<p>4. Licensing & Regulations <i>What licenses do I need to operate? Source Financing <i>How much capital do I need to start my business and how can I access it?</i></p>	<p>Determining your financial needs is necessary to ensure you have the capital required to start your business and sustain future growth. You can finance your business through two means: equity and debt.</p> <p>A financial proposal is a document that outlines your capital needs to prospective lenders or investors. A financial proposal is also part of a business plan.</p>

<p>9. Bank Account <i>How can I collect revenue and pay expenses for daily operations?</i></p>	<p>Now that your business is registered, you can take your Business Registration Certificate to any financial institution and open a business bank account.</p>	<input type="checkbox"/>
<p>10. Marketing <i>How can I best promote my business?</i></p>	<p>Your business is ready and now you want to reach potential customers. Advertise your business in places where your potential customers hang out, whether that be in person or online.
