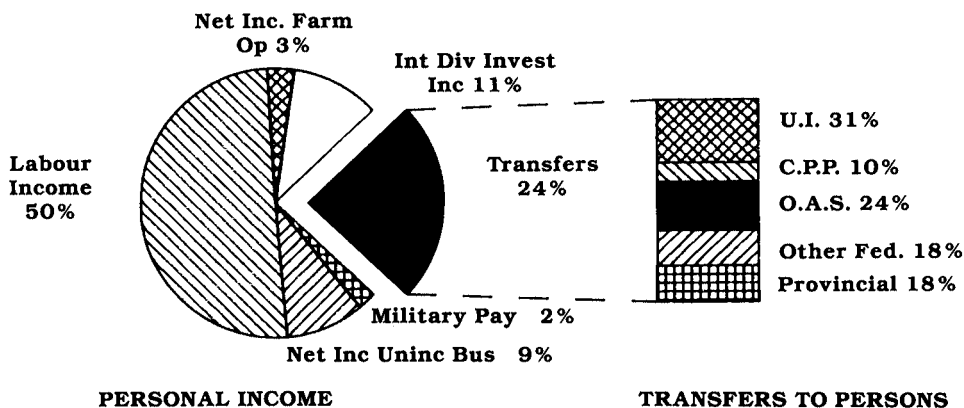
Diagram 3 illustrates the trend in inflation in Charlottetown-Summerside and Canada over the period 1975 to 1988. After peaking at 12.5 per cent in 1981, the inflation rate for Canada has remained in the neighbourhood of 4 per cent in the last four years. During the early 1980's the Charlottetown-Summerside inflation rate rose above the national rate due to the impact of higher oil prices on the Island economy. In recent years as energy prices have declined, the Charlottetown-Summerside inflation rate has been lower than the national rate.

6. PERSONAL INCOME

Total personal income on Prince Edward Island increased by 9.4 per cent to total \$1,672 million in 1987, the most recent year for which statistics on personal income are available. Diagram 4 shows the components of personal income and the percentage distribution in 1987. Wages, salaries, and supplementary labour income are the largest component of personal income comprising 50.5 per cent of the total in 1987. Transfer payments from both the federal and provincial governments are shown on the right hand side of Diagram 4. Unemployment Insurance and Old Age Security Payments were the two largest transfer payments together accounting for 54.8 per cent of total government transfer payments to persons.

Personal income per capita was \$13,134 on Prince Edward Island in 1987, an increase of 9.2 per cent over 1986. Personal income per capita on Prince Edward Island as a percentage of Canada's per capita personal income stood at 72.6 per cent in 1987, an increase of 1.5 percentage points over 1986.

7. GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT

(a) Gross Provincial Product at Market Prices

Gross Domestic Product at Market Prices for Prince Edward Island in 1987, the most recent year for which provincial statistics are available, was \$1,608 million. Estimates of Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost in constant dollars by the Conference Board of Canada, indicate the Island economy expanded by 5.3 per cent in 1988 and 2.7 per cent in 1987. The strong performance of the fisheries and construction sector contributed to the high rate of economic growth in 1988 according to the Conference Board.

(b) Gross Provincial Expenditure

Gross Provincial Expenditures consists of personal expenditure on consumer goods and services, gross capital formation by business and government, government expenditures on goods and services, and exports less imports. Consumer expenditures on goods and services in 1987 totalled \$1,271 million, of which \$82.3 million was from expenditures by non-resident tourists. Trends in personal expenditure in 1988 can be discerned from statistics on retail sales which valued \$703.9 million in 1988, an increase of 9.9 per cent over 1987. The number of new motor vehicles sold increased by 3.1 per cent to total 6,179 vehicles. The total value of new motor vehicle sales increased by 11.8 per cent in 1988 as the average price paid per vehicle increased by 8.5 per cent.

According to Statistics Canada's Provincial Economic Accounts, gross capital formation valued \$327 million in 1987, a modest improvement of 4.8 per cent over 1986. Statistical information available for 1988 on capital and repair expenditure on Prince Edward Island provides evidence of a strong expansion in capital formation. The estimates of capital and repair expenditures from the Private and Public Investment Survey reached a level of \$487.3 million in 1988, which represents an increase of 12.1 per cent in this data series.

Government expenditure on goods and services increased by 1.8 per cent in 1986 and 2.7 per cent in 1987. This figure includes the federal, provincial, and local levels of government. This growth is considerably slower than the rates of increase in previous years, and considerably slower than the national increases of 4.9 and 5.9 per cent in 1986 and 1987 respectively. Limited statistical information is available to indicate the level of total government expenditure in 1988 on Prince Edward Island.

The value of international exports from Prince Edward Island declined 13.1 per cent in 1988 to a level of \$140.2 million although a change by Statistics Canada in the system of reporting international trade statistics means the figures are not necessarily comparable. The United States was the destination of 63.0 per cent of the Island's exports in 1988. These consist primarily of fish and vegetable products.

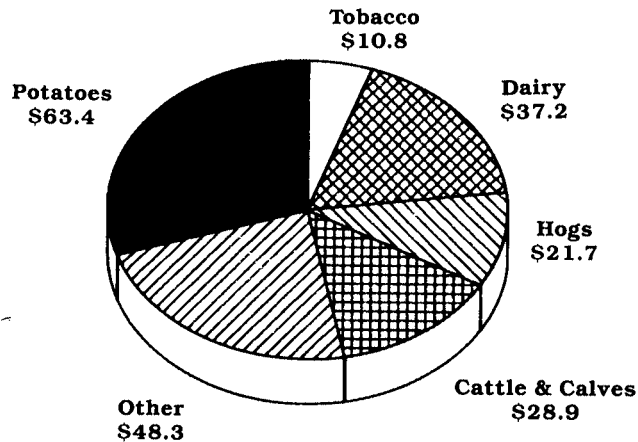
8. SECTOR DETAIL

(a) Agriculture

The agricultural sector of the Prince Edward Island economy suffered a number of setbacks in 1988. Total farm cash receipts were \$210.3 million in 1988, a decline of 1.7 per cent, and farmers received financial assistance through federal and provincial agricultural support programs. Diagram 5 shows the composition of farm cash receipts in 1988 for Prince Edward Island. The sale of potatoes formed the largest component of farm cash receipts at 30.1 per cent. Total farm cash receipts from the sale of crops declined by 13.4 per cent in 1988. The most significant decline was in farm cash receipts from the sale of potatoes which fell to \$63.4 million in 1988 from \$80.8 million in 1987. Farm cash receipts for potatoes improved in the October to December 1988 period increasing by 56.5 per cent over the same period in 1987 largely as a result of higher potato prices. The volume of potato production in 1988 according to Agriculture Canada was 16.4 million cwts, an increase of 2.4 per cent over the 1987 crop as both acreage planted and yields increased only marginally from 1987. The Agriculture Canada estimate of potato production for 1988 was the result of a bin count in February 1989, and is considerably lower than Statistics Canada's November 1988 report of potato production of 19.2 million cwts.

(MILLIONS \$)**



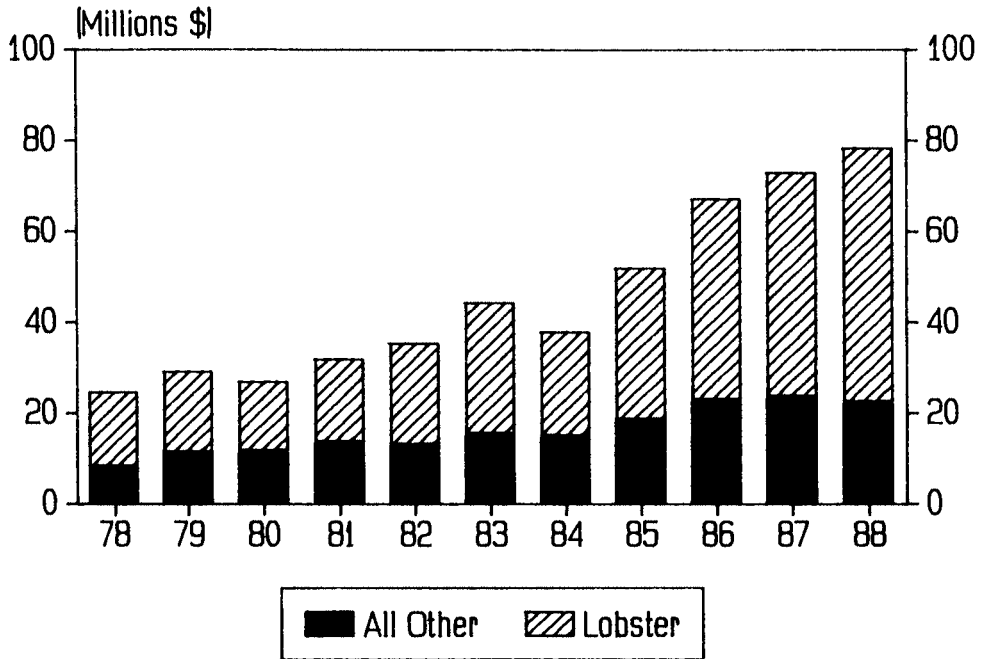
Total farm cash receipts from the sale of livestock and products decreased by 0.9 per cent in 1988 to measure \$95.7 million. Receipts from hogs declined by 17.9 per cent due to sharply lower hog prices, and receipts from cattle declined by 1.9 per cent as beef slaughtering is estimated to have declined by 5.6 per cent. Lower hog prices resulted in farmers receiving payments of \$5.8 million from the provincial income stabilization program. Farm cash receipts for the dairy sector rose to \$37.2 million in 1988 from \$31.9 million in 1987 as the dairy sector increased output of milk and cream in the first eleven months of 1988 by 6.9 per cent over the same period in 1987.

(b) Fishing

The fishing industry enjoyed another good year in 1988 with the total value of fish landings at a record level of \$78.3 million. Lobster landings increased by 18.6 per cent in 1988 to reach a record level of 22.4 million pounds, and a record value of \$56.1 million. Diagram 6 shows the value of fish landings in the last decade by lobster and all other species and fishery products. In the diagram, the increased value of the lobster catch in the last ten years stands out as it has increased from \$16.6 million in 1978 to \$56.1 million in 1988, while all other species and fish products increased from \$8.0 million to \$22.2 million in 1988. Over the period 1978 to 1988 lobster became increasingly important as a percentage of total value of fish landings, rising to 71.6 per cent in 1988 from 67.8 per cent in 1978.

The total groundfish landings in 1988 valued \$4.6 million, a decline of 38.4 per cent from 1987. Lower prices on average for groundfish were responsible for the decrease in value as the weight of groundfish landings in 1988 increased by 7.1 per cent. Pelagic and estuarial landings in 1988 declined 14.0 per cent in terms of volume with most of the decline being due to lower landings of mackerel. Accordingly the value of pelagic and estuarial landings declined in 1988 by 11.6 per cent to value \$4.3 million. The value of landings of shellfish other than lobster was \$10.6 million in 1988, an increase of 19.4 per cent over 1987. Mussels and oysters both increased substantially in 1988 in terms of value and weight landed.

(c) Forestry

Statistical information on the Prince Edward Island forestry sector is limited. The 1986 Census indicates that the labour force involved in Logging and Forestry Services was 430, or 0.7 per cent of the total labour force. The Department of Energy and Forestry estimates that forest production increased by 13.1 per cent in 1988 to total 561,000 cubic metres of which 55.3 per cent was used as fuelwood.

(d) Manufacturing

Manufacturing accounted for 6.3 per cent of Gross Domestic Product on Prince Edward Island in 1988 according to the Conference Board of Canada. The processing of fish and farm products in 1988 formed approximately 72 per cent of manufacturing on Prince Edward Island. Manufacturing shipments in current dollars increased by 3.0 per cent in 1988 to value \$351.9 million. Dairy products shipments experienced a 9.0 per cent increase in 1988 and accounted for 19.5 per cent of total manufacturing shipments. The value of fish products shipments declined by 6.3 per cent in 1988 to measure \$65.2 million. According to Statistics Canada's Labour Force Survey, monthly employment in manufacturing averaged 5,000 in 1988 as compared to 4,000 in 1987.

(e) Construction

Residential construction rose in 1988 to a level of 1,151 housing starts, consisting of 704 single unit dwellings and 447 multiple unit dwellings. This level of housing starts is the highest since 1978. Non-residential construction is estimated to have increased to \$145.6 million from \$119.5 million in 1987. Monthly employment in the construction industry averaged 3,000 in 1988.

(f) Transportation and Utilities

The transportation, communications, and utilities sector in 1988 represented approximately 7.9 per cent of provincial Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost. The three ferry systems operating from Borden, Wood Islands, and Souris, carried 2,382,577 passengers in 1988, an increase of 3.4 per cent over 1987. The number of automobiles transported on the three ferries increased by 4.6 per cent in 1988 to reach a level of 727,415. Railway traffic continued to decline with only 1,001 railcars moved on the ferry system in 1988 as compared to 1,596 in 1987. One can compare this to the 22,197 railcars that were transported ten years ago.

Total electrical supply increased by 8.8 per cent in 1988 to reach an average monthly figure of 58,664 Mwh. Energy prices in 1988 increased to \$50.20 per month for domestic use of 500 Kwh of electricity from \$45.41 in 1987. The table below presents the average cost of electricity to Islanders from 1981 to 1988.

(g) Services

The services sector (excluding public administration) includes wholesale and retail trade, financial services, accommodation and food services, health and welfare, education, and various services to business. These sectors in 1988 accounted for 44.2 per cent of Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost according to the Conference Board of Canada. Employment in 1988 in this sector, according to Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Payroll, and Hours, totalled 22,000. The largest component of services consists of the Community, Business, and Personal Services sector for which monthly employment in 1988 averaged 13,800. In the other service sectors, wholesale and retail trade employed 6,700 and the financial services employed 1,500.

Government activities in public administration and defense on Prince Edward Island accounted for 18.0 per cent of Gross Domestic Product at Factor Cost in 1988 according to the Conference Board of Canada. Total expenditures by the local, provincial and federal levels of government, excluding intergovernmental transfers were \$1,173 million in 1987, the latest year for which statistics are available.

Total revenues received by all levels of government, excluding intergovernmental transfers, in 1987 totalled \$651 million. The revenue sources in 1987 to all levels of government consisted of \$271 million in direct taxes from persons, \$55 million in direct taxes from corporate and government business enterprises, \$173 million in indirect taxes, \$124 million from investment income, and \$28 million in other revenues. Expenditures by all levels of government exceeded revenues on Prince Edward Island by \$550 million in 1987. This is largely attributable to the excess of federal spending over revenues of \$574 million in 1987. Federal transfers to the provincial government valued \$247 million in 1987.

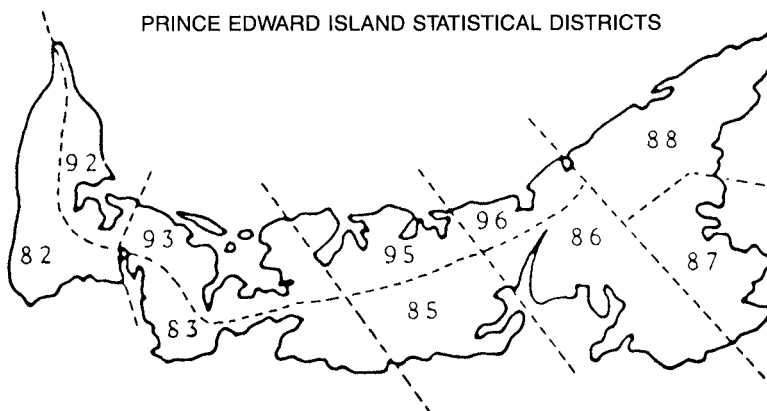
