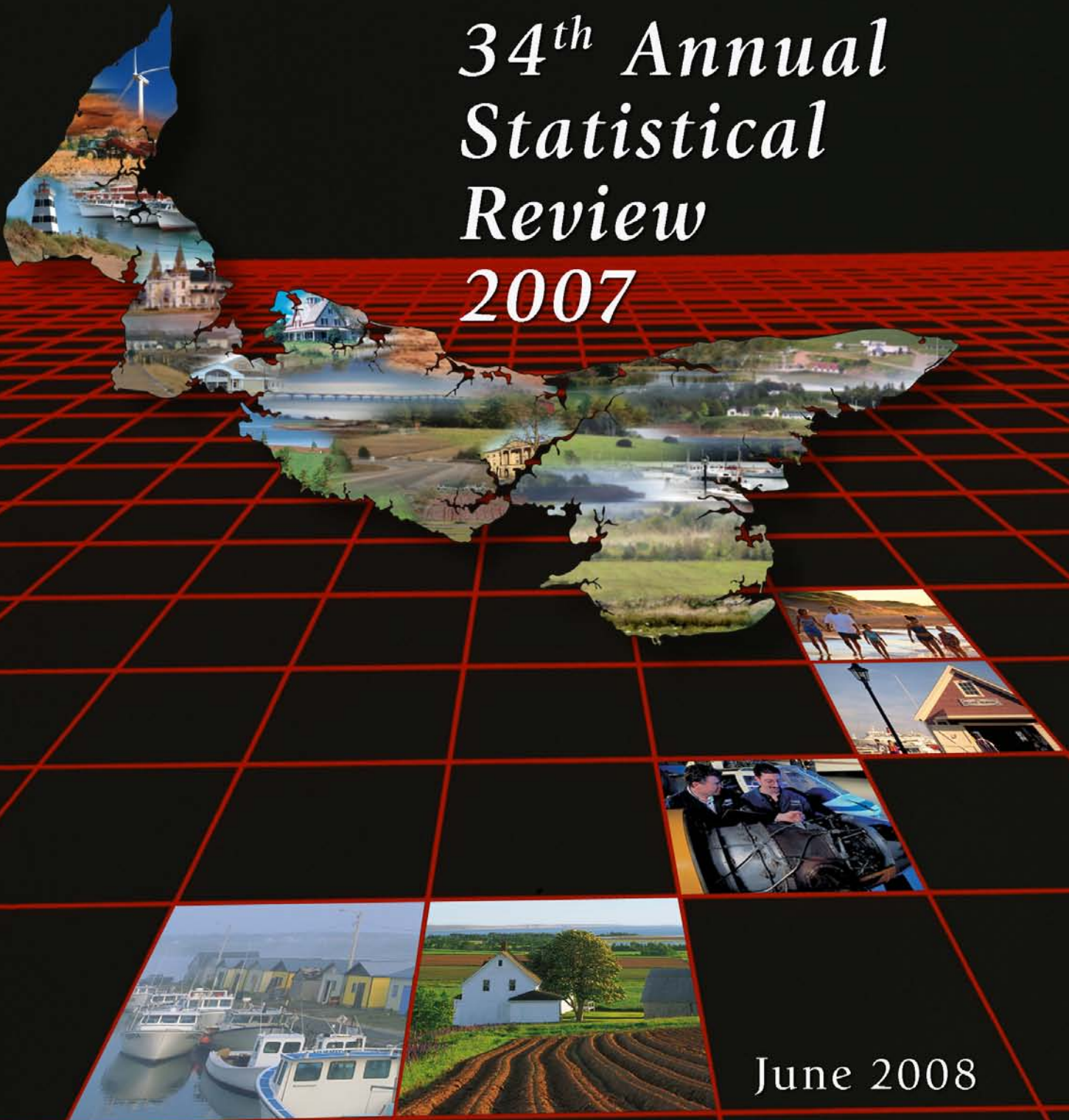

All statistics are referenced to their original source and the reader is encouraged to consult these documents for related or more detailed information on topics of particular interest.

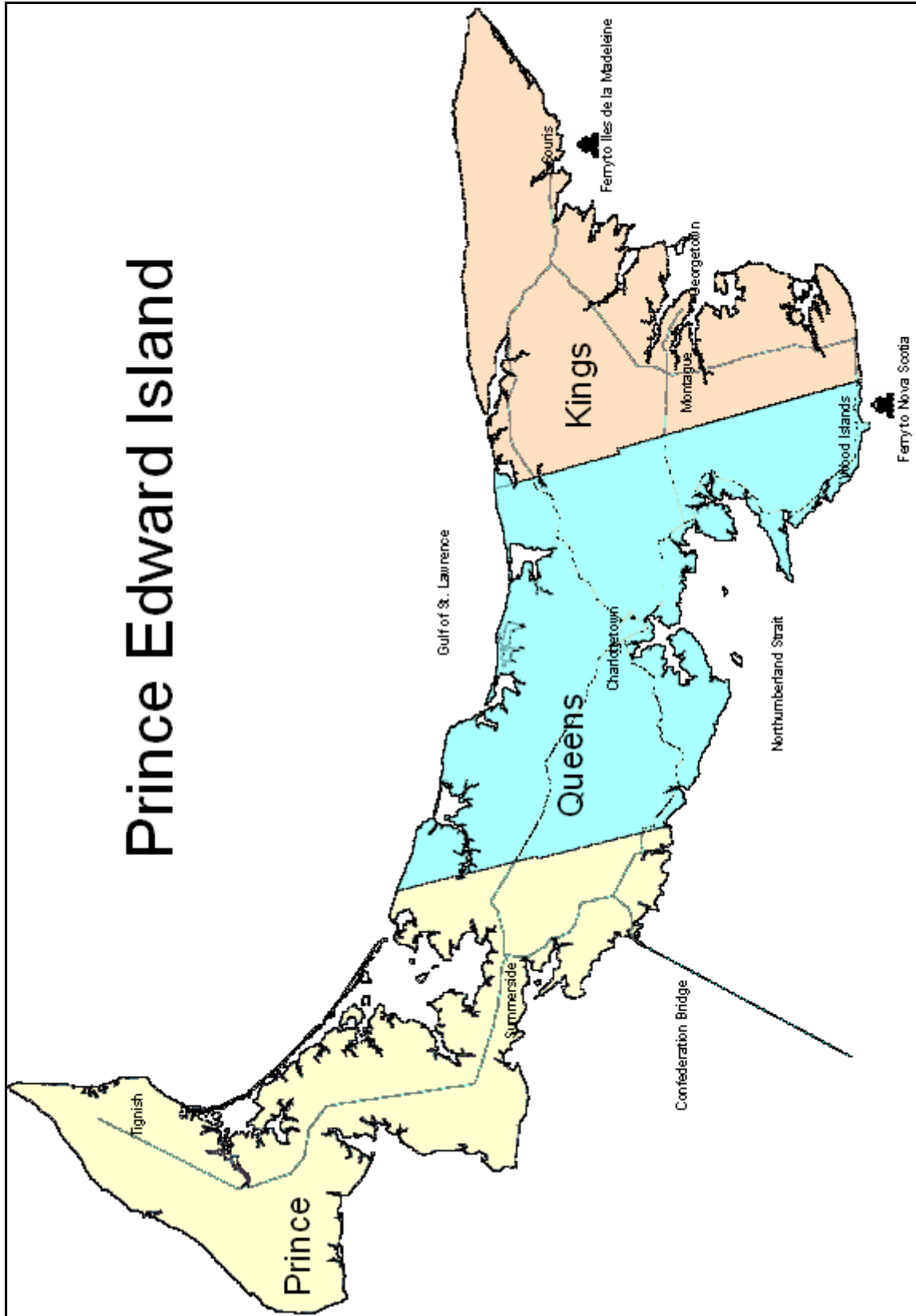

A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq people for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwithk*, meaning "cradled on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint-Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation," because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings ⁽¹⁾ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties – Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

Economic Review 2007

Overview

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 2.7 per cent in 2007, matching the growth in 2006, while the Prince Edward Island economy grew by 2.0 per cent in 2007. Economic performance on Prince Edward Island in 2007 benefited from solid retail sales growth and positive employment gains. The value of Prince Edward Island's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) at market prices for 2007 is estimated to be \$4,538 million.

Statistics Canada's estimates of GDP by industry indicate that in 2007 the leading growth sectors in the province were: *manufacturing* (up by \$22.0 million or 5.2 per cent), *finance, insurance and real estate* (up by \$21.6 million or 3.2 per cent), *retail trade* (up by \$14.6 million or 5.8 per cent) and *fishing* (up by \$14.4 million or 19.7 per cent).

The general rise in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 1.8 per cent in 2007. Leading factors contributing to this rise were higher prices for *food* (up by 3.4 per cent), *shelter* (up by 2.8 per cent) and *energy* (up by 2.7 per cent). In Canada prices increased by 2.2 per cent in 2007.

Employment on Prince Edward Island expanded by 1.0 per cent in 2007 to average 69,300 for the year, an all-time high for the second straight year. Total labour income increased by 5.5 per cent that year. The unemployment rate averaged 10.3 per cent in 2007, down from 11.0 per cent in 2006, reaching a 29-year low.

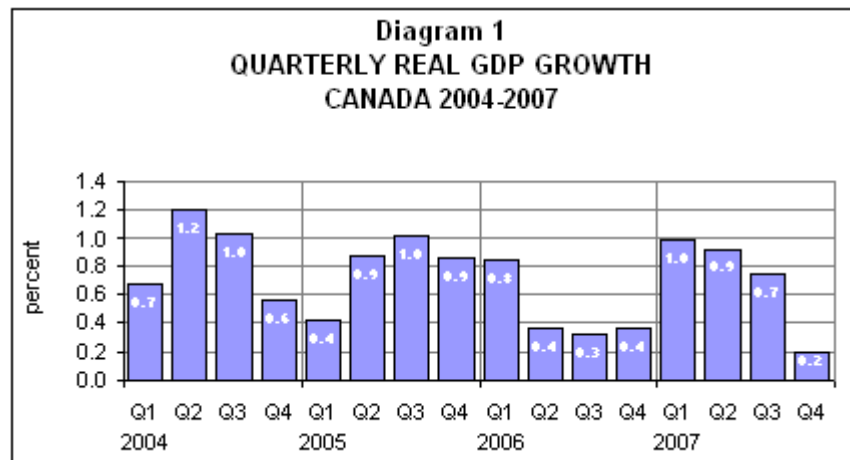
Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island declined by 3.9 per cent to \$1,431.6 million in 2007, after reaching an all-time high in 2006. According to Industry Canada, the value of Prince Edward Island's international exports of goods decreased from \$838.0 million in 2006 to \$802.8 million in 2007, a decrease of 4.2 per cent.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in more detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2007.

The Canadian Economy

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy grew by 2.7 per cent in 2007. This matches the growth rate experienced in 2006, and is slightly down from the 2005 rate of 3.1 per cent. The Canadian economy appears to have been less affected by the slowdown in the United States economy in 2007. World demand for commodities at record prices and a strong labour market have offset the impact of the rise in the Canadian dollar and the slowdown in the U.S. economy. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2004 and 2007.

After a strong expansion of 1.0 per cent in the first quarter of 2007, the economy grew by 0.9 per cent in the second quarter, followed by 0.7 per cent in the third quarter. To finish the year, real GDP increased by 0.2 per cent in the fourth quarter, keeping year-over-year growth steady at 2.7 per cent.



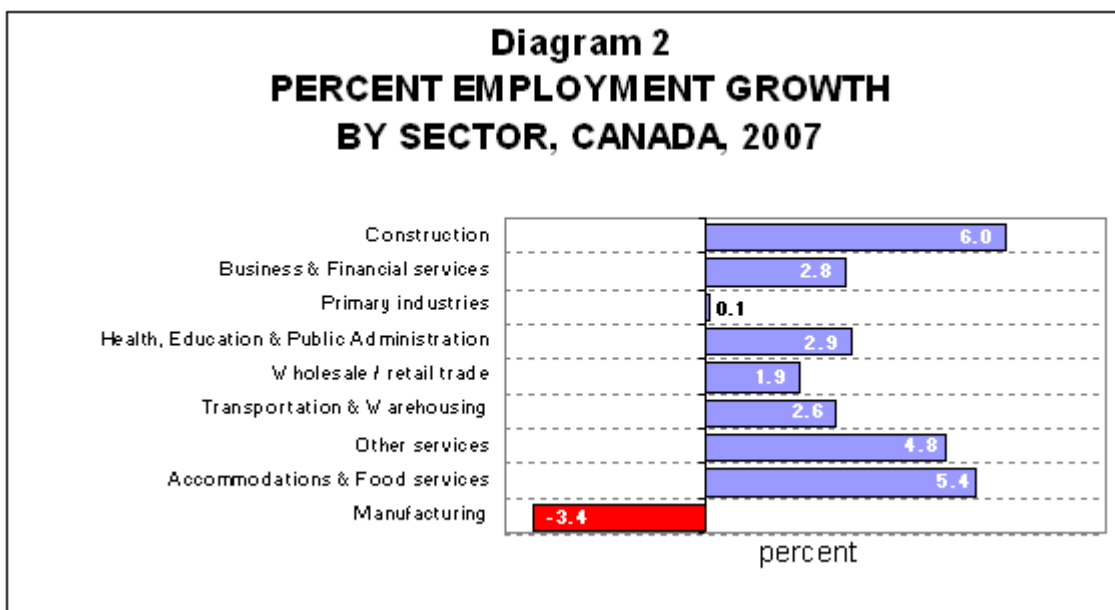

Final domestic demand continued to drive output led by *consumer spending* (up by \$50.5 billion or 6.3 per cent) followed by *gross fixed capital formation* (up by \$23.1 billion or 7.3 per cent) and *Government expenditures* (up by \$18.3 billion or 6.5 per cent). Partially offsetting economic growth were import gains (up 3.4 per cent), which outpaced exports (up 2.5 per cent).

Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods and services rose from \$803.5 billion in 2006 to \$854.0 billion in 2007, an increase of 6.3 per cent. Current dollar spending in 2007 on durable goods rose by 5.9 per cent, while expenditures on semi-durables and non-durables increased by 5.3 per cent and 5.2 per cent, respectively. Expenditures on services increased by 7.0 per cent that year.

The average Canadian inflation rate, as measured by the *All-Items Consumer Price Index*, rose from 2.0 per cent in 2006 to 2.2 per cent in 2007. The annual increase was largely the result of higher prices for *housing* (up by 3.4 per cent), *tobacco and alcohol* (up by 3.1 per cent) and *food* (up by 2.7 per cent).

National employment rose from 16.5 million in 2006 to 16.9 million in 2007, an increase of 2.3 per cent. Employment in the goods-producing sector grew slightly by 7,800 jobs, while the service-providing sector expanded by 373,000 jobs. As shown in Diagram 2, job creation in 2007 was strongest in the *construction industry* (6.0 per cent), in the *accommodation and food services industry* (5.4 per cent) and *other services* (4.8 per cent). Employment declined in the *manufacturing* sector for the second straight year. The national unemployment rate fell from 6.3 per cent in 2006 to 6.0 per cent in 2007.

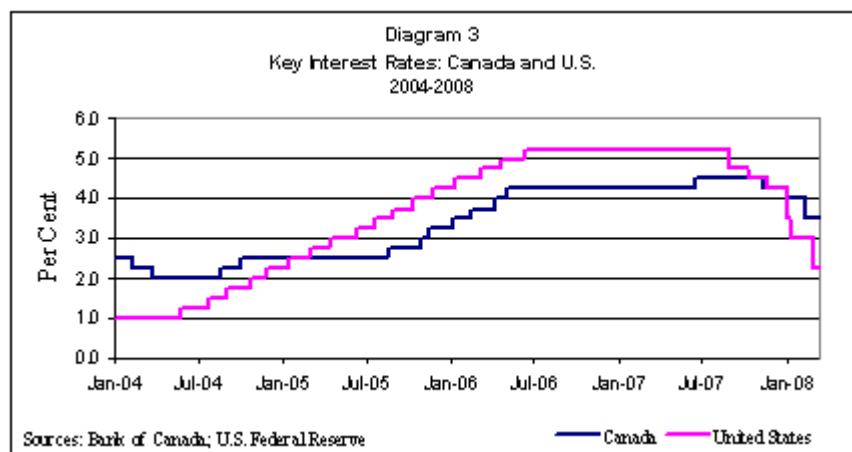
The United States witnessed a fourth quarter growth rate of 0.6 per cent in 2007, and saw a moderate annual GDP growth rate of 2.2 per cent. This is somewhat lower than the 2006 growth rate of 3.1 per cent. One of the key features of the American economy in 2007 was the expansion of the sub-prime mortgage situation into broader financial markets. There was a significant increase in the number of defaults in sub-prime mortgages in the wake of falling housing prices, causing credit standards to become more restrictive, further depressing housing demand, and increasing foreclosures. These events caused investors to re-evaluate their risk, and has resulted in a movement away from asset-backed securities, and the

continued fragility of commercial paper. From closing highs in October 2007, most major indices have seen declines in the area of 10 per cent, erasing most of the gains seen through 2007.

The key overnight rate set by the Bank of Canada held steady through the end of 2006 and most of 2007 at 4.25 per cent. July 2007 saw an increase in the overnight rate by 25 basis points, which stayed constant until the overnight rate was reduced in December back to 4.25 per cent. This rate was further lowered to 4.0 per cent in January of 2008, and lowered again in March 2008 to 3.5 per cent where it continues to hold. The bank has indicated that future monetary stimulus

is likely to be required in the near term, signaling the potential for future rate cuts. As can be seen in Diagram 3, rates in both Canada and the United States were quite steady through the first half of 2007, with the American interest rate

75 basis points above the Canadian rate.



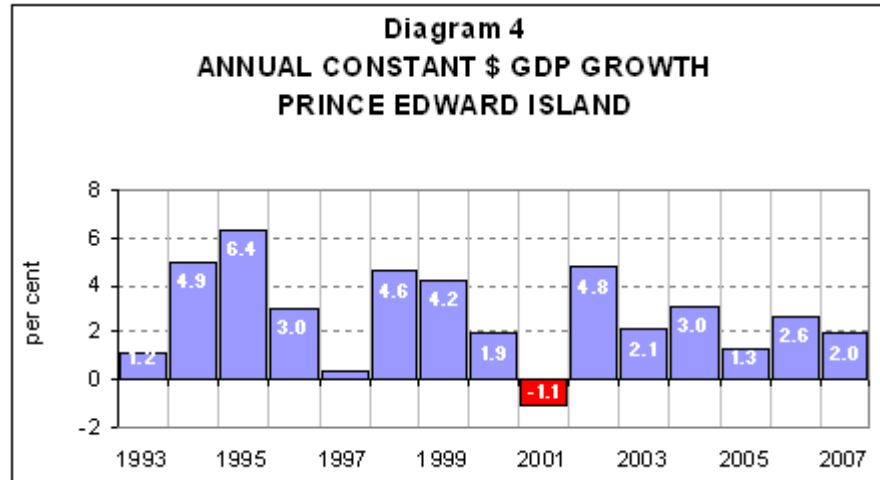
However throughout the second half of 2007 and the beginning of 2008 interest rates in Canada and the United States both began to trend downward, with the United States cutting its rate dramatically and Canada first increasing, then decreasing the overnight rate at a more gradual pace.

The Prince Edward Island Economy

Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada’s preliminary estimates indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 2.0 per cent in chained 2002 dollars in 2007, after experiencing 2.6 per cent growth in 2006.

Diagram 4 shows growth in real provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) since 1993. The value of provincial GDP at market prices for 2007 is estimated by Statistics Canada to be \$4,538 million. For more information about GDP see Tables 34 to 40 (pages 60 to 65).

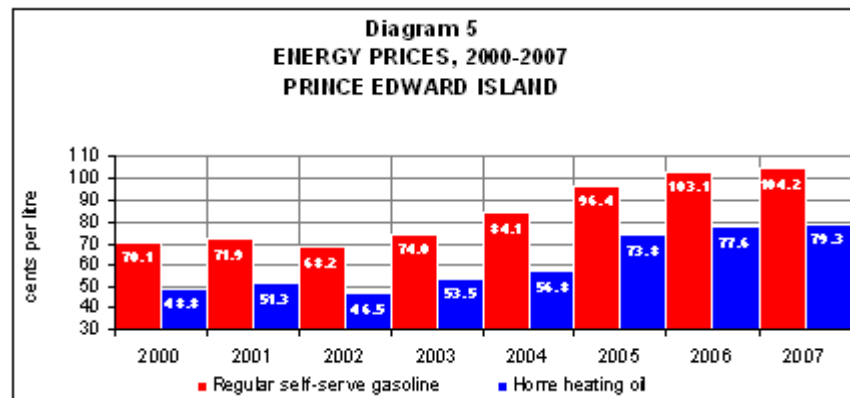

Consumer Prices

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island rose by 1.8 per cent in 2007, compared to 2.2 per cent nationally. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 1.3 per cent that year.

Energy inflation slowed from 4.9 per cent in 2006 to 2.7 per cent in 2007. Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince



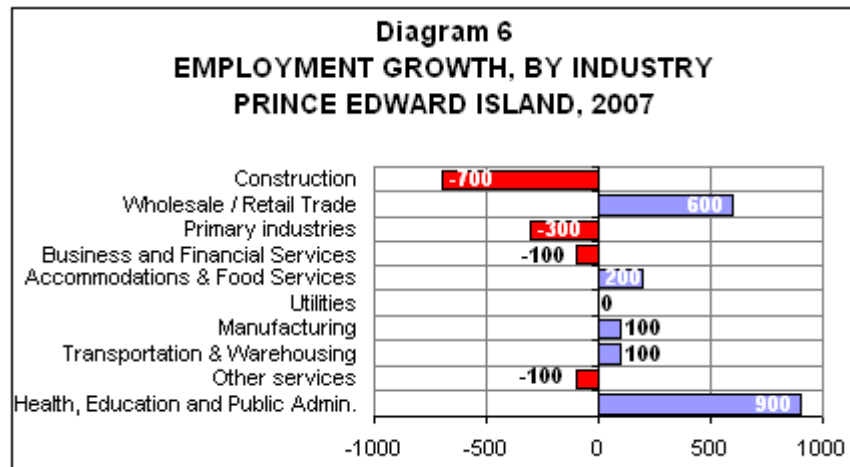

Edward Island between 2000 and 2007. According to Statistics Canada, gasoline sold for an average price of \$1.042 per litre in Charlottetown in 2007, an increase of 1.1 per cent from 2006. Heating oil sold for an average price \$0.793 cents per litre in 2007, up by 2.3 per cent from 2006. For more information see Tables 41 and 42 (pages 66 and 67).

Labour Force

Total employment on Prince Edward Island rose from 68,600 in 2006 to 69,300 in 2007, an increase of 1.0 per cent and an all-time high. Employment in the goods-producing sector fell by 5.1 per cent in 2007, while employment in the service-providing sector grew by 3.5 per cent.

Diagram 6 indicates that a total of 1,900 jobs were created in the trade, accommodation and food, manufacturing, transportation and warehousing, and health, education and public administration services in 2007. The loss of



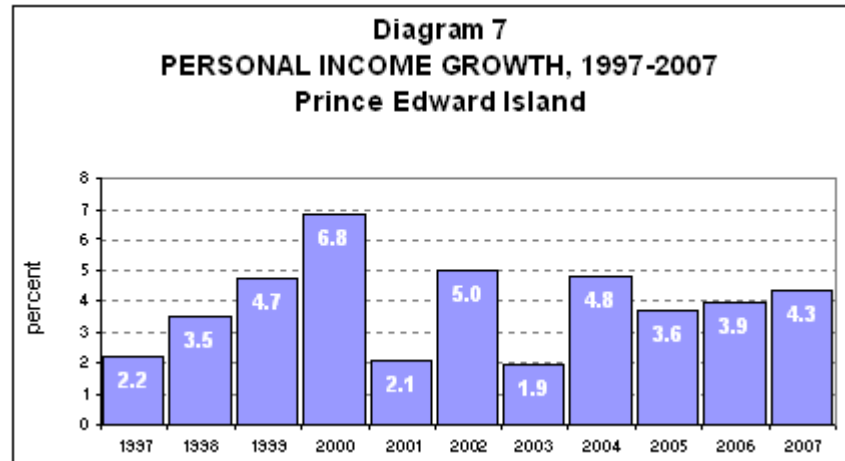

1,200 jobs in the other sectors of the economy accounted for the total gain of 700 jobs. As a result the average unemployment rate fell from 11.0 per cent in 2006 to 10.3 per cent in 2007, the lowest unemployment rate for PEI since 1978. The labour force participation rate declined slightly from 68.7 per cent in 2006 to 68.2 per cent in 2007. For more information about the labour force see Tables 16 to 20 (pages 48 to 50).

Income

Statistics Canada estimates that personal income for Prince Edward Island rose from \$3,753 million in 2006 to \$3,915 million in 2007, an increase of

4.3 per cent. Diagram 7

shows personal income

growth from 1997 to 2007. The contributors to growth in 2007 were *labour income* (up by \$114 million), *Government transfers to persons* (up by \$44 million), *interest, dividends and other investments* (up by \$25 million) and *net unincorporated non-farm business income* (up by \$9 million).

Employment Insurance (EI) benefits paid on Prince Edward Island in 2007 were 1.7 per cent higher than a year earlier at \$221.9 million. The value of regular EI benefits rose by 3.8 per cent, while fishing benefits decreased by 0.9 per cent. Sickness benefits rose by 22.4 per cent in 2007, while maternity benefits grew by 5.5 per cent. For more information on personal income see Tables 22 to 29 (pages 52 to 56).

Population

On July 1, 2007, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated at 138,627, an increase of 600 persons or 0.4 per cent from 2006. This was well below the national average of 1.0 per cent. Between July 1, 2006, and June 30, 2007, the total number of Island births increased slightly by 0.4 per cent to an estimated 1,348, while the number of deaths is estimated to be 1,282, an increase of 1.7 per cent. Thus population growth by natural increase amounted to 66 during that period.

In addition to natural increase, preliminary data show that 695 immigrants chose Prince Edward Island as their new home in 2006/07, a new high for net international migration. The following table illustrates interprovincial migration flows to and from Prince Edward Island.

Net interprovincial migration was -266, with Alberta and Ontario being the top two destinations.

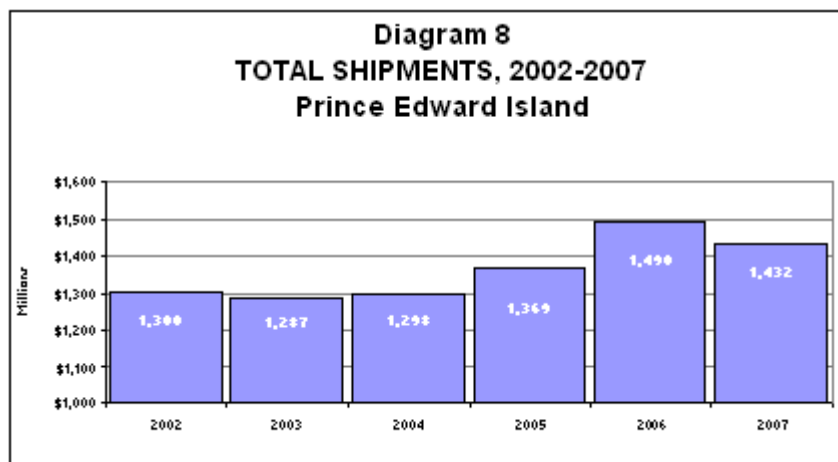
The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 to 40.3 years in 2007. Furthermore, while 11 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion had risen to 14.5 per cent in 2007.

According to the *2006 Census of Population* count on May 16, 2006, there were 135,851 persons living on Prince Edward Island. Revised population estimates based on the 2006 Census will be published by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2008. For more information on population and Census see Tables 1 to 15 (pages 33 to 47).

Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

Diagram 8 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2007 to 2002. Increased shipments were seen in processed fish products (up 3.5 per cent) and chemicals (up 31.0 per cent) in 2007. However, these gains were offset in

part by a decrease in fabricated metal manufacturing shipments, down 67.4 per cent from 2006 levels. Consequently, the value of 2007 manufacturing shipments decreased by 3.9 per cent relative to 2006 figures, to a value of \$1,431.6 million. For more information on the manufacturing sector see Tables 79 and 80 (pages 89 and 90).

In 2007 the manufacturing sector provided 9.7 per cent of all employment on Prince Edward Island, making it the second largest private sector employer after the retail trade sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector was 6,700.

Exports

According to Industry Canada, the total value of exported goods fell slightly from \$838.0 million in 2006 to \$802.8 million in 2007, a decrease of 4.2 per cent. Exports of *agriculture and fishing products* made up 66.9 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2007. However, its value fell from \$523.0 million in 2006 to \$512.9 million in 2007, a decrease of 1.9 per cent. Other Island exports, valued at \$254.4 million, included \$120.8 million in *machinery and equipment* (up by 46.4 per cent from 2006), \$14.1 million in *industrial goods* (down by 23.8 per cent) and \$119.3 million in other Island-made products (down by 26.6 per cent). The value of Island *forestry product* shipments fell from \$10.4 million in 2006 to \$6.3 million in 2007, a decline of 39.4 per cent. For more export data see Tables 47 and 48 (page 72).

Agriculture

The Island's primary industries in 2007 did not keep pace with their record-setting performance in 2006. As can be seen in Table 2, total farm cash receipts in 2007 declined by 3.1 per cent. Crop receipts declined by 8.0 per cent. A 7.9 per cent decline in the volume of the 2007 potato crop along with reduced potato prices caused receipts to decline by 11.4 per cent for the year. Improving wheat prices and barley production helped to increase receipts for other crops by 15.5 per cent per cent. A 4.2 per cent increase in livestock receipts was led by an 8.1 per cent increase in dairy receipts.

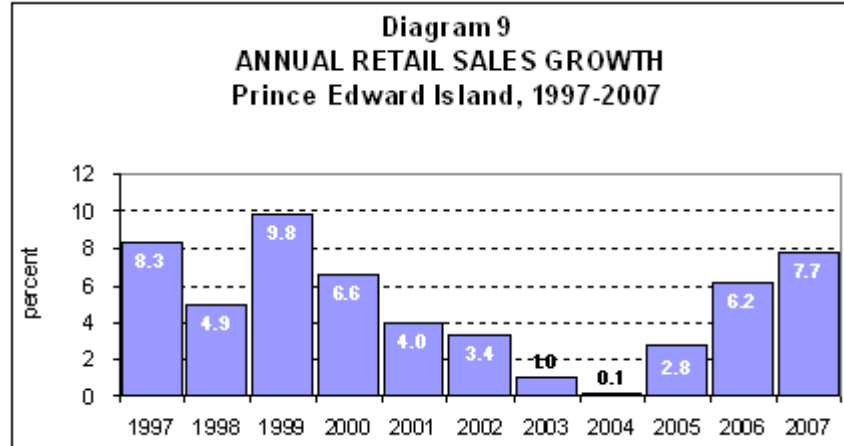

Continued low prices for hogs have depressed hog receipts on PEI for the third consecutive year. Cattle receipts improved by 7.1 per cent. Direct payments to farmers increased by 8.1 per cent in 2007 to total \$23.1 million. For more data see Tables 57 to 69 (pages 78 to 84).

Retail Trade

Diagram 9 shows that the upward trend in retail sales, which started in 2005, continued into 2007. Sales were valued at \$1,628.9 million, up by 7.7 per cent from the previous year. Growth was driven by increased

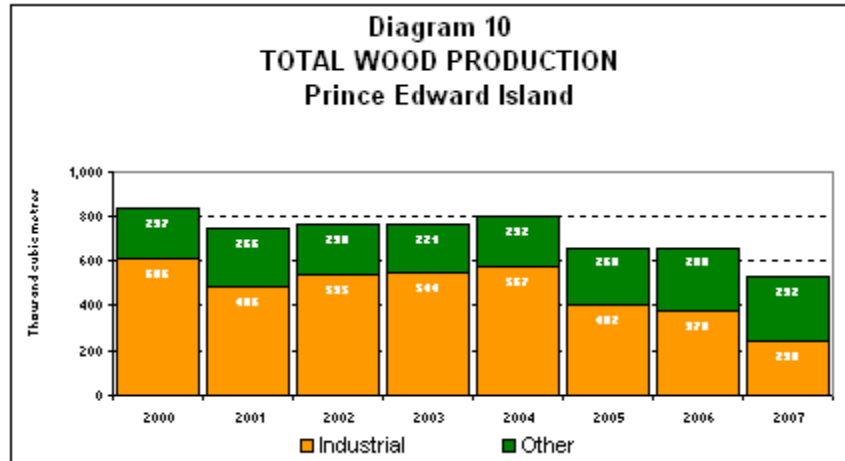
spending at gasoline stations (up \$27.9 million), new car dealers (up \$20.1 million), and pharmacies (up \$13.3 million), while spending was reduced at sporting goods, hobby, music and book stores (down \$2.0 million). Higher sales of new motor vehicles together with increased sales at used car dealerships contributed to overall growth in the retail sector in 2007. That year 5,303 new vehicles (up by 7.5 per cent from 2006) were sold with a total value of \$140.3 million (up 7.9 per cent from 2006). Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector rose by 6.1 per cent to 10,500 people in 2007, making it the largest private sector employer in the province. For information about this sector see Tables 45 and 46 (pages 70 and 71).

Fisheries and Forestry

The Department of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Rural Development estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2007 fell by 2.9 per cent to \$166.8 million. Molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Island fishery comprising 93.7 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Lobster landings fell from 21.5 million lbs. to 20.1 million lbs., a decrease of 6.3 per cent. Landings of other crustaceans and molluscs fell by 3.7 per cent in 2007. Lobster prices rose by 2.3 per cent to \$5.40/lb.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish were 12.2 per cent lower than last year. Fish prices decreased in 2007 for most species except for mackerel (up by 22.3 per cent to 34.0 cents/lb.) and herring (up by 14.9 per cent to 10.0 cents/lb.). The harvesting of sea plants fell by 43.4 per cent. For more data on fisheries see Tables 71 to 75 (pages 85 to 87).

The PEI Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island decreased from 658,000 cubic metres in 2006 to 530,000 cubic metres in 2007, a decrease of 19.5 per cent. Diagram 10 shows wood production since 2000.

Industrial wood production decreased by 37.0 per cent in 2007, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips grew by 4.3 per cent. For more data see Table 70 (page 85).

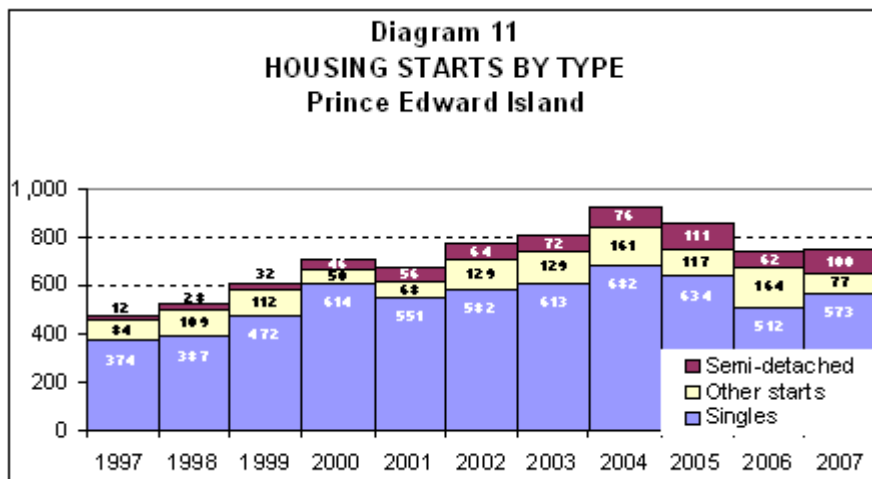
Tourism

The PEI Department of Tourism estimated that 1.4 million tourists visited the Island in 2007, a 1.1 per cent increase over 2006. Occupancy rates province-wide were up 1.8 per cent for the year after being down slightly in 2006. Air traffic increased by about 12.3 per cent, due in part to new seasonal direct flights to Boston and Detroit. The department estimates that year-round resident and non-resident tourist expenditures totaled \$354.3 million in 2007, an increase of 4.4 per cent from the previous year.

Construction and Investment

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island was \$943.7 million in 2007, an increase of 14.1 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment fell from \$227.1 million in 2006 to \$209.8 million in 2007, a decrease of 7.6 per cent, while private sector investment rose by 22.3 per cent, from \$600.2 million in 2006 to \$734.0 million in 2007. For more information on Investment and Construction see Tables 49 to 56 (pages 73 to 77).

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimated that there were 750 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2007, an increase of 1.6 per cent from 2006. As seen in

Diagram 11, the increase was due to increases in single and semi-detached home construction, whereas the other *starts* category (consisting mainly of apartment building construction) fell by 53.0 per cent from 164 units in 2006 to 77 units in 2007.

According to Statistics Canada, investment in non-residential construction on Prince Edward Island was valued at \$93.9 million, a decrease of 35.3 per cent from 2006. Major non-residential construction projects were completed in 2007, including the new Jean Canfield Federal building and various major projects on the University of PEI campus.

Transportation

Prince Edward Island can be reached by land, water and air. For four consecutive years, the total number of passengers travelling through the Charlottetown Airport has been on the increase. In 2007, 127,209 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (up 11.9 per cent from 2006), while 126,015 people left the province by air (up by 12.7 per cent). Total air passenger traffic was up by 12.3 per cent compared to 2006.

In 2006 the volume of product received at Island seaports, including fertilizer, sand, stone and gravel, had a total weight of 432,686 metric tonnes, down by 23.3 per cent from the previous year. During the same period 57,230 metric tonnes of water freight, mainly potatoes, pulpwood and firewood, were shipped from Summerside and Georgetown ports.

Construction at the Charlottetown wharf prevented any freight being loaded in Charlottetown. More transportation data can be found in Tables 84 to 90 (pages 95 and 96).

The Public Service Sector

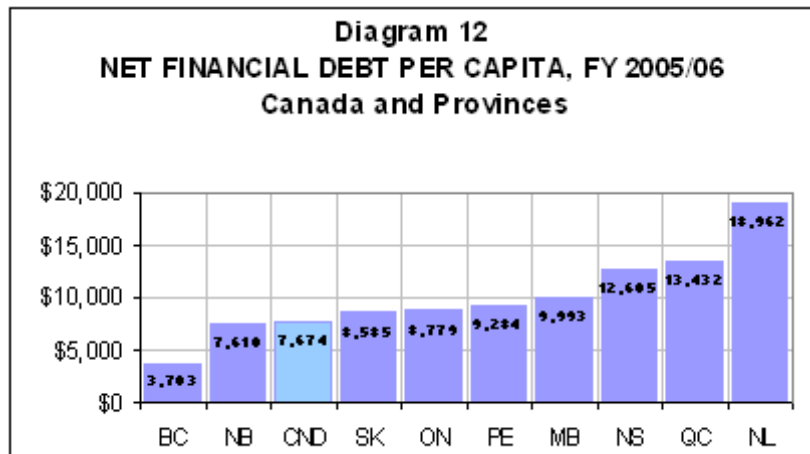
According to Statistics Canada, in 2007 the public service sector, comprising education, health and social services and public administration, accounted for 28.4 per cent of the Island economy and 28.3 per cent of total employment. Real public sector GDP in chained 2002 dollars rose by 1.4 per cent in 2007, slightly lower than the 2.0 per cent growth recorded in 2006.

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 3.7 per cent in 2007. Employment in *education* services had an increase of 4.3 per cent that year, while employment in the *health and social services* sector grew by 3.4 per cent.

Provincial Finance

The Province of Prince Edward Island received \$1,230.5 million in total revenue in fiscal year (FY) 2006/07, 5.2 per cent higher than in FY 2005/06. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$739.2 million that year, an increase of 4.0 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 38.6 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2006/07 compared to 38.0 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments increased by 5.3 per cent to value \$291.3 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 6.0 per cent to total \$132.8 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures rose by 3.2 per cent to reach \$1,206.6 million.

The provincial *Public Accounts* indicate that the surplus on the Consolidated Fund for FY 2006/07 was \$23.9 million. This result compares to the deficit of \$125.1 million in FY 2003/04. As of March 31, 2007, the provincial net debt was \$1,312 million. Diagram 12 shows Prince Edward Island's ranking of its net financial debt per capita among the provinces in FY 2005/06. 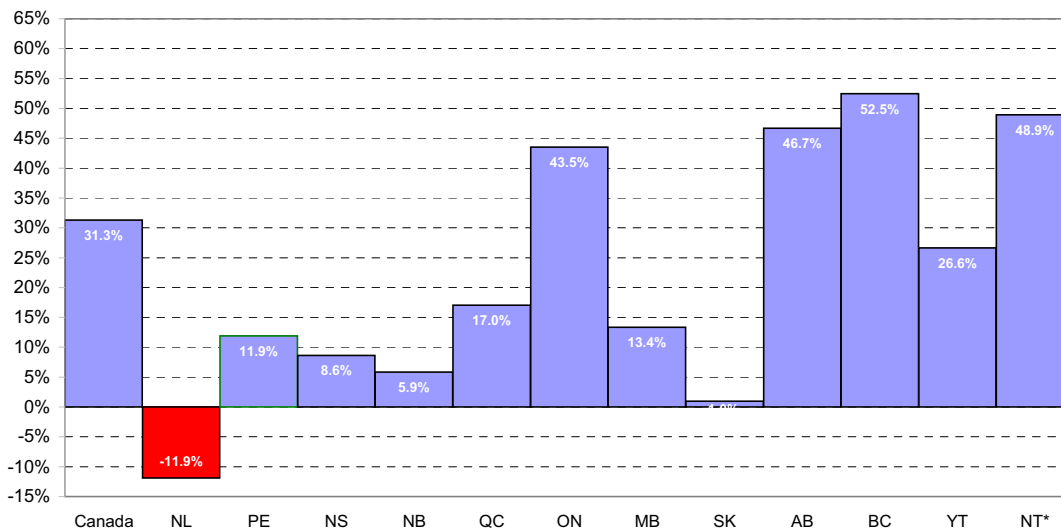

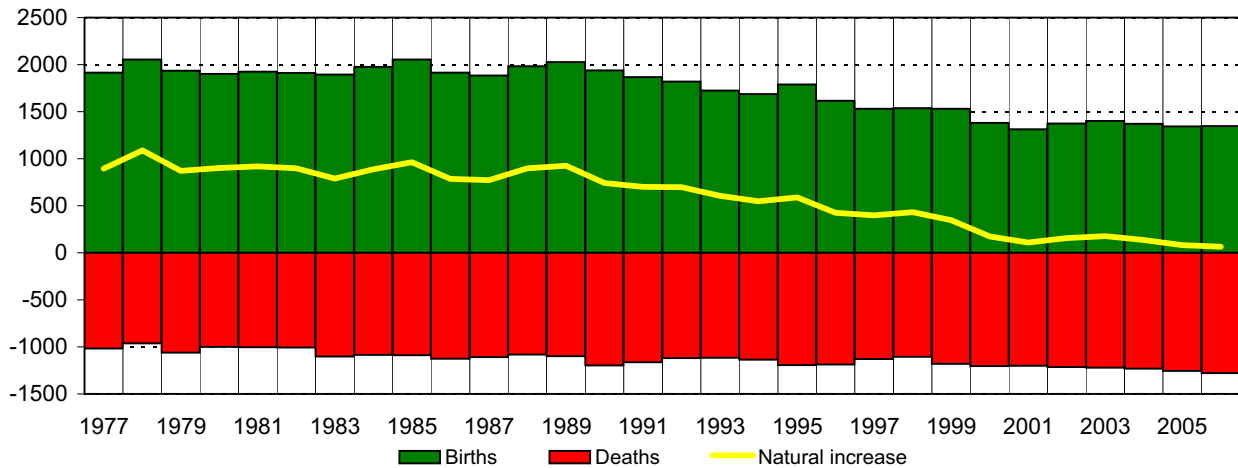

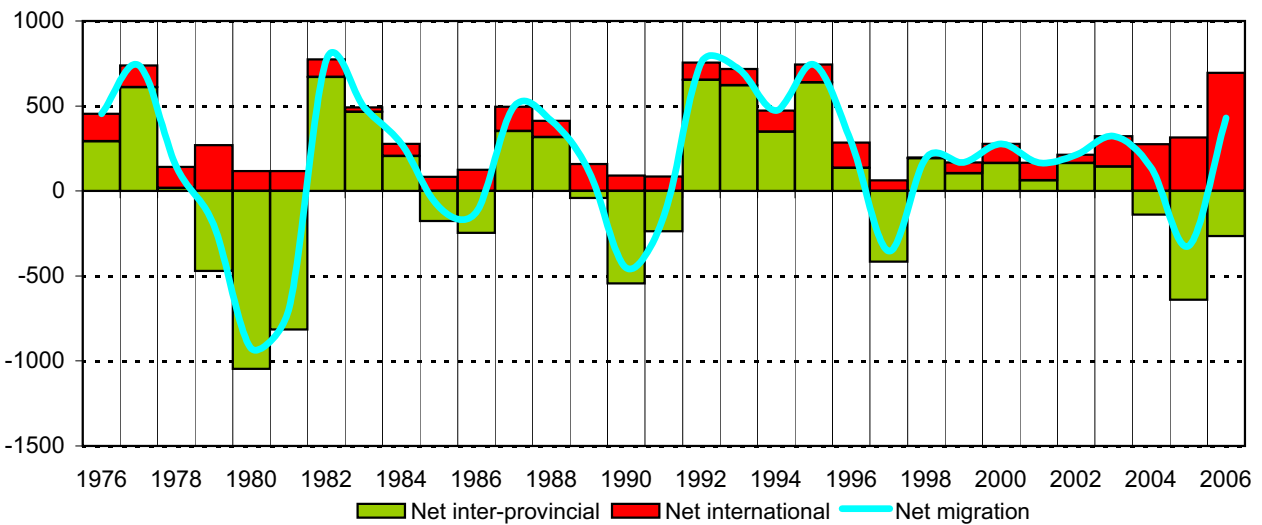

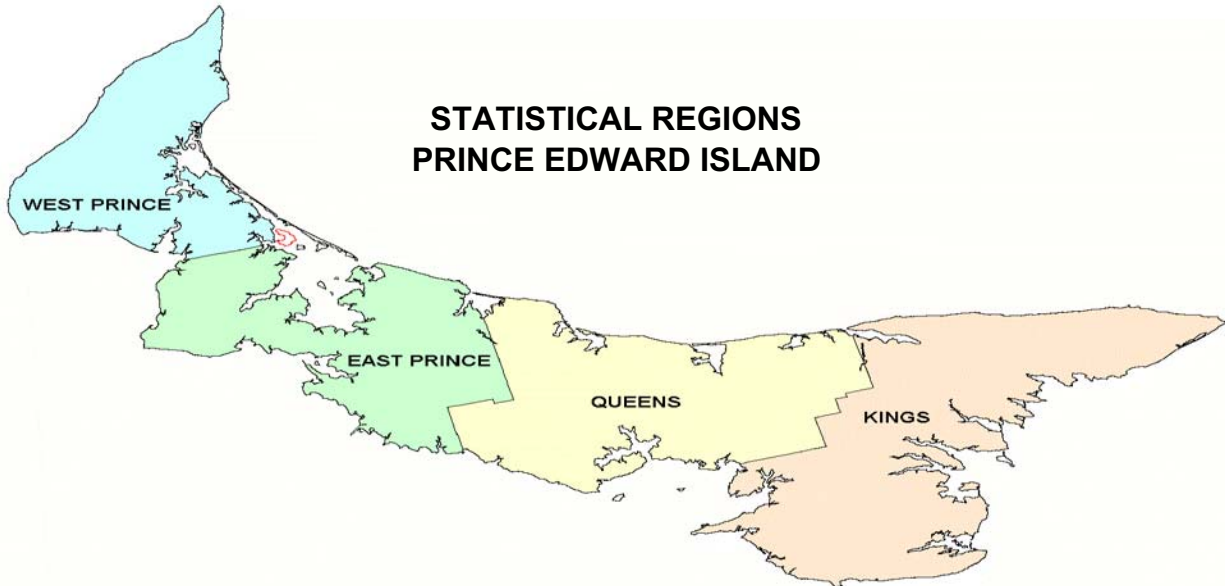

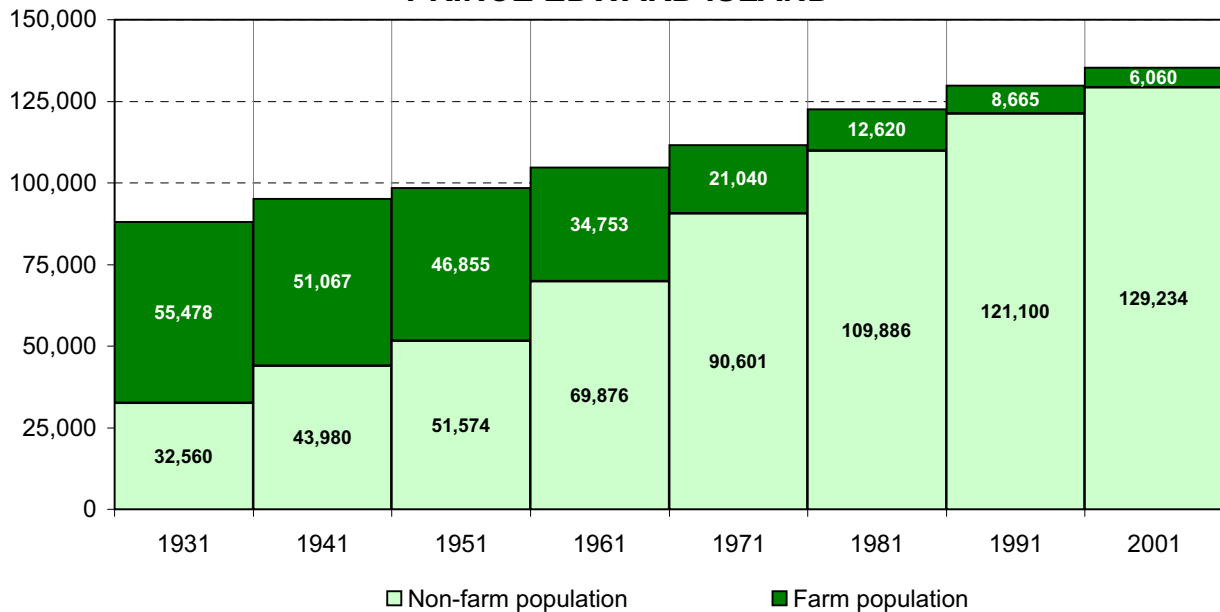

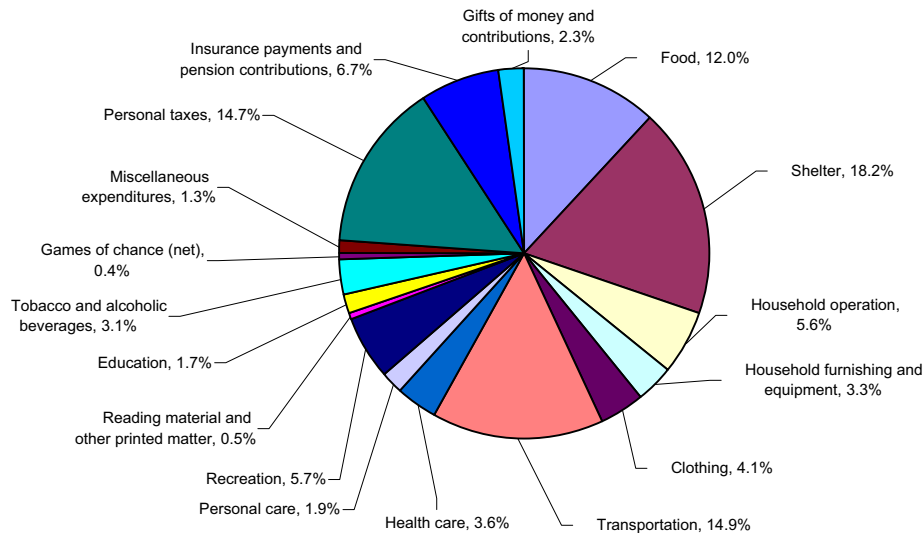

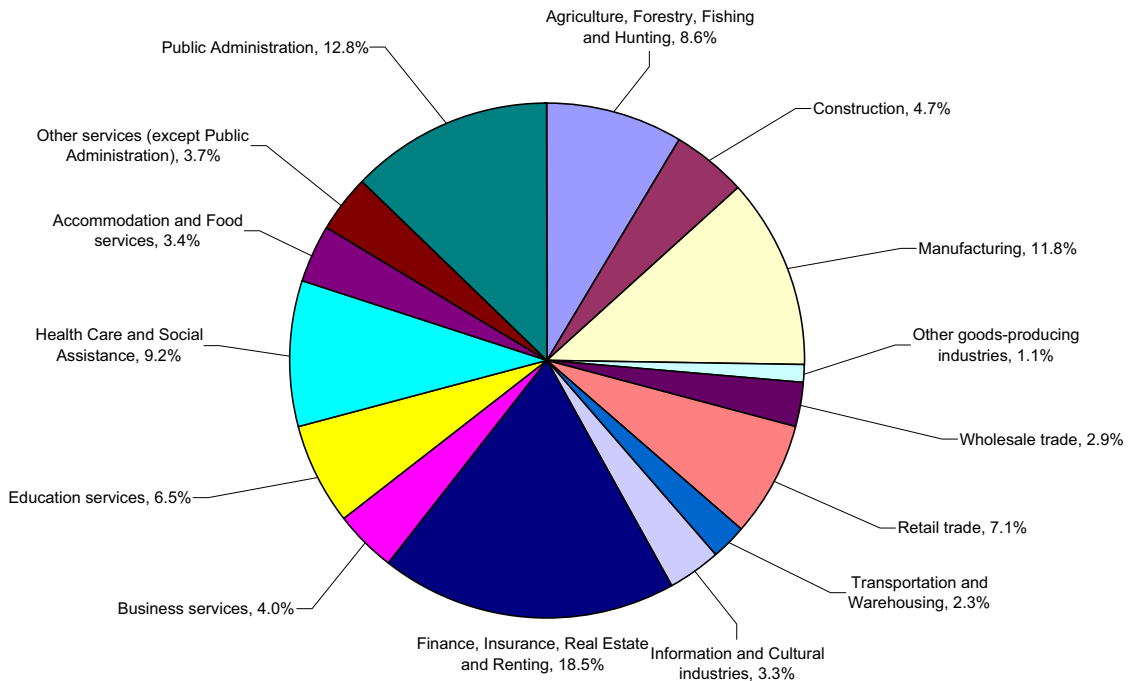

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND FISHING DISTRICTS

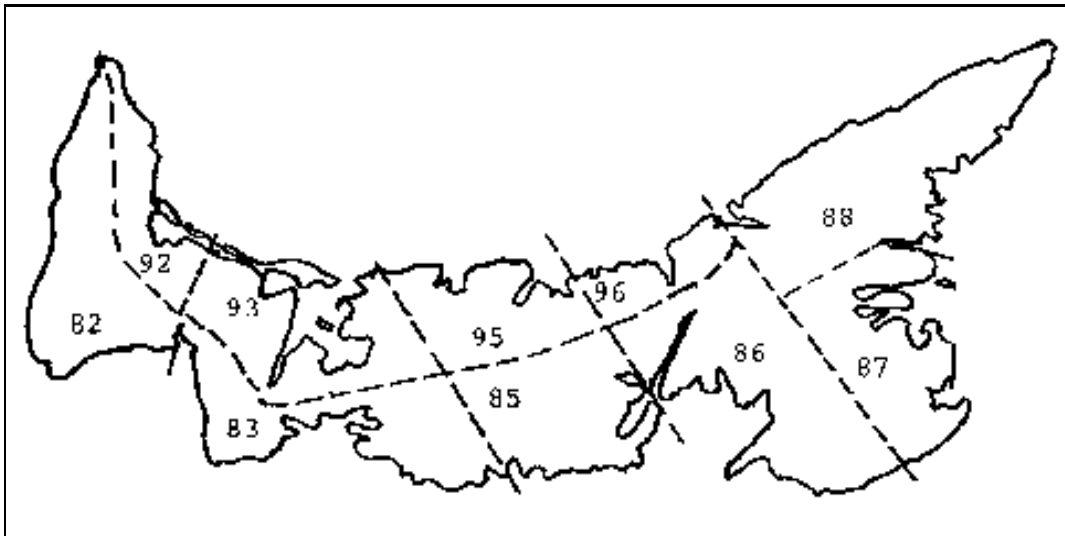
