

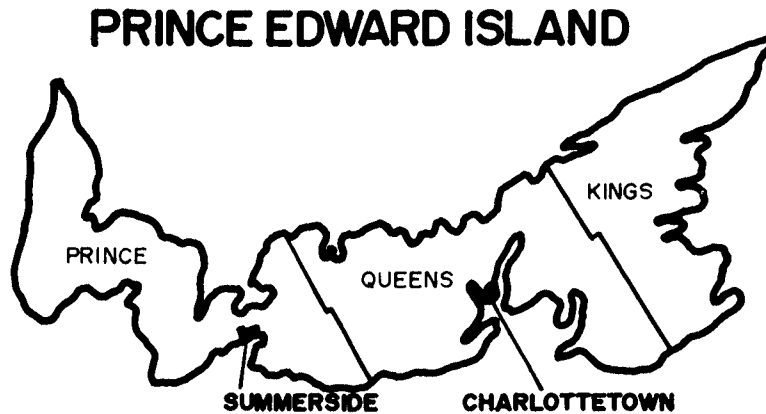

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P.E.I. ECONOMIC REVIEW 1981 TO 1982

The economic review provides a commentary on the provincial economic situation for the calendar year 1982 where data are available. Some reliance is made on partial and preliminary data and reference to years before 1982 is in some instances necessary.

1. Population, Labour Force, Employment and Unemployment

a) Population

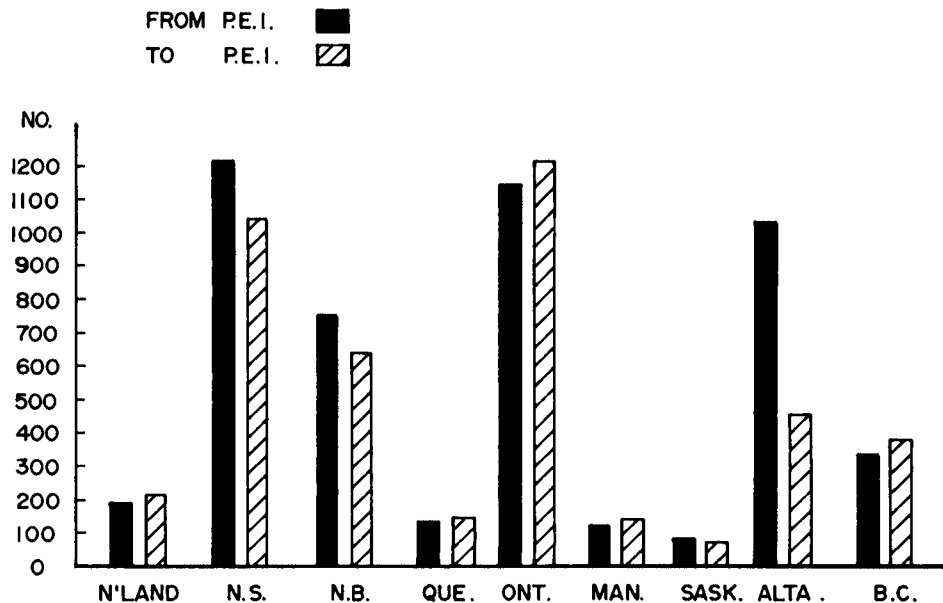
The population of Prince Edward Island is estimated to have been 122,800 June 1, 1982 according to Statistics Canada. This represents growth of only 0.2 per cent from June 1, 1981 following a year of decline between 1980 and 1981. Natural increase of the population in 1982 was approximately 1,000 but this was significantly reduced by net outmigration during the first half of the year, so that the overall increase was only 300.

Diagram 1 identifies gross population flows between Prince Edward Island and the other Canadian Provinces between July, 1981 and June, 1982. The greatest net loss of population from P.E.I. in this period came from migration to Alberta with a movement from P.E.I. of 1,078, and to P.E.I. of 460. Some losses also occurred from movements between Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and P.E.I. These losses were partially offset by gains from Ontario.

Preliminary statistics on population growth during the second half of 1982 point to a substantial reversal of the trends that occurred in the first half of the year. In particular the population movement to Alberta changed to return migration and this strengthened overall population growth for P.E.I. in the latter half of 1982.

b) Labour Force, Unemployment and Employment

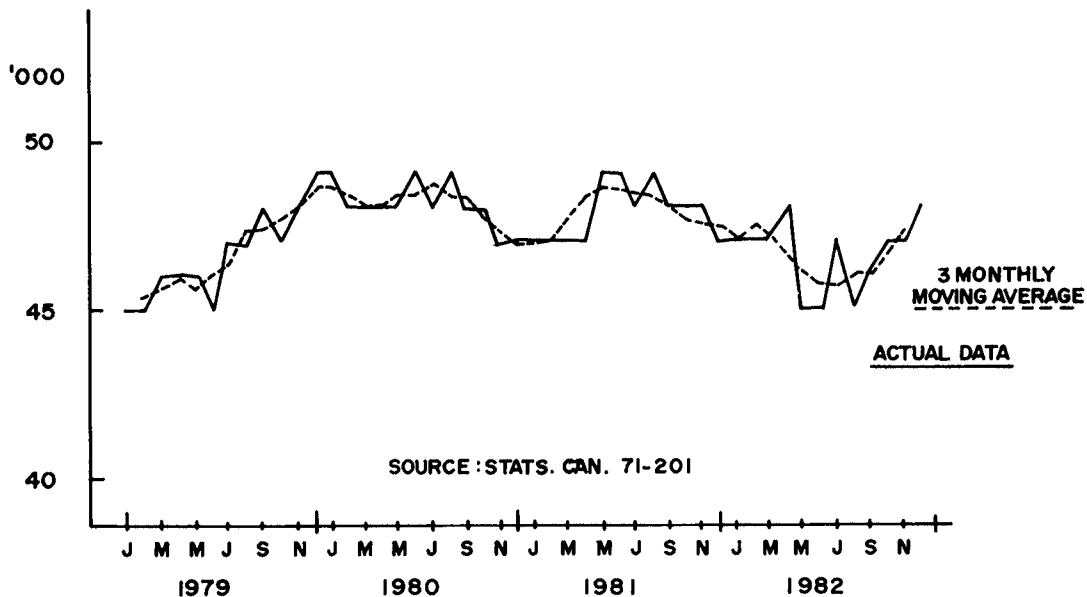
The P.E.I. population 15 years and over increased to 92,000 in 1982 from 91,000 in 1981. There is a general slowing in growth of this population group as a result of migration trends and declining numbers in the 10 to 14 year old category, given the passage of the baby boom. The labour force itself declined by approximately 0.8 per cent in 1982 averaging 54,000 for the year, as the participation rate fell from 59.2 per cent to 58.3 per cent. Total monthly employment averaged less than 47,000 in 1982, a decline of approximately 2.4 per cent from 1981. This is the second successive year of employment declines for Prince Edward Island, which experienced a reduction of 0.5 per cent from 1980 to 1981.

The employment decline on Prince Edward Island was one aspect of a general decline in economic conditions throughout Canada in 1982. For Canada as a whole, total employment fell by 3.1 per cent in 1982 and by the fourth quarter of the year employment was 551,000 below its peak of the second quarter of 1981. 1982 marked the worst economic recession that Canada has experienced since the 1930's.

Average monthly unemployment on P.E.I. increased to 7,000 in 1982 compared to 6,000 in 1981. The unemployment rate averaged 13.1 per cent in 1982 compared to 11.4 per cent the previous year. The lack of employment on Prince Edward Island was most pronounced between May and August. Average employment for these months was 50,000 in 1982 compared to 53,000 in 1981 on a non-seasonally adjusted basis. Adjusting these figures for seasonality one can see in Diagram 2 the considerable decline in employment that occurred during the summer months of the year. Downturns in manufacturing (principally fish processing), construction and agriculture appear as the major factors.

TOTAL EMPLOYMENT, MONTHLY, SEASONALLY ADJUSTED, P.E.I. 1979-1982



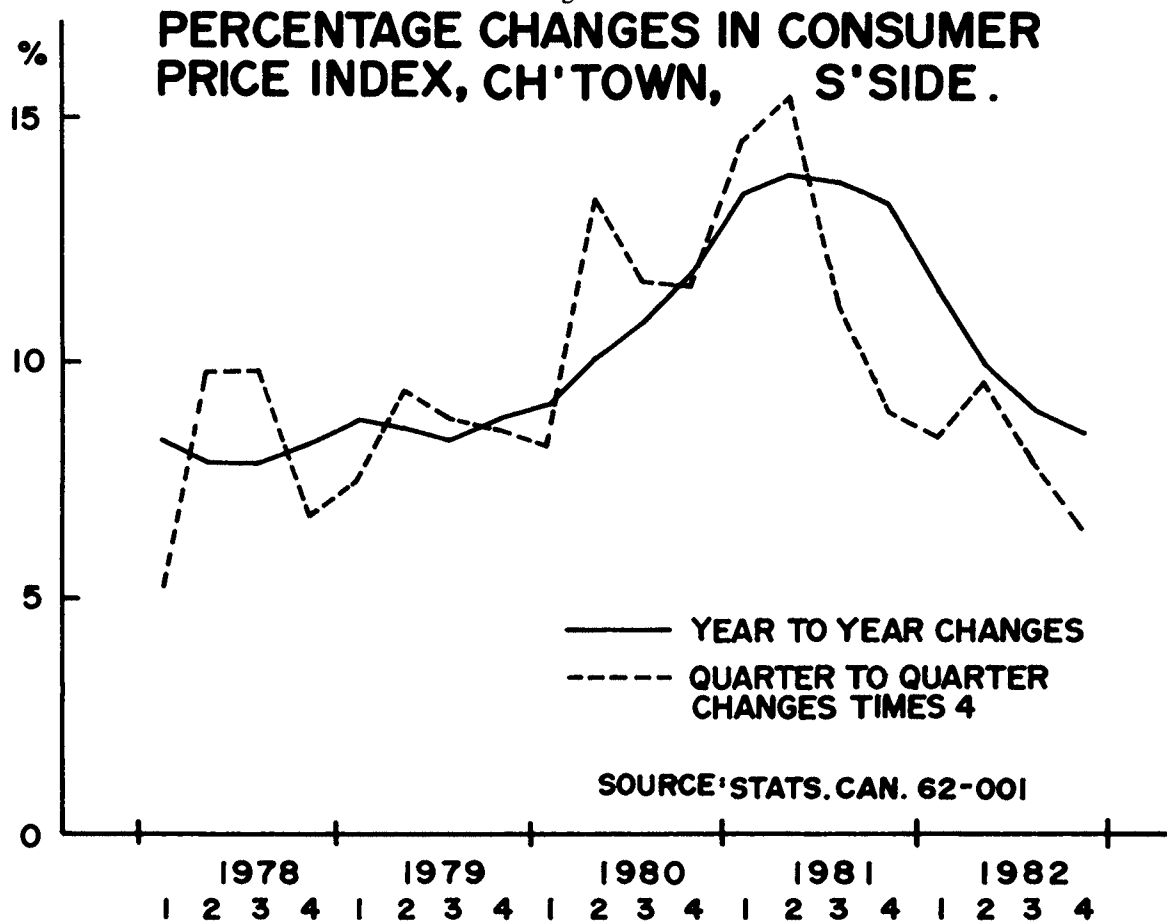
2. Inflation and Personal Income

a) Prices

Increases in consumer prices trended downward throughout 1982 on P.E.I. and the average increase in the consumer price index for Charlottetown and Summerside for 1982 was 9.5 per cent. This was considerably less than the 10.8 per cent figure recorded for Canada as a whole, and sharply down from 13.5 per cent in 1981. Diagram 3 displays changes in consumer prices by comparing the index between years and between quarters for Charlottetown-Summerside. The latter figure is more sensitive to changes in the index and one can clearly see that inflation peaked during the second quarter of 1981. At that time energy prices were increasing in the order of 39 per cent annually. Energy price increases slowed considerably during 1982 and by December appear to have levelled off at approximately 9.5 per cent above the figure for December 1981.

Quarterly data indicate that the annualized inflation rate on P.E.I. had fallen to 6.3 per cent for the fourth quarter of 1982 as measured by changes from quarter to quarter although on a year to year comparison it measured 8.2 per cent in the fourth quarter. Energy prices were only part of the reason that inflation eased, as food prices declined in absolute terms between August and December 1982 and for 1982 on average they show an increase of only 4.8 per cent. Prices of clothing, household furnishings and equipment also increased moderately in 1982 with clothing prices increasing by 6.1 per cent for Charlottetown-Summerside.

b) Personal Income

Estimates of personal income for P.E.I. by Statistics Canada are available only to 1981 and they show its total value to have been \$965 million or \$7,846 per capita in that year. This represented 67.4 per cent of the Canadian average and is a significant decline from 71.2 per cent the previous year. Personal income increased by 9.5 per cent in 1981, at a time when consumer prices on P.E.I. increased by 13.5 per cent and thus it appears that there was significant decline in real income growth in that year. While growth of incomes on P.E.I. in 1981 was generally slow there was an extraordinary expansion in Interest, Dividends and Miscellaneous Investment Income, which reached an estimated \$104 million that year an increase of 38.7 per cent over its level of 1980.

The area of most weakness in terms of income growth in 1981 was Net Income of Farm Operators which fell to \$38 million from \$61 million in 1980, largely reflecting the significant decline in potato prices in 1981-82 after the buoyant market conditions of 1980-81.

In 1982, Labour Income, which is the largest component of personal income, increased at an annual rate of approximately 10.3 per cent during the first three quarters of the year, largely as a result of significant gains in average weekly earnings. This component of personal income valued \$513 million in 1981 and is expected to reach approximately \$570 million in 1982. Net income of farm operators, at \$38 million in 1981, is forecast to decline further in 1982 as potato prices remain depressed.

Unemployment insurance benefits are a significant element of personal income on Prince Edward Island and their value is projected at \$69 million in 1982, an increase of over 30 per cent from the \$53 million received in 1981. Overall personal income for 1982 is expected to value approximately \$1.1 billion, and with general easing in consumer price increases there are reasons to think that personal income in real terms on P.E.I. improved somewhat.

3. Gross Domestic Product and Gross Expenditures

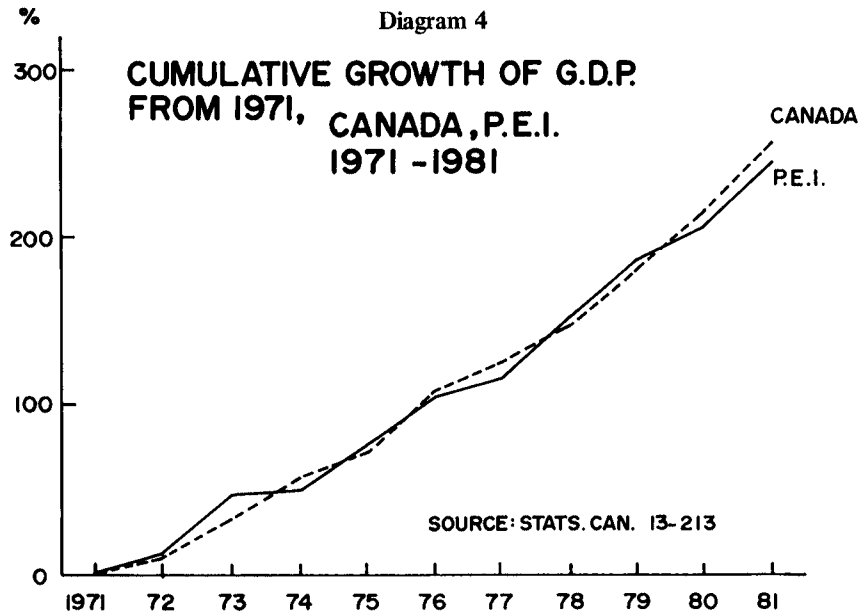
a) Gross Domestic Product

The value of provincial Gross Domestic Product at market prices for P.E.I. is estimated to have been \$878 million in 1981, which represents an increase of 11.1 per cent over 1980. This compares with growth of 14.1 per cent for Canada in 1981. Growth of provincial and Canadian Gross Domestic Product since 1971 is compared in Diagram 4. One can see that growth of the provincial economy exceeded the national rate of growth until 1979 and in the 2 years following its growth slipped relative to the nation.

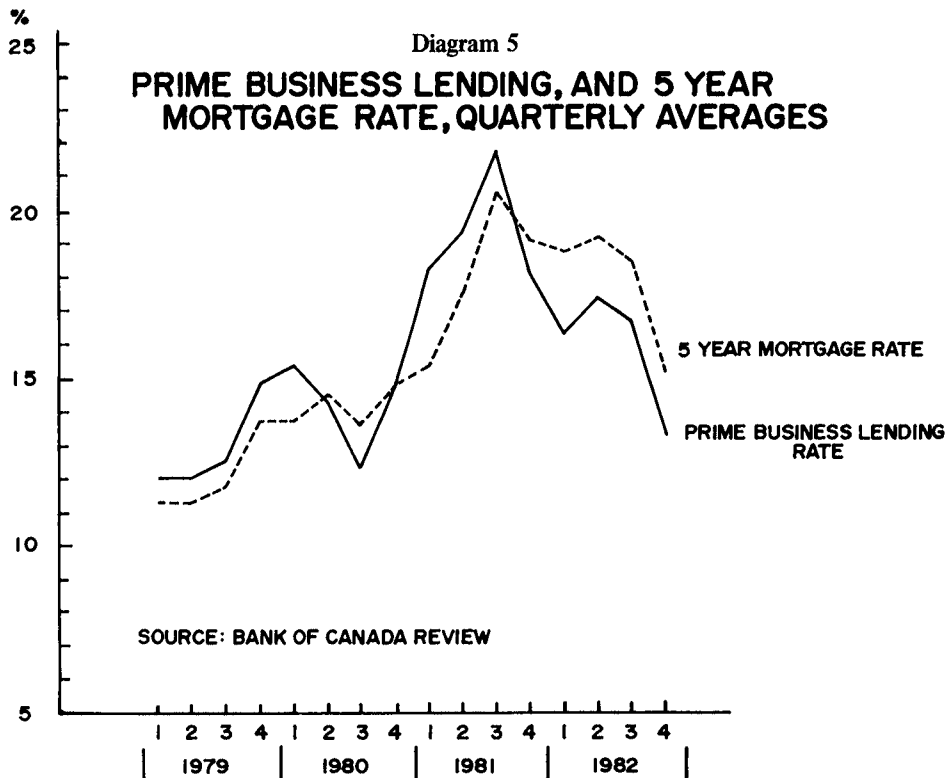
Estimates of Gross Domestic Product in constant dollars prepared by the Conference Board of Canada reflect a similar pattern for these years. They estimate that P.E.I. GDP in constant dollars declined by 2 per cent during 1980 and 1981, whereas Canada increased by 3.7 per cent. They also estimate that Gross Domestic Product for P.E.I. declined by 3.1 per cent in 1982, while that of Canada declined by 5.0 per cent. These data all signify a significant deterioration in economic performance in Canada and P.E.I. generally in 1982 with the degree of decline in P.E.I. somewhat less than for Canada.

b) Gross Provincial Expenditures

The value of total expenditures by consumers, all levels of government and business on P.E.I. was approximately \$1.3 billion in 1981. This overall level of expenditures increased by only 3.7 per cent in that year. Purchases of goods and services by consumers and government amounted to 89.4 per cent of the \$1.3 billion and they increased by 11.5 and 13.7 per cent respectively in 1981. Significant falls in the total value of capital expenditures on housing, by business generally and by government reduced the overall expenditure level significantly.



Interest rates had a significant effect on spending patterns in recent years and Diagram 5 displays the rate for prime business lending and mortgages over the past 4 years. One can see that the rates peaked in mid 1981 and remained high throughout much of 1982, falling in the fourth quarter. The impact on housing construction has been considerable with only 203 housing starts



in 1981 compared to 1,068 in 1979. 248 starts are recorded for 1982 of which 167 occurred in the fourth quarter alone. Total new construction expenditures, excluding housing, in 1982 valued \$92.5 million compared with \$84.8 million in 1981 and \$101.5 million in 1980. A large part of non-residential construction consists of major government projects.

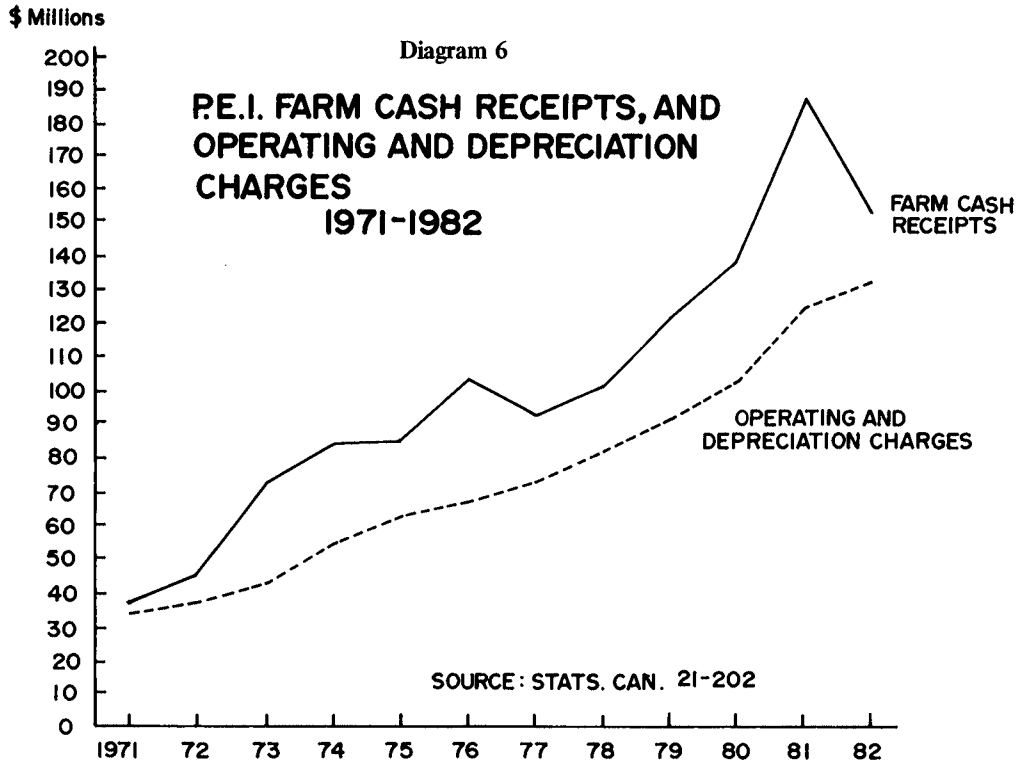
Consumer spending on retail goods valued \$412 million in 1982, an increase of only 2.7 per cent over 1981. New motor vehicle sales valued \$34.9 million in 1982, down from \$40.6 million in 1981 and substantially below the peak of \$47.2 million achieved in 1979 when 6,553 motor vehicles were sold on P.E.I. 1982 total sales numbered only 3,755.

Tourist visitation also appears to have suffered from the economic recession of 1982, with total tourist parties recorded at 202,991 compared to 210,717 in 1981. The value of tourist expenditures on P.E.I. for 1982 is estimated at \$49 million, marginally up from the estimate of \$46.8 million for 1981. The general picture that emerges indicates that local expenditures on P.E.I. have been seriously curtailed in 1981 and 1982, particularly in the areas of capital investment, housing, purchases of consumer durables, as well as tourism. One bright spot lies in international exports from P.E.I. which valued \$102.8 million in 1982, up sharply from \$70.1 million in 1981. A large part of this increase is attributable to shipments of potatoes and evaporated milk in 1982.

4. Sector Detail

a) Agriculture

Agriculture is the largest goods producing sector on Prince Edward Island and in 1980 Gross Domestic Product attributable to agriculture valued \$99.6 million. This represented 12.6 per cent of total Gross Domestic Product on Prince Edward Island that year.



Farm cash receipts are estimated to have valued \$152.4 million in 1982, which compares with \$186.8 million in 1981. Trends in farm cash receipts and operating costs are shown in Diagram 6. One can see that net farm incomes shrank markedly in 1982 as costs of production rose 5.3 per cent while receipts fell in absolute terms. Realized net income of \$22.4 million in 1982 compares with \$63.6 million recorded in 1981 and \$37.8 million in 1980.

The major factor at work in these swings in farm cash receipts is the erratic nature of potato prices. A record acreage was planted in 1982 which produced an all time high volume crop of 17,250,000 cwt. Potato prices slumped in the fall of 1982 and thus the value of potato sales in 1982 was 34 per cent below its value of 1981 at \$52.2 million.

The sale of dairy products valued an estimated \$29.7 million in 1982, an increase of 11.8 per cent over 1981. The value of hog sales fell to \$21.4 million in 1982 from \$22.4 million in 1981 as higher pork prices were offset by a decline in the numbers slaughtered. Beef prices remained very flat in 1982 and consequently the value of beef sales fell to \$16 million which can be compared to its peak of \$22.5 million in 1979.

In light of generally weak conditions for farming in 1982, total employment fell somewhat to average 6,000 per month for the year.

b) Fishing

The total value of fish landings in 1982 is estimated to have been \$35.4 million, up 11.0 per cent from 1981. The fishing sector showed gains in lobster landings of 2.4 per cent and at \$22.6 million they formed 63.8 per cent of the value of all fish landings in 1982. The groundfish harvest declined by 6.5 per cent and the Irish moss harvest fell by 9.2 per cent. These losses were largely offset by significant gains to the catch of shellfish and pelagic and estuarial fish.

c) Manufacturing

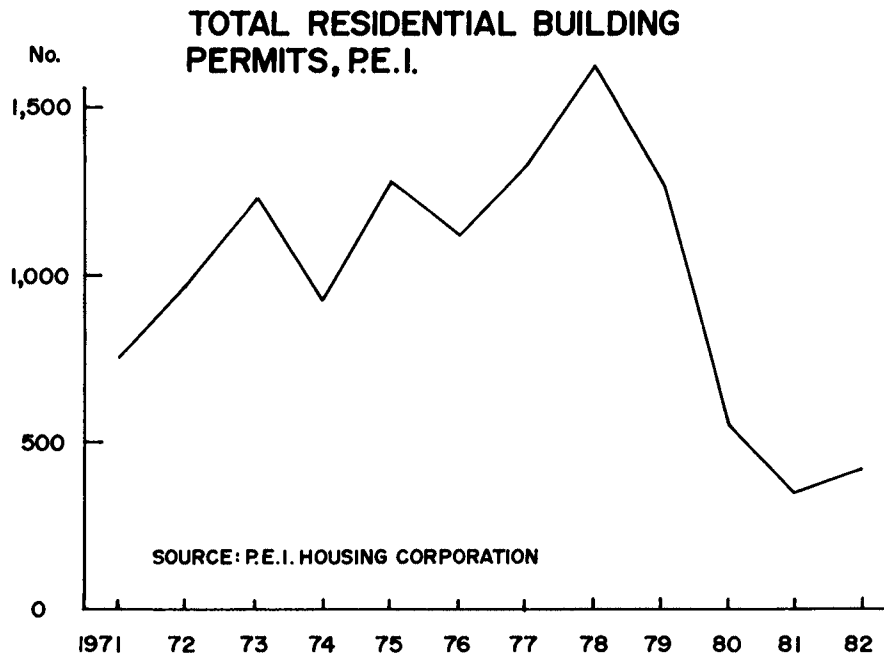
Available data indicate that P.E.I. manufacturing, which is heavily dominated by fish and farm product processing, experienced rapid growth to 1979 but its position slipped since 1980. Approximately 8.3 per cent of total provincial production was attributable to manufacturing in 1980. In that year the Labour Force Survey indicates there were approximately 5,000 employed in manufacturing. By 1982 employment in this sector is estimated to have declined by approximately 23.3 per cent from that level.

The current dollar value of shipments of manufactured goods in 1982 is estimated to have been \$265 million, an increase of 4.3 per cent over 1981 which represents a decline in constant dollars. Food and beverages formed 80 per cent of manufacturing, and output of this sector was depressed by a significant decline in the value of fish product sales. The closure of Georgetown Seafoods was undoubtedly the major factor in that decline. Available data also point to considerable staff reductions and output reductions in a wide range of manufacturing plants on P.E.I. in 1982.

d) Construction

The construction industry contributed to approximately 7.8 per cent of P.E.I.'s Gross Domestic Product when at its peak in 1978. It has been seriously affected by the major slump in new home construction since 1979. Diagram 7 displays the number of residential building permits issued on P.E.I. from 1971 to 1982 where this decline is apparent. During the first 9 months in 1982 only 81 housing units were started and this represented one of the lowest periods of housing construction on P.E.I. since the Second World War. During the fourth quarter of 1982 there were 167 housing starts which boosted construction at year end.

The total value of non-residential building permits issued January to November 1982 was \$30.9 million, a considerable increase from the \$21.5 million recorded for this period in 1981. In general the upturn in housing starts, the renewed activity on the Convention Centre and the construction of the Veteran's Affairs headquarters provided a significant recovery for the construction industry in the last months of 1982 following a very low level of activity throughout much of the year. Employment in construction in 1982 averaged 3,000 per month.

e) Transportation, Utilities and Commercial Services

This heading covers a wide variety of economic activities including all modes of transportation, communications, utilities, accommodation and food services, entertainment and miscellaneous commercial services, finance, insurance and real estate, and retail and wholesale trade. In total this group provided employment for approximately 20,000 on P.E.I. in 1982.

Its largest sub-component is retail and wholesale trade with employment of approximately 8,000. Retail trade figures for P.E.I. were depressed throughout most of the year until a surge of buying occurred in November and December. The overall level of spending of \$412 million in 1982 represents an increase of only 2.8 per cent over 1981 in current dollars.

Spending at restaurants and bars also shows little gains in 1982 with a value of \$36.4 million which compares with \$35.8 million in 1981. Employment in commercial services consequently fell in 1982. This sector is affected to a large degree by the fortunes of the tourist trade during the summer months which as mentioned earlier declined in 1982.

The transportation sector showed declines in all of its sub sectors in 1982, namely ferry traffic, rail traffic, trucking and air transportation. Within the utilities group electrical generation on P.E.I. expanded considerably early in 1982 because of the severe winter. But local generation amounted to only 6.8 per cent of total electrical supply in 1982 and total supply declined by 1 per cent from 514,333 megawatt hours of production in 1981. Residential electricity prices increased by 19.5 per cent in 1982 with the increase taking place between January and March of the year after which point prices stabilized. Electricity prices actually declined toward year end with the rebate from the Public Utilities Income Tax being passed on to consumers.

f) Non-Commercial Services and Government Services

Employment in education, health services, miscellaneous non-commercial services and local, provincial, and federal administration (excluding military personnel) amounted to 11,000 persons in 1982. Statistics Canada estimates of Gross Domestic Product for P.E.I. indicate that in 1980 Hospital Services valued \$26.3 million and Education Services \$68.8 million in terms of Gross Domestic Product together forming 12.1 per cent of total provincial production in that year. Available statistics for 1982 indicate that the size of the non-commercial service group was virtually unchanged in 1981.

Employment in Provincial Administration declined in 1982 by approximately 110 positions while Federal Administration expanded with the movement of Veteran's Affairs personnel to P.E.I. Thus total Public Administration expanded slightly in 1982. Overall, the non-commercial and government service sectors provided considerable stability to the P.E.I. economy during a period of retrenchment in most areas.

Total government expenditures by all levels, excluding intergovernmental transfers, amounted to \$789 million in 1981, which represented a 9.4 per cent increase over the previous year. Federal capital and current expenditures increased by 12.2 per cent while provincial and local expenditures increased by only 3.6 per cent. These figures include expenditures by Hospitals and are significantly influenced by the construction of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital which was predominantly in 1980. Total government revenues by all levels of government are estimated to have been \$333 million in 1981, which represents an increase of \$54 million over the previous year.

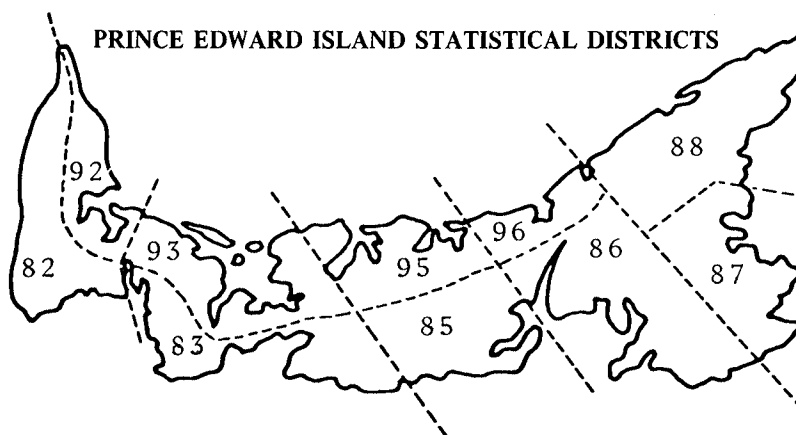
