I am extremely pleased to present the 2011 Annual Statistical Review. The thirty-eighth edition is truly a snapshot of the Island's economy, population and social make-up. It contains a comprehensive description of the Province's economic performance in 2011, a section entitled Key Facts About Prince Edward Island, as well as over 100 data tables compiled from a variety of sources, including Statistics Canada, Provincial Government Departments and the private sector.



The data tables of the review provide historical and current socio-economic information about Prince Edward Island at the provincial level and, in some cases, at sub-provincial levels. Together they form an indispensable reference on the Island population and its economy.

The Government of Prince Edward Island has made important strides to facilitate access to data and statistics. A Statistics Act was introduced during the spring 2010 session of the Legislature and Community Accounts have been developed in cooperation with the Quality of Island Life Cooperative and the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador. These initiatives will provide communities access to data and statistics about their community in an online, open-access format. Making this information available at the community level will allow community organizations, development groups and businesses to develop strategies for growth that are based on the best available statistical information.

The staff of the Prince Edward Island Statistics Bureau of the P.E.I. Department of Finance worked very hard to prepare this Review. I would like to personally thank them for their hard work and diligence.

All statistics are referenced to their original source and the reader is encouraged to consult these documents for related or more detailed information on topics of particular interest.

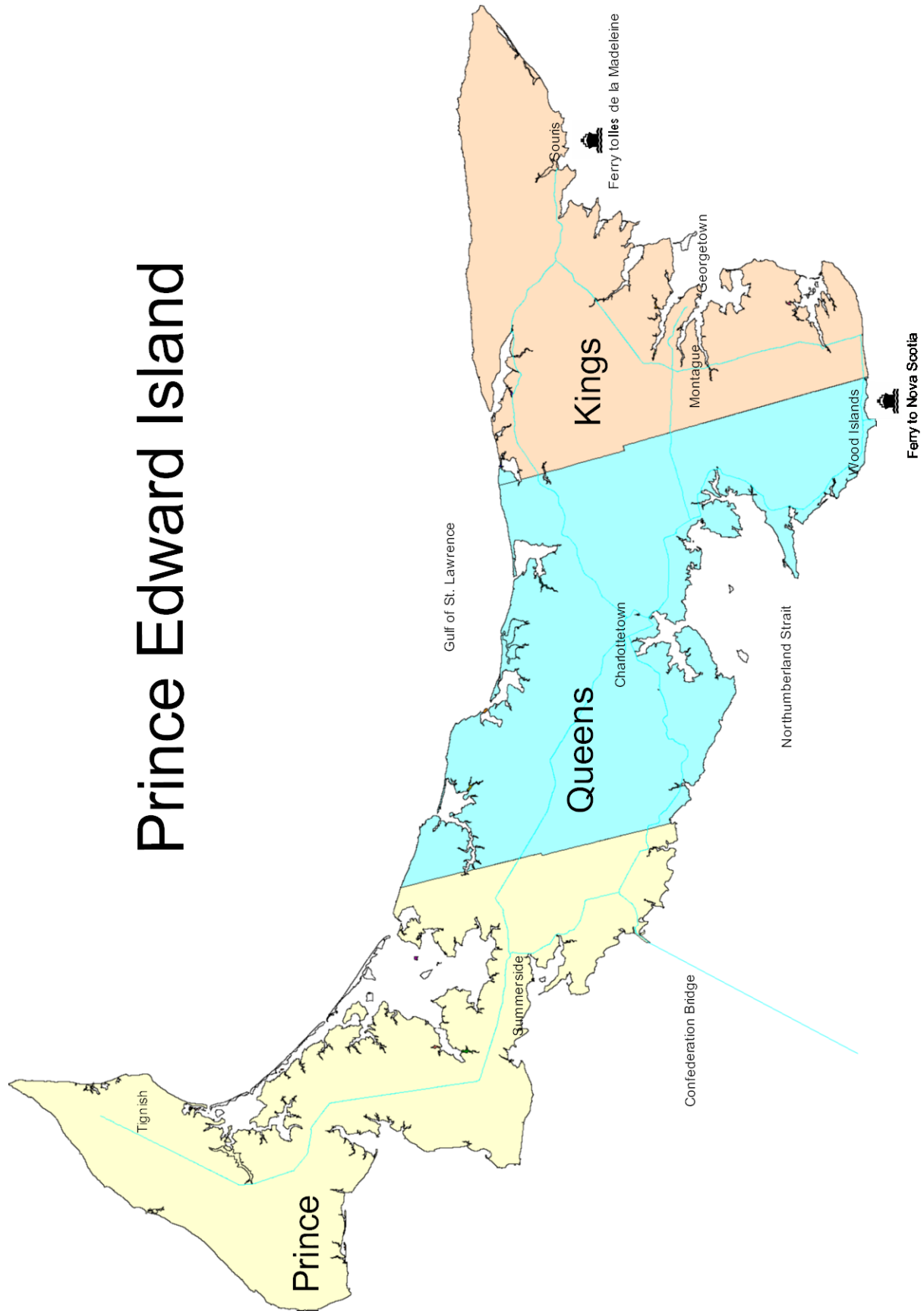

A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwithk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings ¹ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.

The design of the Prince Edward Island Flag is modelled after the Coat of Arms in rectangular shape and is bordered on the three sides away from the mast by alternate bands of red and white. The official flag was established March 24, 1964.

Economic Review 2011

Overview

GDP by industry for Prince Edward Island expanded by 1.1 per cent in 2011. Leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2002 chained prices): finance, insurance and real estate (up by \$19.4 million or 2.5 per cent), health care and social assistance (up by \$9.5 million or 2.6 per cent), retail trade (up by \$9.2 million or 3.1 per cent), and construction (up by \$9.1 million or 5.6 per cent). Sectors showing declines were primary industries (down by \$17.7 million or 5.7 per cent), manufacturing (down by \$11.9 million or 3.2 per cent), public administration (down by \$1.9 million or 0.4 per cent) and transportation and warehousing (down by \$0.6 million or 0.6 per cent).

GDP Income and Expenditure tables for 2011 are expected to be released by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2012. Statistics Canada estimates that real GDP growth for PEI in 2010 was 2.6 per cent. Growth between 2009 and 2010 was largely the result of growth in personal and government expenditures, increased business gross fixed capital formation, and increases in inventories. Real gross domestic product was also revised up for both 2008, and 2009 to 0.7 per cent and 0.2 per cent respectively.

The change in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 2.9 per cent in 2011. Leading factors contributing to this were higher prices for *energy* (up by 12.3 per cent), *food* (up by 4.4 per cent) and *shelter* (up by 2.4 per cent). In Canada, prices increased by 2.9 per cent in 2011.

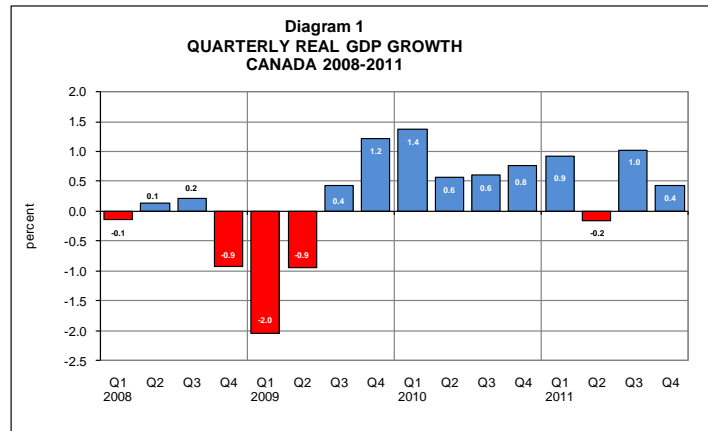
Employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 2.0 per cent in 2011 to average 72,000 for the year. Total labour income increased by 4.1 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 11.3 per cent in 2011, up from 11.2 per cent in 2010. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 0.6 per cent in 2011.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island increased by 0.3 per cent to \$1,210.2 million in 2011, up from \$1,206.9 in 2010. According to Industry Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods rose by 5.5 per cent in 2011 to \$754.5 million, following a 9.1 per cent decrease in 2010.

The economic performance of Prince Edward Island is discussed in more detail following a brief analysis of the national economy in 2011.

The Canadian Economy

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 2.5 per cent in 2011. This compares to a 3.2 per cent increase in 2010 and a 2.8 per cent decline in 2009. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2008 and 2011.

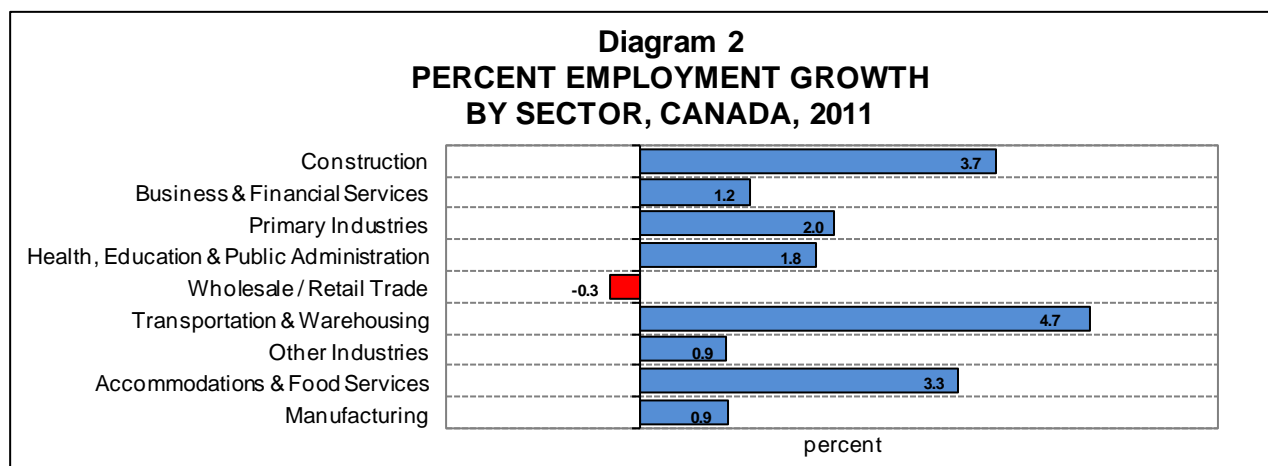
The Canadian economy emerged from recession in the third quarter of 2009. Since then, Canada saw seven consecutive quarters of economic growth, followed by a contraction in the second quarter of 2011, and growth rebounding in the third and fourth quarters.

Final domestic demand increased by 5.1 per cent in 2011. *Consumer spending* was up by \$73.4 billion (2.2 per cent) and *government expenditures* increased by \$13.9 billion (1.2 per cent). Total investment also increased (up \$98.4 billion or 7.9 per cent). Exports of goods and services increased by \$77.8 billion in 2011 (4.4 per cent). Net exports declined 14.2 per cent between 2010 and 2011.

Measured in current dollars, total personal expenditures on goods and services rose from \$940.6 billion in 2010 to \$980.6 billion in 2011, an increase of 4.3 per cent. This was mainly due to a 4.7 per cent increase in expenditures on services. Current dollar spending in 2011 on durable goods increased by 0.3 per cent, while expenditures on semi-durables and non-durables increased by 1.6 per cent and 6.1 per cent, respectively.

The consumer price index increased 2.9 per cent in 2011. Increases were seen across all components, with notable gains in energy, up 12.3 per cent, transportation, up 6.4 per cent, food, up 3.7 per cent, and housing, up 1.9 per cent. Core inflation was 1.6 per cent in 2011.

Employment gains were recorded in both the goods and service sectors, at 1.7 and 1.5 per cent respectively. Notable employment gains include health care and social assistance, up 3.0 per cent, construction, up 3.7 per cent, and professional, scientific and technical services, up 3.4 per cent. Notable declines occurred in finance, insurance and real estate, down 1.1 per cent, utilities, down 5.7 per cent and trade, down 0.3 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 7.4 per cent in 2011, a decline of 0.6 percentage points from 2010.



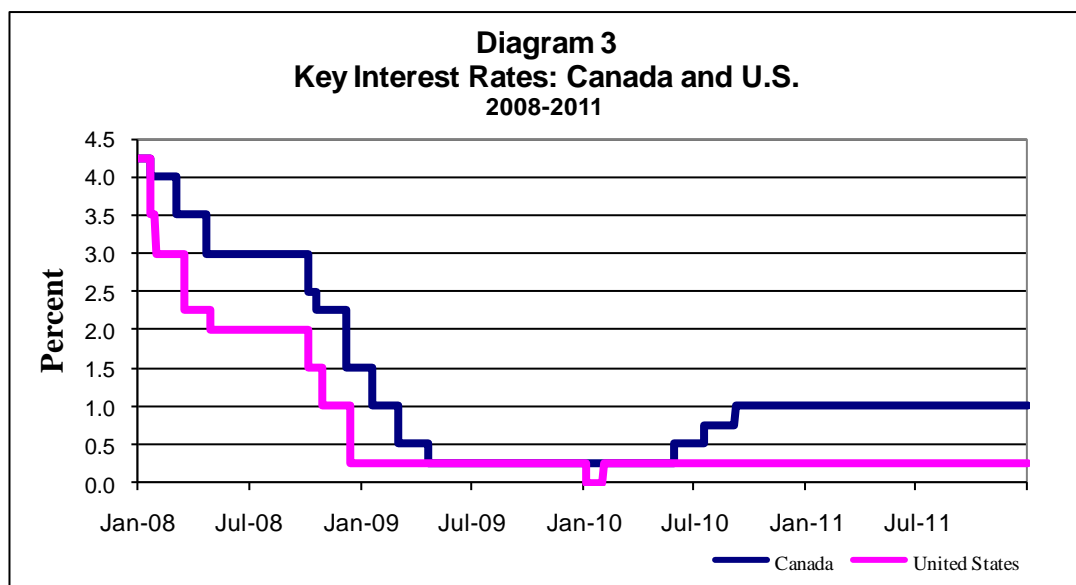

The American Economy

Real GDP increased 1.7 per cent in 2011 in the United States. Increases to real GDP came from a variety of components, including personal consumption expenditures, exports and non-residential fixed investment. Negative contributions to GDP came from state and local government spending, private inventory investment and federal government spending.

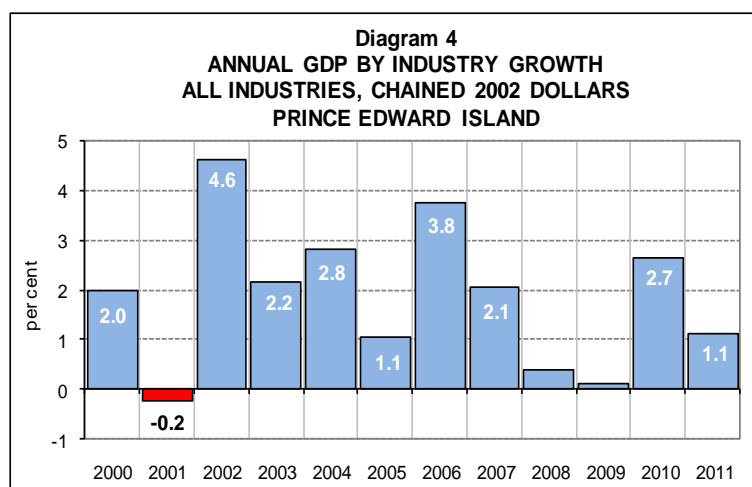
The employment situation in the United States continued began to improve in 2011, with an unemployment rate of 8.5 per cent in December. The total number of unemployed persons fell from 13.9 million in January to 13.1 million in December. Employment increased by 1.5 million jobs over the course of 2011.

The Federal Reserve continued to hold interest rates low throughout the year. Below is a graph detailing the target for the overnight rate for both the United States and Canada. After cutting rates rapidly during the beginning of the recession, the overnight rate has held steady at 0.25 per cent in the United States throughout all of 2011. Gross Domestic Product

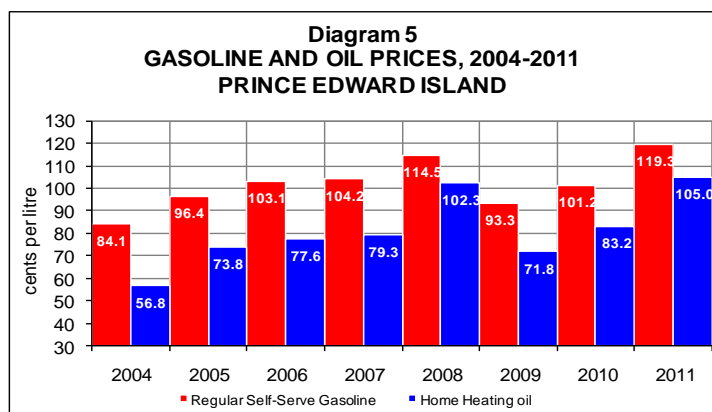
Statistics Canada preliminary estimates of GDP by Industry indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 1.1 per cent in chained 2002 dollars in 2011, following 0.1 per cent growth in 2009 and 2.7 per cent growth in 2010. Diagram 4 shows growth in provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by Industry since 2000.

Consumer Prices

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island increased by 2.9 per cent in 2011, matching the rise of 2.9 per cent nationally. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 0.7 per cent in 2011.

Energy prices continued to rise in the first half of 2011 before beginning to slightly decline in the second half of the year. The overall result was an increase of 12.3 per cent over 2010. Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2004 and 2011. Early 2011 saw a gradual increase in gasoline prices (regular self-serve), continuing the trend of late 2010, before prices began to decline. Gasoline



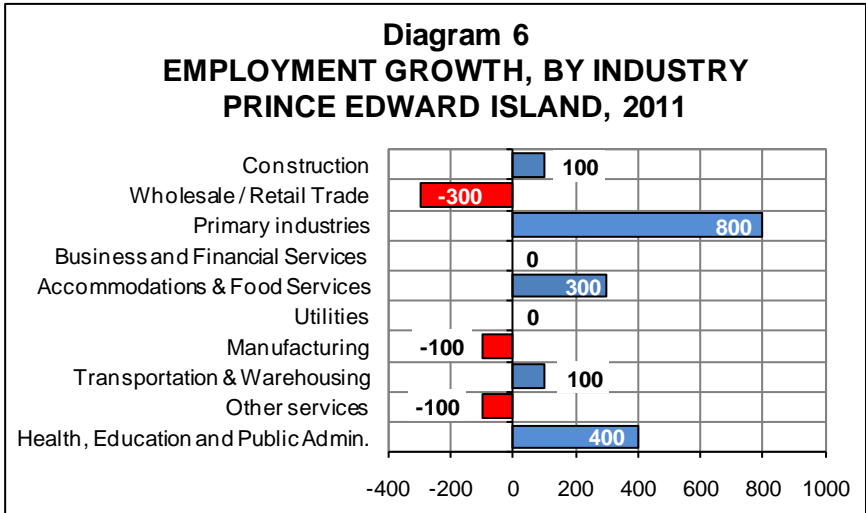

prices rose from \$1.089 per litre in January to reach a high of \$1.264 per litre in May, before declining to reach \$1.162 per litre in December. The price of home heating oil in 2011 ranged from \$0.917 per litre in January to a high of \$1.100 per litre in December. Labour Force

The annual average of total employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 2.0 per cent from 70,600 in 2010 to 72,000 in 2011. This was the third highest growth rate in the country. Employment in the goods-producing sector increased by 5.4 per cent in 2011, while employment in the service providing sector increased by 0.7 per cent.

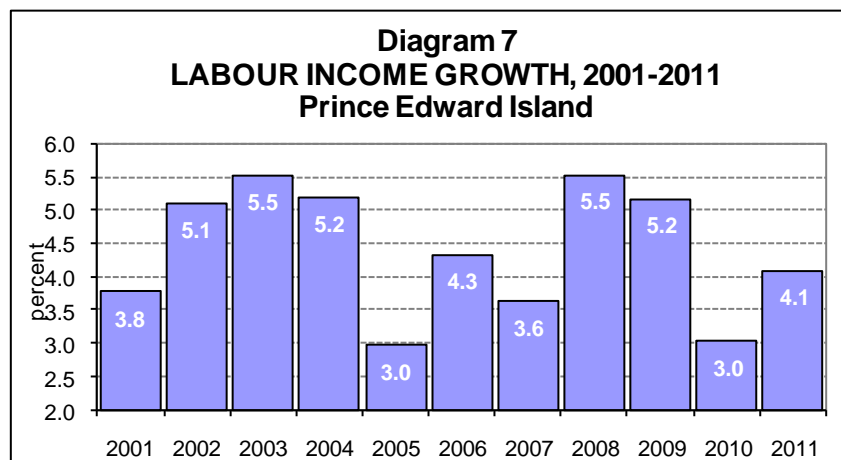
Diagram 6 indicates that a total of 1,700 jobs were created in construction, primary industries, accommodation and food services, transportation and warehousing, health, education, and public administration in 2011. The remaining sectors accounted for a loss of 400

jobs.³ The labour force participation rate increased from 67.9 per cent in 2010 to 68.1 per cent in 2011. After declining in 2010, the average unemployment rate rose slightly, going from 11.2 per cent in 2010 to 11.3 per cent in 2011. Statistics Canada’s Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours shows that employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 0.6 per cent in 2011, the fifth straight year of growth according to that measure. Growth was mainly due to increases in the Trade Sector, Education, and Management Services. Declines were seen in Transportation and Warehousing, Administrative Support, and Arts, Entertainment and Recreation. Income

Statistics Canada estimates that labour income for Prince Edward Island rose 4.1 per cent to reach \$2,800 million in 2011. Diagram 7 shows labour income growth from 2001 to 2011. The major contributors to growth in 2011 were in *public administration* (up by

5.3 per cent), *health care and social assistance* (up by 5.6 per cent), and *trade* (up by 5.7 per cent).

Population

On July 1, 2011, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated at 145,855, an increase of 2,460 persons or 1.7 per cent from 2010. This was higher than the national growth rate of 1.0 per cent and the highest growth rate of all the provinces and territories. Preliminary data show that 2,631 immigrants chose Prince Edward Island as their new home in 2010/11 while 44 emigrants left the Island, resulting in a new high of 2,560 for net international migration. Net interprovincial migration was -543, with Ontario, Alberta, and Nova Scotia being the top destinations of Islanders leaving for other provinces. Between July 1, 2010 and June 30, 2011 the total number of Island births was an estimated 1,489. The number of deaths was estimated to be 1,275, an increase of 2.3 per cent. Thus population growth by natural increase amounted to 214 during that period.

The following table illustrates interprovincial migration flows to and from Prince Edward Island.

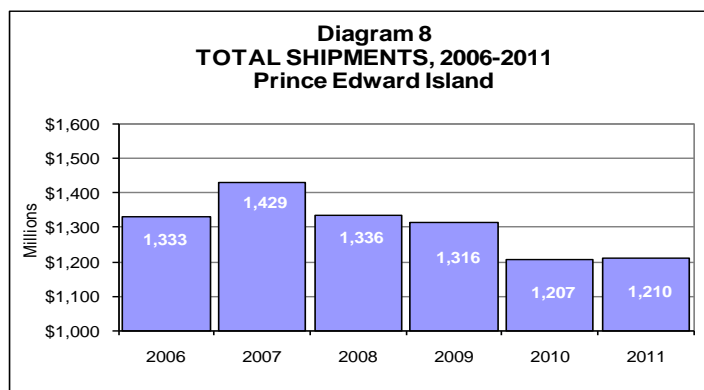
The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 to 42.2 years in 2011. Furthermore, while 11 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion had risen to 15.8 per cent in 2011.

According to the *2011 Census of Population* count on May 10, 2011 there were 140,204 persons living on Prince Edward Island. Revised population estimates based on the 2011 Census will be published by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2013. For more information on population and Census see Tables 1 to 15 (pages 27 to 41).

Industrial Profiles

Manufacturing

Diagram 8 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2006 to 2011. Total shipments remained stable following three straight years of decline, rising slightly by 0.2 per cent to a value of \$1,210 million. Food manufacturing rebounded in 2011, growing by 7.5 per cent

to \$708 million. Chemical manufacturing shipments also increased by 3.6 per cent in 2011 following a decline in 2010. Employment in the manufacturing sector fell by 1.9 per cent for the second year in a row. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector was 5,200.

Exports

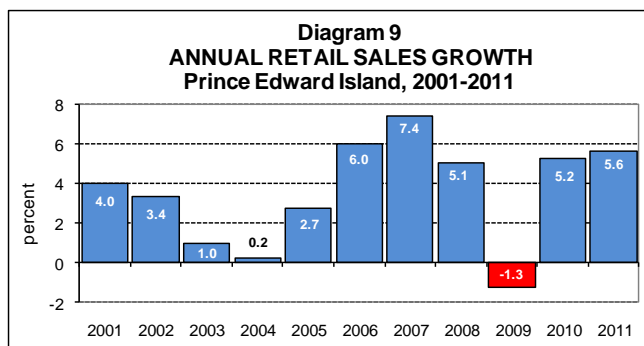
According to Industry Canada, the total value of exported goods grew from \$715.2 million in 2010 to \$754.5 million in 2011, an increase of 5.5 per cent. Exports of *frozen food products* made up 24.2 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2011. Its value fell from \$197.0 million in 2010 to \$182.5 million in 2011, a decrease of 7.3 per cent. Other exports included *seafood products* valued at \$122.6 million (down by 11.7 per cent from 2010), \$88.3 million in *potato and vegetable* exports, (up by 65.8 per cent) and \$39.6 million in *aerospace products and parts* (up by 43.3 per cent). Agriculture

Farm cash receipts for 2011 totaled \$474.5 million, an increase of 17.5 per cent over 2010 and an all time high for PEI. This compares to an increase of 11.2 per cent for Canada as a whole. Total crop receipts totaled \$304.0 million, an increase of 24.8 per cent over 2010, due largely to a 26.0 per cent increase in potato receipts. Total livestock receipts grew by 8.6 per cent. Hog receipts increased slightly, rising by 0.1 per cent. Dairy receipts also saw an increase, rising by 3.8 per cent. Cattle receipts declined by 3.2 per cent.

Retail Trade



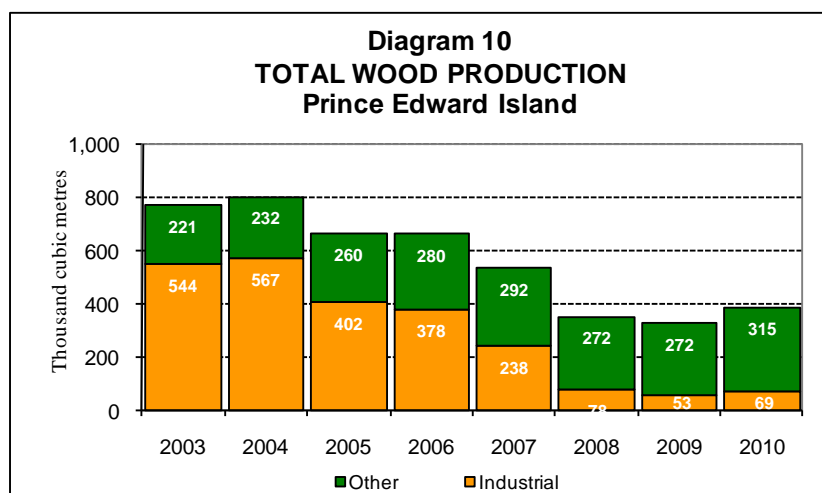

Retail sales on Prince Edward Island in 2011 increased for the second year in a row with a 5.6 per cent increase. Diagram 9 shows retail sales since 2001. Sales were valued at \$1,869.0 million. Higher gas prices were reflected in a 22.4 per cent increase in sales at gasoline stations with sales of \$281.2 million. Building material and garden equipment stores also saw a significant increase, up 8.6 per cent or \$17.8 million. Sales were down at sporting goods, hobby and music stores (down 3.1 per cent or \$1.3 million). Sales at supermarkets was up 1.0 per cent. The number of new vehicles sold remained basically unchanged, up slightly by 12 vehicles with a total of 5,795 vehicles sold. The value of new vehicles sold was \$162.4 million (down 0.7 per cent). Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector decreased by 2.9 per cent to 10,000 people in 2011. Employment in this sector remains the largest private sector employer in the province. For information about the retail trade sector see Tables 45 and 46 (pages 65 and 66).

Fisheries and Forestry

The *Department of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Rural Development* estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2011 increased by 8.8 per cent to \$132.4 million. Molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Island fishery comprising 93.4 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Lobster landings fell by 12.9 per cent to 20.7 million pounds, down from 23.8 million pounds in 2010. However, higher prices resulted in the value of lobster landings remaining steady at \$71.4 million, down only 0.5 per cent from 2010. Lobster prices rose by 26.8 per cent to \$4.20/lb. The value of other crustaceans and molluscs grew by 30.5 per cent in 2011.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish were 32.3 per cent lower than last year, falling to 27.5 million pounds. Prices increased in 2011 for cod (up by 25.4 per cent to 87.8 cents/lb.), mackerel (up by 21.8 per cent to 44.2 cents/lb.), smelts (up by 30.0 per cent to 45.5 cents/lb.), snow crab (up by 70.2 per cent to \$3.25/lb.), oysters (up by 3.7 per cent to \$1.11/lb.) and Irish moss (up by 5.0 per cent to 10.5 cents/lb.). Lower prices were seen for herring (down by 1.4 per cent to 14.6 cents/lb.), rock crab (down by 1.0 per cent to 40.3 cents/lb.) and mussels (down by 5.0 per cent to 57.0 cents/lb.). The *P.E.I. Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry* estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island increased from 325,000 cubic metres in 2009 to 384,000 cubic metres in 2010, an increase of 18.2 per cent⁴. Diagram 10 shows wood production since 2003. Industrial wood production increased by 30.2 per cent in

2010, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips increased by 15.8 per cent. For more data see Table 70 (page 80).

Tourism

Prince Edward Island saw a slow tourism season in 2011 as inclement weather effected the core tourist season. Though the Island played host to several major events, including the Cavendish Beach Music Festival, the visit of the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge, as well as other numerous other festivals and events, tourism numbers remained soft. Occupancy rates at Island accommodations decreased by 1.2 percentage points, while the number of overnight stays decreased by 1.9 per cent. After two strong seasons in 2009 and 2010, campgrounds also had a difficult 2011 season, with sight night's sold down 4.6 per cent and the occupancy rate down 1.9 percentage points. Cruise ship passengers to the Island declined by 1.7 per cent, with 41 ships bringing 62,507 passengers to the Island. Air traffic fell by 1.5 per cent in 2011, while ferry traffic grew by 2.9 per cent. Bridge traffic increased by 2.4 per cent.

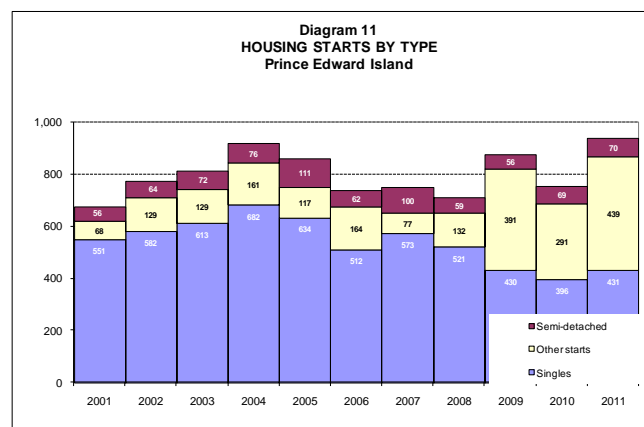
Construction and Investment

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island was \$1,078.6 million in 2011, an increase of 13.3 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment increased from \$304.9 million in 2010 to \$318.8 million in 2011, an increase of 4.6 per cent, while private sector investment grew by 17.3 per cent, from \$647.4 million in 2010 to \$759.7 million in 2011.

Non-residential investment grew 58.4 per cent in 2011. All sectors of non-residential investment contributed to this increase, with industrial investment up 61.2 per cent, commercial investment up 44.2 per cent, and government and institutional investment up 75.7 per cent.

Residential investment increased 3.0 per cent in 2011, largely due to increased investment in singles and renovations. These segments increased 4.5 per cent and 2.4 per cent respectively. Investment in row housing declined in 2011, falling 19.2 per cent.

The *Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation* (CMHC) estimated that there were 940 new

housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2011, an increase of 24.3 per cent over 2010. This was the highest number of housing starts in PEI since 1988. As seen in Diagram 11, the increase was due mainly to a large increase in row housing, apartments and other multi-unit buildings, which grew from 291 in 2010 to 439 in 2011. Single dwelling housing starts also increased in 2011, going from 396 in 2010 to 431 in 2011, an increase of 8.8 per cent.

Transportation

The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport declined in 2011, falling from 289,597 in 2010 to 285,158 or 1.5 per cent. 141,608 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (down 1.3 per cent from 2010), while 143,550 people left the province by air (down by 1.7 per cent).

In 2011 the volume of product received at Island seaports, including fertilizer, sand, stone and gravel, had a total weight of 863,987 metric tonnes, down by 27.4 per cent from the previous year. During the same period 12,769 metric tonnes of water freight, mainly potatoes, was shipped from the Summerside port. More transportation data can be found in Tables 89 to 90 (pages 90 and 91).

The Public Service Sector

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) increased by 1.9 per cent in 2011. Employment in the *health and social services* sector decreased by 0.5 per cent, while employment in the *education* sector increased 5.2 per cent.

Provincial Finance

The provincial *Public Accounts*, Consolidated Statement of Operations shows that the Province of Prince Edward Island received \$1,546.0 million in total revenue in fiscal year (FY) 2010/11, 2.6 per cent higher than in FY 2009/10. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$891.1 million that year, an increase of 4.2 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 41.3 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2010/11 compared to 42.4 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments decreased by 3.0 per cent to value \$329.9 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 5.0 per cent to total \$156.4 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures rose by 1.1 per cent to reach \$1,598 million.

The Consolidated Statement of Operations also shows a deficit for FY 2010/11 in the amount of \$52.5 million. As of March 31, 2011 the provincial net debt was \$1,695.6 million, up 7.2 per cent from 2010. More data on the government sector can be found at Tables 107 to 112 (pages 103 to 108).

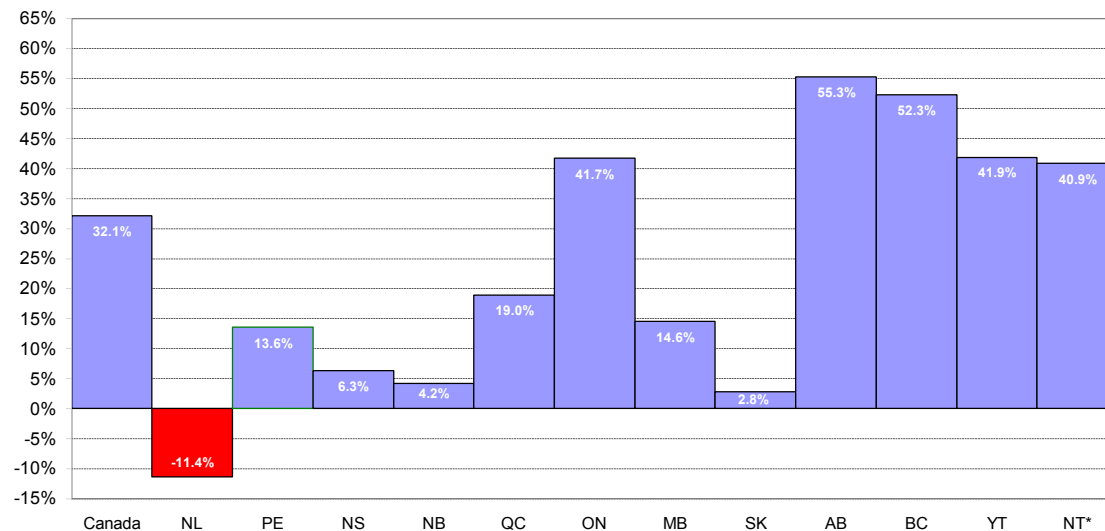

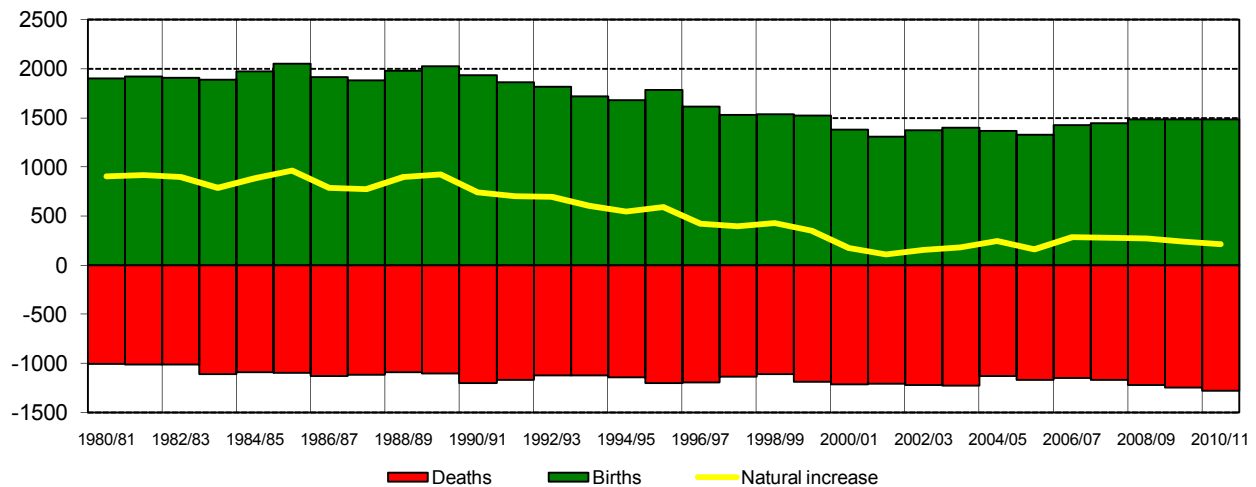

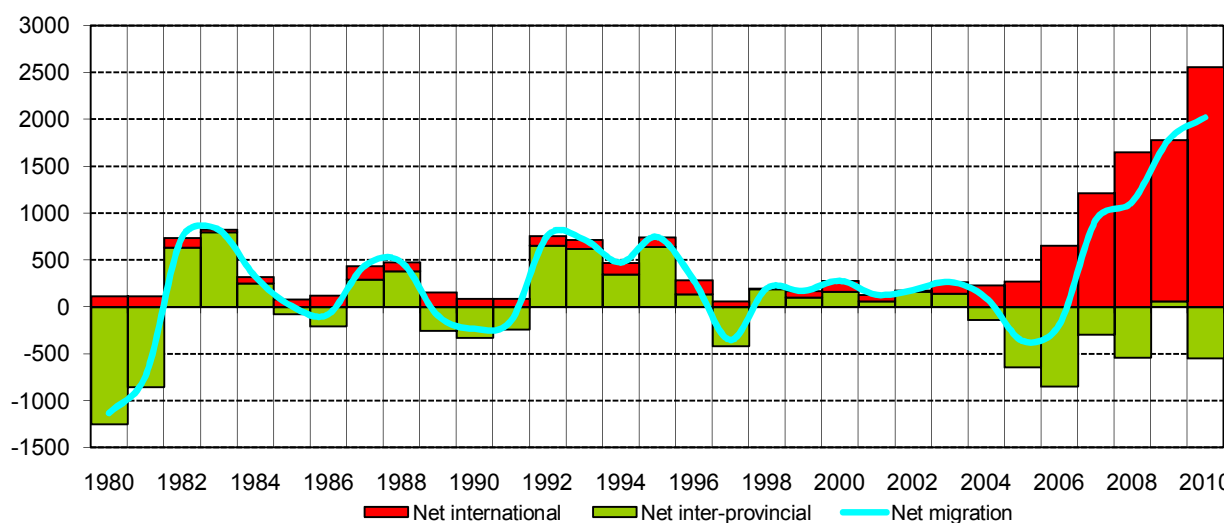

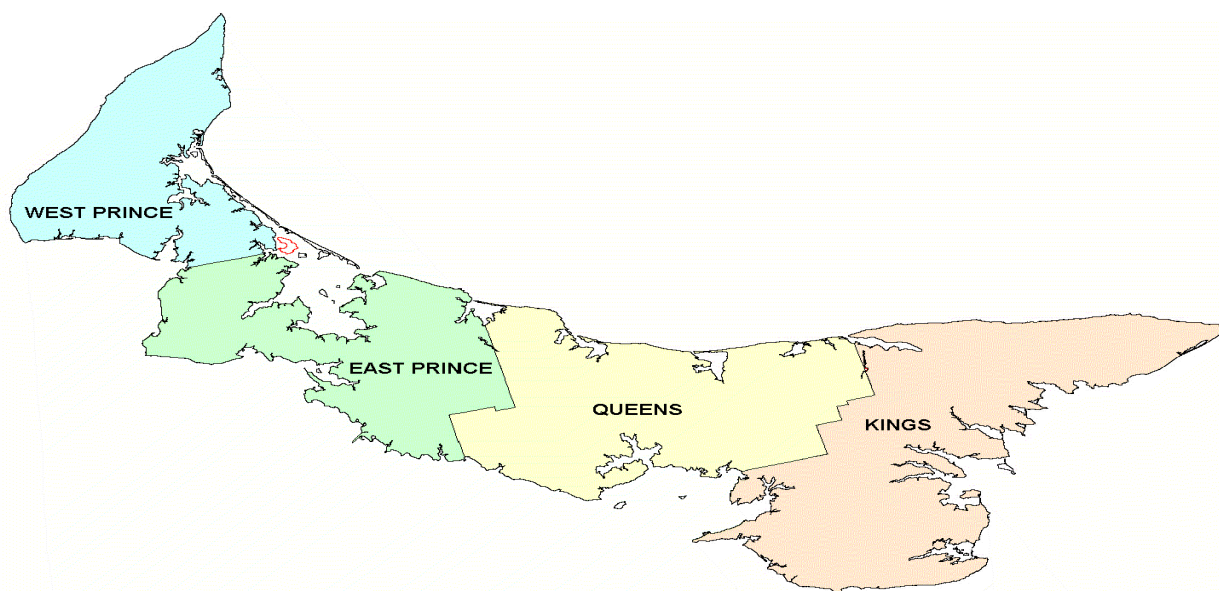

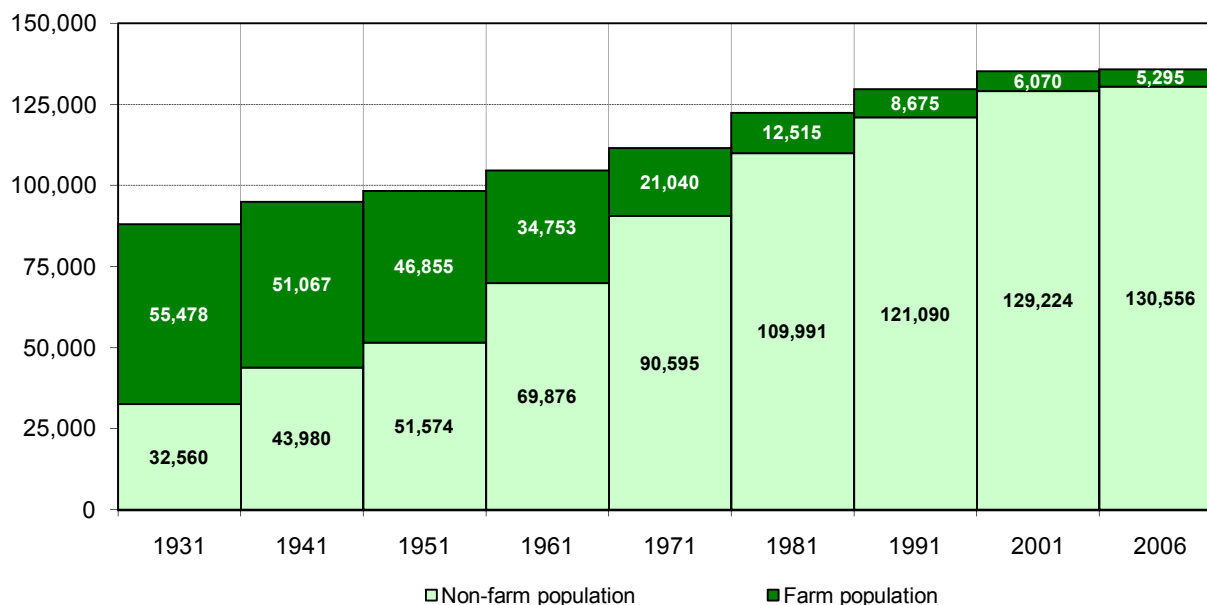

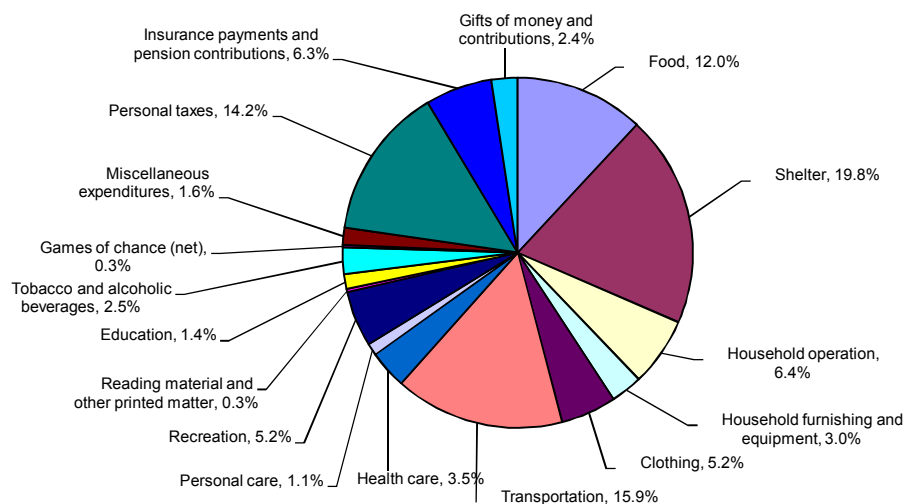

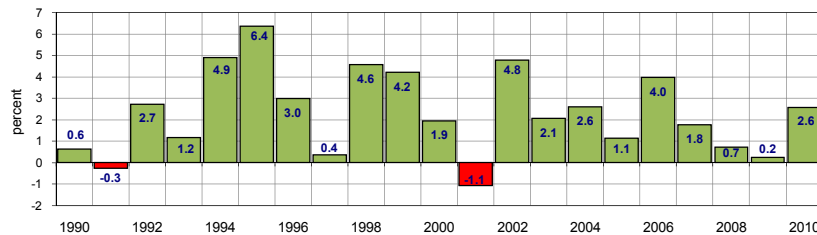

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND FISHING DISTRICTS

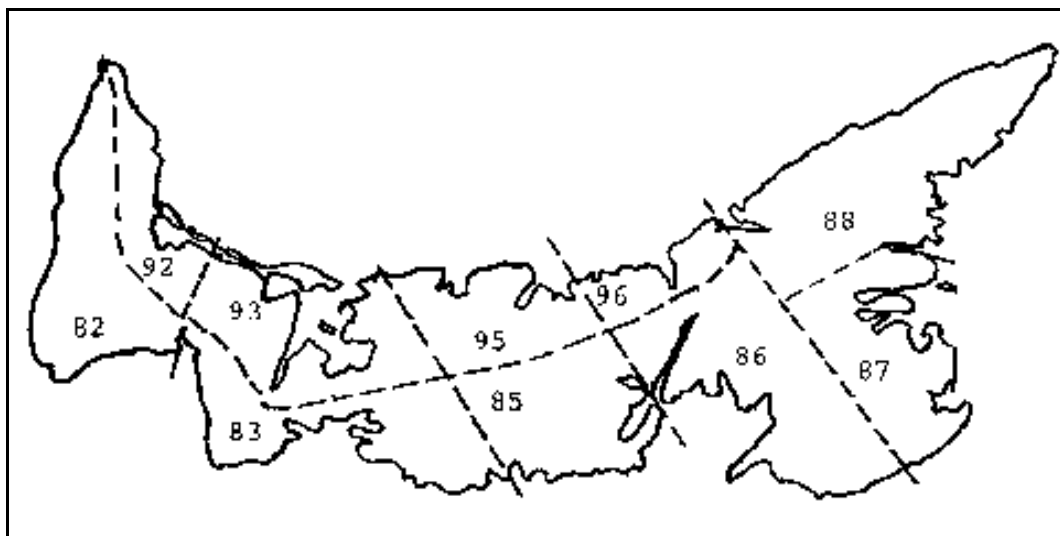
